

FLORIDA'S THIRD CONVENTION IS NOW HISTORY

Florida's Third Annual Square and Folk Dame Convention is now well in the past, and we can look back with much pleasure on a swall planned, well organized gathering, excellently led and staffed.

True, it was not as largely attended as the previous two, nor as was anticipated. Lack of a broad enough ase of local darpers was revealed in the attendance figures, but the several thundired square and folk darcers from all over Florida and tenty-five or more other states or tainly shad a treat—or, rather, many reats in the fine workshops conducted by nationally famous leader send the two big Festival dances on Friday and Saturday nights.

The splendid workshops by Michael and Mary Ann Hersan, Olga Kulbitski, Frank Kaltman, Don and Marie Armstrong, Chapley Thomas, and Ed Edgerton were well attended and greatly appreciate.

Much credit is due Bill Embary, his taw Irene, Gene Bayliss, mad all of the others who had a hand in the planning, advance arrangements, and the hard on the pot work of handling details. Not only the committee chairmen named in the last issue, but many others whom we cannot begin to name helped out on the many details of registration, taking tickets, seeing that sets were filled promptly, and many other details.

Rather naturally, the Miami area led in attendance at the Miami Beach convention. This includes Miami, Coral Gables, North

Miami, South Miami, and Opalacka.

Second in numbers was the Tampa
Bay area, including Tampa, St.
Pete, Largo, New Port Richey.
Lakeland, Winter Haven, Bradenton,

and Clearwater. This area probably has the densest a square fance population of any isimilar sized area in the state.

The Fort La derdale area, including Hollywood, Dania, and Pompano, supplied the third larg-

est group of dancers.


