WINDSOR RELEASES FIRST RECORD BY FLORID IAN

DON ARMSTRONG RECORD DUE ABOUT FEBRUARY 15

A good many months ago Doc Alumbaugh, of Windsor Records, expressed an interest in recording some southern callers.

In line with these plans, Don Armstrong of Tampa, Florida, has been signed to a long term contract

with Windsor.

For his first release on the Windsor label, out this month, Don calls "Down South" and "Put om Your Old Gray Bonnet". The idea of using the music to "Down South". for a singing call is Don's own, and he has made his own adaptation of Herb Greggerson's popular and smooth-flowing "Split the Ring and Around Just One" to fit the music. The call to "Put on Your Old Gray Bonnet" on the flip side is an old and popular one.

Don is one of Florida's best known and most popular callers. His Saturday night dances at the big ultruly outstanding event. Gulfport Casino in St. Petersburg

average 50 to 60 squares.

Don served as first president and carried a large part of the load of organizing the Florida Square and Folk Dance Callers and Teachers Association. He carries on a heavy schedule of calling and teaching activities in co-operation with the recreation department extension. of Tampa, St. Petersburg, and other cities, and still finds time to operate the River Bend Trailer Vill-year, and are trying to maintain age at New Port Richey. age at New Port Richey.

Dear Editor:

This is a preliminary announcement concerning the FIRST ANNUAL STATEWIDE FLORIDA SQUARE AND FOLK DANCE FESTIVAL. Florida's dancers, teachers, and callers would surely appreciate your cooperation in helping to "pass-the-word" about this Festival. It is felt that this Festival is of especial importance to Dancers everywhere, not only thoughout Florida, because it is almost comparable to a "coming out party", and, is so significant of the wonderful growth of Square and Folk Dance activity throughout the State. In addition, Florida has played host to many visiting Dancers this season, and many others are planning visits in the future, and, if they learn about this Festival in time, many can plan to attend and therefor enjoy their trip even more. So, here are some facts:

The Festival will be held in TAMPA, FLORIDA on SATURDAY, APRIL 11th, 1953 under the mutual sponsorships and wholehearted endorsements as mentioned in the letterhead. The Festival will be held in the Florida State Fair Grounds Stadium providing a "smooth-surface" dancer area large enough for over 350 sets, and, with a "grass" dancer area for hundreds of sets more. The Stadium seats over 6000 spectators, excluding bleachers, and additional bleachers are provided for Dancers only. Full provisions have been made for inclement weather. The Tampa Recreation Department has made available the City Auditorium, the Recreation Centers, and the huge Gym which itself can accomodate over 100 squares. Visiting Dancers will be, in so far as possible, housed by local dancers, and the Housing and Hospitality Committee says "first come -- first served, only priority goes to out-of-State-ers", so visitors are asked to write in early. It is definitely confirmed that at least FOUR Nationally-known Callers are going to be a part of the program, as FRED and MARY COLLETTE from Atlanta, Georgia, BON ARMSTRONG and JIMMY CLOSSIN from FLORIDA, and ED DURLACHER from Freeport, New York, all are scheduled. Afternoon workshops will attract many dancers early and all efforts are being made to make this a truly outstanding event.

Additional information will be sent to later, and it is hoped that you will call this Festival to the attention of your readers NOW, and AGAIN later on when we have complete details. Thanks.


