Clearwater Prepares for Sixth Annual Convention

ARNIE KRONENBERGER of Los Angeles will be the featured caller and master of ceremonies of the evening dances for the Sixth Annual Florida Square Dance Convention to be held for three days beginning May 30 at Clearwater.

Headquarters hotel will be the Fort Harrison and square dance and round dance workshops will be held at Roebbling hall and the city auditorium; all three buildings are within easy walking distance. Both halls are air conditioned.

Kronenberger will hold the square dance workshops, and the music of Jay Fenimore and his musicians will be used for the evening dances. Other features of the program include fashion shows, swap shops, callers clinics, after-dance hoodlums, perhaps an Idiot party.

Fee for all convention activities is \$2.50 per person, and advance reservations should be made directly to Howard Miller, 3707 San Pedro, Tampa, Florida. Be sure to enclose your name and address. Hotel reservations should be made directly with the Fort Harrison, using blank on the inside page.

Members of the Dixie Swingers and Clearwater Crackers dance clubs plan a pre-convention dance Thursday evening, May 29, with Callers' Prexy Bill Muench at the microphone. The dance will be held in Roebbling hall, with admission at \$1.75 per couple. Ed and Kay Mack will handle the rounds, and a number of groups are understood to be planning Knthead attendance at the affair.

Florida Callers' President Bill Muench of Tampa is general chairman of the convention. Jim Pearson of St. Petersburg is program chairman. Bob Mosher and Kay Mack are co-chairmen of publicity, assisted by the following area

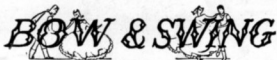

Interesting Experiment Planned at Short Course

DANCERS—here's something for your non-dancing friends. The executive committee of the Florida Callers Association, meeting in Ocala on January 12th, voted to cooperate with the various dancers associations of the state and the General Extension Division of Florida in carrying out an experimental project in conjunction with the Fourth Annual Square, Round, and Folk Short Course to be held at the University of Florida this July.

The regular Short Course will be held July 2nd through the 5th, with registration on July 1st. Registrations are already being received for this event.

The experimental project will commence Monday morning, the 30th of June. It is designed to accommodate beginners, persons who have not square danced before, or who have danced very little. Registration for this phase will be limited to four sets. It is hoped that each of the four dancers associations, in cooperation with local callers, will be able to furnish one set of dancers apiece for this project.

Beginners will register for the regular Short Course, but will start classes Monday and spend that day and Tuesday in concentrated teaching of fundamentals. They will be held in their own section on Wednesday, but on Thursday, Friday and Saturday they will join with the less-advanced section of the regular short course. The regular Short Course fee of \$15 per person will be charged each individual registering for the project; no extra charge will be made, except for the individual's expenses for board and room for the two additional days. Instructors for the experimental project, drawn from the Florida Callers Association, will be Bill Camp, Gene Baylis, and Bill Muench.

The experimental section should prove to be of particular interest to school teachers and recreation leaders, as well as to the many persons who may wish to avail themselves of this chance to learn square dancing. All square dancers are urged to bring this unusual opportunity to the attention of their non-dancing friends and to encourage them to place their applications early with Dr. Robert Fairing, General Extension Division of Florida, 808 Seagle Building, Gainesville, Florida. Any who have questions are urged to write Dr. Fairing or Dr. Ernest R. Bartley, 1050 Southwest 11th Street, Gainesville.

We Grow

TWO ISSUES back your editor prepared an editorial entitled "Did Your Story Get Left Out?" explaining some of the problems we have had in editing BOW & SWING within the limitations of the advertising volume. The editorial was crowded out. It would have run in February but it was crowded out. So, in April, with our "extra" we thought it would get in, but no—too much news!

It is obvious to nearly everybody that editorially B & S is meeting a real need—the loyalty of our very prolific correspondents is amazing (usually the enthusiasm burns out in a few weeks). The response from subscribers is ample proof of the success of the idea, and new advertisers in each issue suggest the ultimate success of the venture. Suffice it to say that when advertising can be developed to carry 12 pages each issue, we should reach the break-even point; likewise, we can handle more nearly all of the news that is submitted.

This issue is an "extra." That means that subscribers will receive it as a bonus; it is being published as a public service. However, the publishing program for BOW & SWING effective in October will be 8 issue a year; we hope to make it 10 issues a year in 1959. So subscription rates are being changed through this transition period to \$2.00 for 10 issues, or \$5.00 for 40 issues. Whether we publish 6, 8 or 10 issues, subscribers will get what they pay for. Existing subscriptions will be handled in two ways: Former subscribers to the mimeographed publication will receive issue-for-issue based on their original subscription; subscribers since November of 1957 (to April 1, 1958) will receive year-for-year regardless of the number of issues. The Hayloft Offers Accommodations for Miami Dance Groups

MIAMI'S SILVER SPURS square dance club needed a hall that would match their pocketbook and as a result Miami now has her first and only complete square dance hall, The Hayloft, located upstairs, at 285 N.W. 71st Street.

The hall is owned and operated by Caller George Campbell, and features a balcony for spectators, a lounge, air cooling facilities, and a hardwood floor.

Located in a manufacturing district, the Hayloft was formerly a lampshade factory. Members' efforts at cleaning and redecorating helped put the enterprise in working order, as Campbell negotiated the lease, furnished the materials.

The hall was opened in January, 1957, with Saturday club dances emphasizing high level dancing. Campbell is paid \$50 per week year 'round, and occasional visiting callers are supported by the club treasury. Fourteen squares are embraced by the membership—all the hall will hold.

Including in the visiting callers who have called for the club in recent months are Johnny LeClair, Johnny Barbour and Willie Harlan. The latter, a Cherokee Indian from Vinita, Oklahoma, was welcomed by Mike Osceola of the Seminoles and presented with a Seminole shirt.

Dance Classes in Ocala

If it were not for these members, whose shoulders at the wheel, Keep the Grand Squares moving, without a halt or reel—What would be the fate of dances, where we have so much to do? The Grand Squares would soon fold up—sans the ever-faithful few.

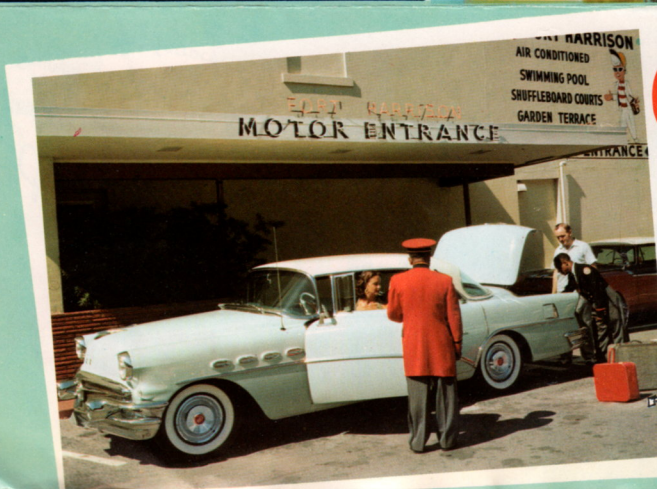

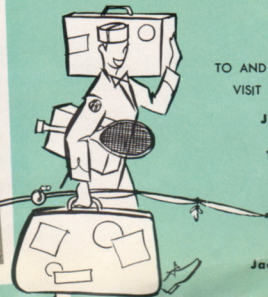

Of course you can make up your square and go—dance together all the time, "because," you explain, "We aren't so god yet and don't want to mess up

other dancers." Well, if you feel that way, change your outlook! There'll always be somebody better than you and somebody not quite so good. You accept help and learn from some and you give friendly assistance to others. Don't narrow your horizons.

If you *have* to be exclusive, don't bother yourself about going, just stay home, dance in your own hand picked square, look down your noses and watch the world go by, but, *you'll be sorry!*

It is good to hear so many reports on beginner classes—Miami has a nice one, using the multiple caller system also large ones in Winter Haven, St. Pete, Tampa, Clearwater and Daytona Beach.

Special mention should be given to "Grapefruit Moon," which was written by Myrtle Grace Eicher of Sarasota.

Round of the month is a catchy two-step routine arranged by Roger and Jean Knapp of Corpus Christi, according to Ed and Kay Mack of Clearwater who make the compilation for FCA and Bow & Swing. The record is "The Object of My Affections," Sets-in-Order 3104B, and on the flip side is a fast moving Viennese waltz written by Nita and Manning Smith.

POSITION: Loose Closed, M's back to COH; FOOTWORK: Opposite Directions for M; INTRO: Wait 2 meas; AFART, TOUCH, TOGETHER, TOUCH; TWO-STEP L, TWO-STEP R;

Measures

1-2-SIDE/CLOSE, SIDE/CLOSE, SIDE, SWING; SIDE, BEHIND, SIDE, TOUCH; Starting M's L and moving LOD to three slashes to L (step L to side, close R to L, step L to side, close R to L, step L to side and swing R across in front of L); moving RIOD still in loose closed position, step R to side, step L across in back of R, step R to side and touch L to R.

3-4-TWO-STEP, TWO-STEP; TWO-STEP, LOD STEP; IN FACING CLOSED position, facing two steps, two-two-steps LOD; end facing LOD.

6-SIDE/CLOSE, SIDE/CLOSE, SIDE, SWING; SIDE, BEHIND, SIDE, TOUCH; M moving to end COH and the two wall-swing away from each other (step like meas. 1); then gravine back together ending in CLOSED position. M's back to COH.

7-8-TWO-STEP, TWO-STEP; TWO-STEP, TWO-STEP; in closed position do two full R face turns in four-two-steps ending in loose closed position. M's back to COH.

9-16-REPEAT MEAS 1-8 ENDING IN FACING position; both hands joined, M's back to COH; 17-CLAP (TOUCH); TWO-STEP RIGHT; IN FACING position, M's back to COH, do a slow two-step to the L in LOD and touch R to L; Repeat to R in RIOD, ending in BANJO BUTTERFLY position.

19-20-AROUND TWO-STEP; AROUND TWO-STEP; Two slow two-steps moving around each other CW, end M's back to COH.

21-22-ROLL, 2 3, CLAP (TOUCH); ROLL BACK, 2 3, CLAP (TOUCH); MOVING LOD M rolls L face while W rolls R face a full turn to clap on fourth count as you touch R to L; roll back in LOD starting R and touch R to L; W turns L face, end in FACING position. M's back to COH and clap hands again weight on both feet.

23-24-(Clap Legs) SPAT/A, SPAT/SPAT, (Clap Partners) SPAT/A, SPAT/SPAT; (Clap Partners Hands) SPAT, SPAT, SPAT; In fast rhythm

two claps to each beat of music), clap R Hand on R thigh, clap L hand on L thigh, R on R thigh and L on L thigh (words "do/what, you/want...") clap own hands together four times against your partner's hands three times slowly (words-"I, dont, care...") take CLOSED pos. 25-32-REPEAT MEAS 1-8 but W do two R face twists on meas 8 as M walks 4 steps in LOD; end in CLOSED position M's back to COH. REPEAT ENTIRE FIGURE FOR A TOTAL OF TWO TIMES. END WITH TWO TWIRLS AND BOW.
