Your editor has been faced with two big problems, lack of time and rising costs. For over six years BOW AND SWING has been published at One Dollar for ten issues, Paper and other magerials cost more, BOW AND SWING wasn't meant as a money making proposition, but it must just about pay its own way, and ought to buy the editor a cup of coffee

now and then,

Frankly, I had to decide whether to suspend entirely, raise the price, or reduce the number of issues per year, I hated to suspend, because there are many who value the publication. One dollar is a nice price for those who don't like to write a check or get a money order. Reducing the number of issues per year seemed the best means to eliminate part of the cost and allow enough time, Due to changing my status as a teacher, I'm having to take qite a bit of University Extens ... sion work for certification, and will be for another year, But with two less issues a year, I believe I can manage the time and get out a better publication, more nearly on time, and with just as much material per year, The savings in postage will offset the higher cost of materials,

As I see it now, single issues will be published for Novwmber, December, January, and February, the months which will attempt to carry a Calendar, From March or April till October any Calendar is bound to be very inaccurate, so we have not carried it in the past. Those would be the combined issues: March-April, May-June, July-August, and

September-October.

So--after June 1 -- Eight issues for a dollar. Subscriptions received before June 1 will be credited with ten issues for a dollar. (No subscription for more than 30 issues can be accepted at this price.) ***

Even the one subscriber who is already paid fifty issues (5 years) ahead could conceivably extend for another thirty issues at the old rate.

Besides his class mentioned elsewhere and his Wednesday night dance at Stuart, Herb Cassell has a Thursday night closed group which meets at the YWCA and works with some of the more advanced dances.

Jim Pearson of St. Pete has two classes a week for the City Recreation Department: a beginners' class on Monday nights, Progressive on Thursday.
