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

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Attend The Conventions

As we approach the season of conventions it is our earnest recommendation to square dancers throughout Florida that they plan to be present at Clearwater on the weekend of May 30-31. For one thing, a convention of the Florida Callers Association might be a dull affair if there were no one for the callers to call to. For another thing, this year will represent the first time in Florida square dance history that an organization of dancers will participate officially in the annual state meeting.

The next item on the convention-goers agenda is the national square dance convention in Louisville June 19-21. Florida callers are participating in the program of the national convention, and at this writing members of the Florida Federation of Square Dancers are determined to present formally an invitation for the national to be held in Miami Beach in 1960.

The Fourth of July weekend will feature the 1958 Florida Square Dance Short Short Course at the University of Florida in Gainesville, as well as the "Shares in Squares" institute being promoted at two Daytona hotels and supported by national promotion.

Beginning August 30 will be the annual Florida Knothead Convention in Clearwater. And sometime in the fall will be the offical annual meeting of the state dancers' federation. So it looks like a busy summer-even if you don't get an opportunity to take off for the Carolinas or Colorado or the Ozarks!

(Continued from page 2) we have been successful, and this has greatly increased our unity of purpose and lessened discord.

Largely, in planning big events on a statewide basis, the same lack of conflict has held sway. Perhaps events were too close together for comfort at times, but actual conflict of dates has been avoided. When annual events proved to be too close together in time, dates have even been changed for succeeding years.

Certainly such planning, and the unity that goes with it, should be extended. Bow AND SWING WOULD deplore any promotion of competing events which would destroy this unity, where a little thoughtfulness and planning could avoid it.

Ethics? To me, this is an important phase of it.

One of the most world-wide circulated books on square dancing is "West Texas Square Dances", by Jimmy Clossin and Carl Hertzog, first printed in 1938 under the title, "Honor Your Partner", and later changed to the above title. The same book was selected in 1950 by the English Folk Dance and Song Society as their guide to American square dancing, and published by G. Bell & Sons, Ltd., London, under title of "American Cowboy Square Dances." Anyone who has a copy of the American editions, regardless of printing or reprints, has a col

Early Registration is Urged For Clearwater Convention

SQUARE AND ROUND Dancers, Callers and Instructors who converge on Clearwater for the Memorial Day Weekend for the Sixth Annual Florida Square and Folk Dance Convention will find a smoothlyplanned program and excellent facilities in readiness.

Plans are being made to take care of ten or twelve hundred people during the convention, and accommodations at the Fort Harrison, headquarters hotel, were reported booked solid thirty days ahead.

Advance registrations (at \$2.50 per person) may be sent to W. Howard Miller, 3707 San Pedro, Tampa, to conserve time and relieve pressure on the registration desk. According to President Bill Muench of the Florida Callers' Association, two tables will be providedwith advance registrants in a separate queue to merely pick up their tickets.

While the convention officially em-

braces the annual meeting of the Callers association, an opportunity for dancers to get together will be provided at the breakfast meeting of the Florida Federation of Square Dancers beginning at 8:00 a.m. Saturday, May 31. President Harry Moore of Miami has prepared an interesting program including an address by Prof. Ernest Bartley of Gainesville, and music by the famous Clearwater Lions Dixieland Band, Tickets for the breakfast must be purchased at registration time at \$1.50 per person, including tax and gratuities.

On the eve of the convention (Thursday night, May 29) the local clubs will be host to a Trail's End Dance, and on Sunday, June 1 the Tampa Round Dance Club will hold its monthly session in the Clearwater Armory.

But the convention proper will consist of a full program on Friday and Satur-

day, May 30 and 31, with the meeting of the callers set for 10 a.m. Sunday, June

Arnie Kronenberger of Los Angeles, sales manager for Hav-a-lite Corporation, and staff member of Asilomar since its inception in 1951, will serve as master of ceremonies for the "Squarerama Number 1" which will be held in the city auditorium both evenings, and will conduct workshop sessions Friday morning and both afternoons.

Round dance eworkshops will be conducted by Gene and Ima Baylis of Miami, Kay and Ed Mack of Clearwater, and Isabelle and Ernest Ammerman of Tampa, and a folk and contra workshop will be directed by the Elbert

Running concurrently with the Squarerama in the city auditorium, will be 'Squarerama Number 2" in Roebling hall, featuring hot hash with records, both Friday and Saturday evenings.

Jam sessions following both evening dances are scheduled, and an Idiot party is also set following the Saturday night dance.

Kronenberger has emcee'd and called at state festivals in Montana and Kansas and along with Ray Smith of Dallas, Texas called for the first Golden State Roundup in Oakland, California.

Dancers Federation Offers Attractive Decal to Members

DECALCOMANIA transfers suitable for the inside of windshields or the outside of luggage, etc., are available to members of Florida Federation of Square Dancers. and President Harry Moore of Miami Beach hopes to have 2000 of them on cars throughout Florida by the end of the state convention in Clearwater Memorial Day weekend.

The Miami Convention bureau has completed preparation of a formal invitation to bring the National Square Dance Convention to the Magic City in 1960. Coincidentally it was learned that Albuquerque, New Mexico, will also extend an invitaton for the 1960 meeting.

The federation breakfast in the Blue Room of the Fort Harrson Saturday, May 31 may feature presentation of an award to one couple in each regional association in recognition of service in the promotion of square dancing.

Introduced in the Southeast Florida group, the idea may be expanded to other groups on a state-wide basis, if plans of President Moore can be carried

Directors of the federation approved an initial purchase of 5,000 decals (see illustration at right) and directors of the state's four regional associations underwrote the initial purchase of 1000 decals for distribution to their members.

The federation sets no price on the stickers, but the Southeast Florida and Central Florida associations are selling them at 10 cents each. A markup of 100% will be allowed the regional bodies after their initial commitment has



been distributed.

"Everyone in business should have a decal on their show window or door,' Moore says, pointing out that 2000 decals on dancers' automobiles will provide 2000 moving advertisements.

"This is only the beginning," Moore continues. "Every business displaying the decal should have the current Bow & Swing club directory available to provide information about names, meeting times, and visitor policy of clubs in the neighborhood.

"With the interest that will come from these decals and our square dance publicity in the newspapers, we should treble our dancers by the end of the year."

The decal deseign was created by Bert Bennett, 14701 N.E. 5th Court, in North Miami, a caller and commercial

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
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Fashion Show

It is a progressive two-step mixer with the gentleman and lady having two partners in each dance sequence. Tune is McGregor's 808-B; with "The Breeze" a two-step, on the flip side. The dance was written by Roberta and Bob Van Antwerp of Long Beach, Cal., and has been selected by the California Workshop as a dance of the month.

POSITION: Open; FOOTWORK: Opposite; INTRO: Wait 2 measures;

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ON THE CORNER

THERE HAS been much discussion lately about clubs and how they fit into the square dancing picture. Let's look at them.

The idea caught on all over the country and had a great deal to do with the rapid growth of modern square dancing. Now, clubs are formed for various reasons. A class has enjoyed learning together and wants to stay together so they form a club. Or a group wants to do a particular level of dancing, again, it may be age—such as the teen clubs or the over 60's also neighborhood groups often band together.

Do callers like clubs? Most of them, yes. A caller is often overworked and underpaid. Of course he likes what he is doing or he wouldn't continue with it. When a caller conducts an open dance it is his responsibility to find a hall, see that it is clean and everything is in working order. On dance nights he has to be there to open up and stay to lock up. But, when he calls for a club—he arrives in time to set up and call the dance and that is it. The club does the dirty work.

Are clubs good for square dancing? Definitely! Normally there is a certain percentage of people who quit dancing for various reasons. The main ones being health, family or civic responsibilities, or moving to other locations. Clubs, in order to replace their loss must keep new members coming in. Many of them sponsor a beginners class or a roundup each year. They bring in their frineds and acquaintances and introduce them to their favorite pastime.

"And the person who does not belong to any club, or who pays his dues but does no work, is not carrying his fair load, no matter what he pays. Under our system he is a Square Dancing Freeloader."—Allie Manleft.

(Continued from page 5) lector's item, as they have been out of print since 1950, and few copies remain to be found. Jimmy's collection of books, some 150 on square and folk dancing, date back a hundred years.

George Campbell...

GEORGE CAMPBELL, of Miami, was born on Friday the 13th, January 1913, but he does not believe in bad luck.

George and his wife, Anne, attended their first square dance in the little town

of Neenah, Wis. He liked it so well that shortly after that, he started calling. Although a native of Florida, his work in Marine Airconditioning his taken him to many places since the war. Having become a permanent caller for his first

club in 1949, he was an active member of the Callers Council of the Wisconsin State Callers Assn. and Dancers Workshop. The next few years he spent attending workshops, callers clinics and institutes studying voice.

George and Anne returned to Miami to live permanently in 1953. He started an open dance at Vasa Hall, organizing classes to help build up square dancing in the area. Working with the Miami Beach Recreation Department he taught dancing in the parks, often working without pay. He served as president of the Southeastern Callers Assn. With his Circle Eighters he gave many shows at the hotels on the Beach, including a sponsored TV show called the Rhythm Ranch and the PM Rancho weekly shows.

Fred Christopher...

SQUARE DANCE teacher to 35,000 dancers in the past 21 years! That's the unusual record held by Fred Christopher of St. Petersburg.

Fred started calling square dances in September, 1936. By December of that year, he was working with Radio Station WLS with the National Barn Dance program. During the four years he was with them, he traveled over three states, Illinois, In-

He has had his own radio program called The Squares, which ran up to two full hours Saturday nights on WSUN Radio, St. Pete.

"I still get the same big thrill as I did when I called my first square dance back in 1936." Fred said.

Jack Davis...

JACK DAVIS is an extremely active and able caller in the Palm Beach area.

Not only is this young man known for his versatility in singing calls, patter as well as hot bash but he is as adept at teaching the latest round dance of the month. Jack began calling in 1954. He soon took three sets of Junior High stud-

ents under his wing and presented them as an exhibition group at the Florida State convention. Jack has devoted much time to beginners classes, and his Wednesday night Workshop is a favorite for dancers of all levels.

Besides his being "Big Chief" in his Thunderbird Square Dance Club he calls for the Riviera Beach Dudes and Dolls and the Howard Park Club in West Palm Beach, Also coaches the "Shindiggers," consisting of two sets of cloggers out of the Thunderbird Club.

With the help of his wife, Eleanor he conducts an advanced round dance class known as the Satellites.

In October 1957 he was elected Vice President of the Southeast Florida Square and Folk Dance Leaders. Soon after he was selected as a member of the Educational Advisory Council for the Florida Short Course at Gainesville by the President of the Florida callers.

Jack with his wife and daughter had a successful tour in the North this summer. His engagements included dances at Fairmount, Minn; South Bend, Ind; Westlake and Cleveland, Ohio.

The Waterworths are considered the couple having the record of being the oldest, longest time exponent of the Western style of square dancing.


Sam Prescott
