SEVERE EPIDEMIC HITS WEST COAST

An epidemic of what Virginia Anderson, in American Squares, calls "new-danitis" has hit the western square dance field.

She points out that a multitude of new square dances are being created, which become more and more complex and with confused "cues for the dancers.

Likewise, a great M number of new round or couple dances are being "created" to fit popular tunes. Some few of these may catch on and persist, as have the Badger gavotte, Rye waltz, etc., from an earlier day. But too many are being put together by enthusiasts who do not know the fundamentals of good ballroom dancing or even the proper terms for describing their steps.

Too much of this can only hurt the field of square and round dancing. As she says. "Let's keep happy danci.

That, as is mentioned elsewhere, is what is happening on the West Coast. California folk and square dances began the process a good while ago, remaking some of the European folk dances.

We aren't in any immediate danger here, but as interest in square dancing and associated couple dances grows, as we want it to, we may have to watch out for this danger.

On the other hand ... and this as to be hoped, the tendency may wear itself out

How old a dance is the Rye Waltz? Notes on Byron Wolfe's recording of this dance say:

"This dance was introduced in 1890, at Milwaukee, Wisconsin. It has been danced more or less ever since "

The dance is danced with either eight or 16 measures of 4/4 time, followed by 16 measures

Typical Scotch airs are used for both parts of the music.

Who is Lloyd Shaw? I have heard some square dancers mention him.

Shaw, of the Cheyenne Mountain School in Colorado, has probably done more to revive Western square dancing and trained more first rate callers than any other man.

His books, "Cowboy Square Dances" and "The Round Dance Book", are the very best in the field, for my money. 3/53/5

When did the "Black Hawk Waltz" originate? According to Mr. and Mrs. Joe Lang, of Den-

ver, it developed there

about 1938-39, based on music written by Mary E. Walsh many years earlier.

"Pappy" Shaw refers to the Denver developan earlier dance, however. Since the music is so conducive to a special step, he is probably right.

At any rate, it's a lovely and interesting dance, whether old or fairly recent. **

Should a club try to develop exhibition sets An exhibition set is a special group of dans cers who know and shaw, or demonstrate, new and difficult dances,

For that purpose

they are useful, They may also be ruseful in developing and showing "showy" dances to non-square dance groups. This is good public relations

for square dancing, On the other hand. Lloyd Shaw, or "Pappy" development of a particular group of four couples as an exhibit tion set may have bad results. Bad feeling may develop between the group as a whole and the small group.

Ideally, any four couples of experienced square dancers should be able to fit together as an "exhibition set" for a particular purpose, but no one group should be singled out as an exhibition set.

SQUARE DANCING TO RECORDS

While square dancing to recorded music is not nearly as much fun as having good live figures.

Much of the pioneer work in introducing the square set to this area was done with records, Bill Embury Ty Persons, and myself have all used records effectively and the dancers had a lot of fun.

However, many of and their colorful sthe square dance records dance costumes very are far too fast for beginners, or even for experienced dancers who are not used to the faster western dances. Speed cannot be easily adaptecd to the desire or ability of the group, makings of another without an expensive adjustable speed turntable.

With care in selecting records that have clear calls or that can be called to, and with sufficient instruction for new dances or for beginning groups, even a single set at home can have a lot of fun.

Our local record stores all carry some square dance albums and single records in stock. Better play them over before buying, though.

Our novelty dance, "Patticake Polka", is similar to many of the old play party games in manyvrespects.But they usually sang their

own music. Some of the "games" more chosely resembled our square sets or circke dances using wquare dance

A great many of the square dances can be danced in this way, although it may be necessary to swing and make up figures here and thre while waiting for the caller and the fourth couple to "catch up" with you.

Why not try it? It may not work so well with beginners, but with experienced square dancers it can be fun.
