ear Harold.

When I first began callin (about 32 years ago) I taught and called he old "tried and true" dances like "Birdie in the Cage", "Grapevine wist", "Take a Peek", etc., and had fun calling and dancing them. hen, we had a few nationally known callers come into the area and ntroduce some of the "adventure-dancing-breaks, hash, etc. Some of he callers already in the Miami area claimed that they knew and anced that way "back home", but that the dancers Edown here"xwould ever be able to learn the allemandes., It was a challenge -- and a roject of fun and fellowship,

Some of the callers began studying, teaching, and calling the alleundes and we got a big response from our dancers. Perhaps our interst in teaching the new material and our dancers' happy, relaxed, "weun-do-it" outlook made it easy for us to work in the allemandes with ur other dances. When teaching and calling the allemandes we often ondered just what made our dancers squeal when they ended up with neir right partner. They often looked serious while they were tryag a new figure or eten while doing a more complicated dance that ney knew, but throughout the dance came the squeals and at the end the dance came the back-slapping and laughing and the satisfied, elaxed feeling.

We did more than wonder, we found out by doing the dances ourselves. i's fun and just a good feeling of accomplishment and satisfaction, ad we must confess we love the allemandes, breaks, and hash. We're sked by some if Square Dancing isn't supposed to be done for fun thout much diligent thinking. Like the golfer or swimmer who pracices a new stroke hour after hour, or even the "relaxed" fisherman no practices casting just for the fun of it, even the Square Bancer sires and enjoys the new material and, like most sportsmen, enjoys he new sparks added to our dances. Even if it takes a bit more thinkng and energy, we still feel relaxed, refreshed, and happy after the

We like and enjoy our hours of study and teaching the new material; he dancers like and enjoy the thinking, the making of mistakes -- which ring the laughs -- and the conquering of the new steps -- which bring he squeals; and lastly, but very important in this area, our beloved purist is delighted and delights us by saying, "We heard you didn't ance like this down here, we're having so much fun and feel right at ome. "

We also like and do, do, do the old and basic dances handed down and njoyed through the years. They are necessary and are fun. We enjoy incing in areas where no allemandes, etc., are used, and we always rticipate (with an unbiased mind) in every type of dance, as we feel can always learn something at everyone's dance. We only want those you who have never had the pleasure of doing the allemandes not to riticize us until you have tried them -- without prejudice. It really fun to mix the old dances with the new. Actually, Square Dancing s grown more in this area in the past year (since the breaks, etc.) ve been taught) than ever before.

We love our dancing and love our dances. Come on, everybody, let's ncell

We have just received for reiew a copy of "The Li'l Abner quare Dance Handbook", published v Toby Press.

Before we'd had time to more han glance through it, numerous opies appeared on various local

ewsstands.

What to make of the book was a uestion. Undoubtedly its appeara nce on the magazine racks will ttract the attention of a good any people. That much is good.

About 25 standard Square nces are well presented, with usic. That is good. Nowhere that have seen can a bigger 35¢ worth obtained. Likewise, the line awings illustrating most of the gures are good.

On the other hand, the accent the hillbilly angle is, to my .nd, directly oppowsed to all that llers and teaxhers have been tryig to do to poularize good Square

Dancing for its own sake. Perhaps once or twice a year every group whould have a special night of the type suggested here, just for variety and fun. But to give the imfprossion, as Fred Leifer's book does, that these features are a regular part of Square Dancing is all wrong, it seems to me.

However, the handbook should be a splendid aid for anyone who wants help in planning a Sadie Hawkins Day dance, or something else of the type, and it has enough good points and good, standard dances to be worth anybody's 35¢.
