TOMMY AND ANNETTE THO PSON PRESENT FOLK DANCE WORKSHOP

Also Substitute for Abe Kanegson In Presenting Contra Workshop

Due to the illness of Abe Kanegeon, who was scheduled to present the Contra Workshop at the Convention, Tommy and Annette Thompson did double duty.

They took over the Contra workshop, at the request of Jimmy Clossin, in addition to their Folk Dance Workshop. Both workshops were held in the ballroom of the Orange Court Hotel, one following the other. The beliroom was full.

Tommy writes, "We had one of the nicest contra groups to work with good time, and enough went wrong tothat we have ever had. We had six contra lines formed, with 7 or 8 couples in each, and we couldn't have got anyone else on the floor. We did four contras during the workshop, and the crowd was right with us all the way."

The four contras taught were: Good Girl, Washington's Quickstep, Jefferson's Reel, and Judge's Jig.

At the Folk Dance Workshop, immediately following, three dances were taught: Zigeuner Polka (Swiss Couple Dance); Square Tango (English Old Time Gouple Dance); and Jaeger Marsch, or Hunter's March,

"Jimmy had places on the evening program for a dence taught in each of the workshops, which I thought was a good idea. We used the Zigeuner Polka for the one to dance that night, and a lot of people were out there doing it."

(Hunter's March)

Record: T-6123 Jaegermarsch

(As presented by Towny and Annette Thompson in the
Folk Dance Workshop, Fourth Annual Florida Square and
Folk Dence Convention, Orlando.)

Part 1. Couples, side-by-side and arm-in-arm, march around the
circle in counterclockwise direction for 32 steps.

Part 2. Drop hands. Ladies face the other way (clockwise), and all march in opposite directions, clapping hands like cymbals, for 32 steps. Men clap on the beat, ladies on the off-beat (or vice versa). Note that the ladies are on the outside of the circle, moving clockwise, the men on the inside moving counterclockwise.

Part 3. Take person nearest you for a waltz (16 measures of music).
Those having no partner go into the center of the circle to find one.

(This Telefunken record is imported, and if your dealer cannot supply, it may be obtained from Folk Dance House, 108 West 16th St., New York City 11, N.Y. The "J" in the name of the dance is pronounced as a "Y".

ZIGEUNER POLKA Swiss Couple Dance (Gypsy Schottische)
Record: MH-1056 or Kis-139

- Part 1.: Partners facing, man's back to center, hands on hips, each person takes one schottische step (R,L,R, Hop) to own right, and one schottische moving swd back to own left. Each then turns, individually, to own right twice around on the spot, with a R,hop,L,hop,R,hop,L,hop.
- Part 2. Hands crossed in front in skater's position, partners move forward in LOD with 2 schottische steps and 4 step-hops, beginning with R foot.

Repeat Part 2.

(Man begins with L foot in parts 3 and 4)

- Partners facing each other in closed dance position, man leads the lady from his right side to his left side, twd. center of the ctrcle, with one schott. step; then back to his right side with one schott. step. Remaining in closed position, couple turns clockwise twice around with 4 step-hops. (Opp. footwark)
- Fort 4. Pthrs separate, and with hands on hips move diagonally fwd and away from each other with 1 schotti step, then fwd and diagonally back together with one schottische step. Facing, they take shoulder-waist position and turn clockwise twice around with 4 step-hops (Opposite footwork)

  Repeat Part 4.

# More of Your DANCE SWAP SHOP

"Dear Harold,

After I called this dence at the Orlando Convention I was deluged for copies of this call just as I called it... Thought you might like to to answer through BOW AND SWING. I pass a lot of the credit for the way it went over to Bil's Four Straws; they really supported me. "

And so, here it is, just as Watie Galls it:-

INSIDE TWO, RIGHT AND LEFT THRU

All join hands and circle right
And when you're home hold on tight
First ole couple rip and snort Go down the center and out 'em short The foot lots loose and don't get sore
Now you've got two lines of four.

The inside two do a right and left thru Chain the ladies back, you do All four gents half sashey Forward up and back that way Forward again, right and left thru Chain the ladies down the line Now chain them across and not too slow Now chain them home, why there's your beau. Allemende left, etc.

(Repeat for 2, 3, and 4. The circling can now be omitted, if the dancers understand to quickly join hands to rip and snort.)

Use a closer with an allemende thar, etc.

# Optional methods of getting lines of four, same formation:

First and third go forward and back, Split your corners, around just one, Stand four in line.

First and third go forward and back, Forward again, cross trail through, Go up the outside around just two, Box the gnat, stand four in line.

TYPE OF DANCE Singing Square Dance

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OPENER, MIDDLE BREAK and CLOSER:

TURN YOUR CORNER BY THE LEFT. YOUR PARTNER RIGHT HAND WHIRL PASS YOUR CORNER RIGHT ON BY, AND SWING WITH THAT NEXT GIRL ALLEMAND LEFT YOUR CORNER, GRAND OLD RIGHT AND LEFT FROM THERE WHEN YOU MEET - YOU PROMENADE, A BRAND NEW LADY FAIR (All sing) "FOR SHE'S GOT NO HEART AT ALL, NO HEART AT ALL" WALK ALONG 'TIL YOU GET HOME WITH BABY . . . DO-SA-DO AND DON'T GET LOST, LADIES RIGHT HAND STAR ACROSS YOU SWING NOW WITH THE DOLL, THAT'S GOT NO HEART AT ALL

KEY: E-flat

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Turn corner left forearm swing, turn partner right forearm swing, pass corner right shoulders and swing next (opposite) who becomes temporary partner. Allemand left, grand right and left, meet new partner and promenade to mens' home positions. Do-sa-do partners, ladies star right to opposite gent where all swing original partners in home position

### FIGURE:

FIRST AND THIRD RIGHT AND LEFT THRU, AND TURN 'EM AROUND THERE, MEN GO TO THE RIGHT, A RIGHT AND LEFT THRU, NOW TURN 'EM TWICE AND THEN -LET THE LADIES WHIRLAWAY, BOX THE GNAT WITH THE RIGHT HAND GAL SWING THIS MISS AND HUG 'n' KISS, THEN CIRCLE ROUND THE HALL (All sing) "FOR SHE'S GOT NO HEART AT ALL, NO HEART AT ALL" GENTS STAR RIGHT AND GET ON BACK TO BABY . . . TURN HER LEFT, ROLL PROMENADE, HEAD FOR HOME NOW WITH YOUR MAID YOU'RE DANCIN' WITH A DOLL THAT'S GOT NO HEART AT ALL

Couples 1 and 3 right and left thru, same couples go to current right hand couples with a right and left thru, turning twice around. Ladies whirlaway in front of partner to his left hand side, gents box gnat with lady on their right side at moment of call, then swing the same lady, acquiring a new partner (original right hand lady). All join hands and circle left, gents star right back to new partner with a left hand turn rolling into a promenade back to gents' home positions

REPEAT FIGURE WITH HEAD COUPLES ACTIVE AGAIN REPEAT OPENER FOR MIDDLE BREAK EXCEPT TO SUBSTITUTE FIRST TWO LINES AS FOLLOWS:

SWING THE CORNER LADY, BOYS, HER HEART'S A BURNING FLAME SWING THE NEXT ONE DOWN THE LINE, SHE PLAYS A WAITING GAME

> REPEAT FIGURE WITH SIDE COUPLES ACTIVE REPEAT FIGURE WITH SIDE COUPLES ACTIVE AGAIN REPEAT OPENER FOR CLOSER
