

Dancers, Callers, Join for Big Weekend at Daytona

ADVANCE registration for the Daytona Beachcombers' Seaside Square Dance Weekend have led to arrangements for air-conditioned facilities in the Princess Issena Hotel in addition to the air-conditioned Marine Room of the Daytona Plaza Hotel according to Chuck Lichtenberger. President of the Beachcombers.

We want to provide ample facilities for any eventuality," Lichtenberger told Bow & Swing, adding that the management of the two big Daytona Beach hotels was cooperating in every way to provide accomodations for all who wish to attend.

Invitations handed out by the Beachcombers at the Knotheads' Convention in Clearwater included a small package of beach sand: "Put this sand in your shoes and think of the fun you are missing if you can't join the dancers at Daytona Scot 98 97".

The big weekend is Sept. 26 and 27, and is in conjunction with the annual meetings of the Florida Callers Association and the Florida Federation of Square Dancers, both scheduled for 10 a.m. Sunday. Sept. 28.

A single registration of \$2.50 per couple includes dancing Friday evening, Saturday morning and afternoon, a ball Saturday might, followed by refreshments and an after-midnight jam session. Through the cooperation of the Central Florida Square Dancers Association, the state-wide reciprocity resolution applies, and good-standing members of all affiliated regional dancers' associations will be admitted at a special rate of \$2.00 per couple.

By special arrangement the Plaza pool is included in the package and a bright, full September moon is promised.

Following the Sunday morning meetings of the callers' and dancers' groups, both bodies are expected to join for luncheon, and tickets may be arranged for at time of registration. Advance tickets may be purchased through federation headquarters at Kissimmee at \$1.50 per plate.

Reservations for hotel accommodations may be sent directly to the Daytona Plaza at special rates of \$9.00 double and \$6.00 single, children under 12 free.

The Dancers association has set up another teaching and square dancing program for the Miami recreation department at the Grapeland Heights community center, 37 Avenue and 15 Street, N.W. in spite of hot weather the association's program at Miami Shores has drawn five squares each week. Members of the Southeast Florida Callers Association are used in all of these dances.

Other officers include Phil Frager, Miami, Harley Sanderson, Fort Lauderdale and Bob Doe, West Palm Beach, vice presidents; Catherine Plevnic of Miami, corresponding secretary, Hazel Bennett of Miami, recording secretary, and Kitty Dye of Miami, treasurer.



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

Directors of the Central Florida Square Dancers Association at a recent meeting agreed to use some of the association funds for direct assistance in promoting classes for beginners.

The association will furnish (within limits) the money necessary for hiring a hall for the purpose of introducing square dancing to beginners with two stipulations:

1. there must be an instructor ready to proceed with a course of instruction on a regular basis; and

2. there must be a local club actively behind the program.

This particular arrangement leaves the instructor free to handle the fees in his own way, and provides the support of a third-party for promotion, thus relieving the association or club of any financial responsibility for the class, and relieving the instructor of much of the responsibility for advertising and promotion.

In Miami, the Southeast Florida association has made some progress toward sponsoring public classes under the recreation departments; a rotating system whereby a standard course of study is covered by a number of different instructors has also been tried.

Throughout Florida we have been advised of new classes being started for beginners . . . recruiting time is here!

Bow & Swing's November issue will feature recruiting, and local clubs, instructors, and dance leaders are invited to send simple case histories showing how they have met with success (or failure) in various recruiting activities. 538 Attend 2d Knothead Convention

KNOTHEADS from all parts of Florida converged on Clearwater for the Labor Day weekend to hold their second annual convention with the Fort Harrison hotel as headquarters and utilizing the air conditioned facilities of Roebling Hall and

berry of Blue Springs, Mo., as the the featured kaller. was made an honorary member of Florida Knotheads during an impromptu ceremony near the close of the Saturday night

ball. Alsoinitiated were Opal and Ruth Faulkenberry, wife and 10-year-old daugher of the caller.

Bill Muench, member of the charter square, declared that total membership of Florida Knotheads had soared over the 1800-mark in the weeks prior to the convention as dancers scurried back and forth across the state in an effort toward eleventh-hour qualifying.

Faulkenberry endeared himself to the callers present by presenting each with a mimeographed copy of 25 unpublished square dance figures and one unpublished basic, and delighted dancers with some five workshop and dance sessions in which he rarely repeated himself.

Muench was assisted by Jim Galloway of Lutz, as program chairman, and Ed Mack of Clearwater, as round dance coordinator. Gene and Ima Baylis of Miami and Isabel and Ernest Ammerman of Tampa were on the instructional staff for rounds, presenting "Lovers Two-Step" "(We Just Couldn't Say Goodbye) "One Kiss," (SH-3141), "Skipping Along," (SIO-X3105B) along with instruction on "Nights of Vienna" "Kit Kat," and a dozen others of some popularity.

A number of callers from throughout the state shared the microphone with Muench for a special Friday night preconvention dance staged by three Clearwater clubs in Roebling Hall, and also provided calling for the jam sessions Saturday and Sunday nights.

A breakdown of registrations showed that 345 were from West Coast areas (predominantly Tampa), 67 from Central Florida, 54 from Northwest Florida, 37 from Southeast Florida, four from West Florida, 27 from Southwest Florida, two from California, and two from Missouri.

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TV is Used for Square Dance Teaching in Jax

A PIONEERING effort to teach and promote square dancing through the use of television will begin Sept. 29 at 9:30 p.m. when the first half-hour show of a fif-

teen weeks series will be aired over Jacksonville's new-est station. Channel 7, WJCT. The series, entitled "Swing Your Partner," is sponsored by the Northeast Florida Square Dancers Association in cooperation with the callers of that area.

Each half hour show will combine instruction in square dance basics, variety materials, and square and round dance demonstrations. Emphasis will be placed on the broad gauge appeal of square dancing for all age groups. While square dancing as such has become more or less common-place on television, this program represents one of the first efforts in the nation to utilize television as an instructional medium.

Beginning classes, will utilize Jacksonville callers on the nights following the television show. The basic materials of the previous evening's show will be utiliized in these classes. One small experimental class will meet the night of the show, with the class "tuned in" during the half hour the show is on the air. Much interest has been shown by various educational and recreational agencies and groups in Florida and around the country in the instructional aspects of this program.

The series is produced and will be instructed and Mc'd by Dr. Ernest "Bart" Bartley of Ga'nesville. Bart was one of the first persons in the nation to produce a square dance radio show and he has had considerable television experience. Square dance calling and teaching is a hobby with him and his pretty wife, Ruth. By profession he is a political scientist. with a national reputation for his writing and consulting work. Even here he frequently combines hobby and business, for he called square dances in Alaska while serving as consultant to the Alaska Constitutional Convention and Statehood Committee.

Harold Pillmore, Bill Fletcher, and Walter Martin of Jacksonville comprise the television committee of the Northeast Florida Square Dancers Association. Jacksonville dancers will serve in the many on and off-camera capacities necessary to getting the show on the air.

Howdy All

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ON THE CORNER

Vacation time is over—school time is here . That is the pattern we live by—it has also become the pattern of the square dance world . . Callers and round dance leaders have found summer classes in most areas to be a waste of time and energy . . . vacations, visitors, and hot weather mean poor attendance

... One class missed in a 10 week course means a loss of one tenth of the basics, 2 classes one fifth . Often it is easier for the absentee to drop out than to try to catch up... To remedy this situation most callers and leaders are scheduling classes to begin in the fall ... So—dancers take notice! Class roundup time is here.

Formerly the caller rounded up the classes but now the dancers have taken over much of that responsibility . . . They recognize the fact that their favorite pastime must keep growing . . . in order to grow it must be fed . . This calls for beginners-they are obtained from classes, so we must promote classes... It isn't easy to get friends and acquaintances to enroll in a class, you can't push, you must lead-let them sell themselves. . Take them to a dance as spectators, let them see the fun and friendliness... Have a patio party or a club party for prospects...Do some dancing, keep it simple and enjoy it with them...When the class opens go with them the first night, from then on it won't be necessary....It becomes the responsibility of the teacher to make things so interesting and enjoyable they don't want to miss a night...When the time comes to go out and dance-go with them a time or two, show them the ropes... The teacher has told them what to do and what to expect but they lack confidence in their own ability to carry through . They will appreciate your helping hand. . You will also be surprised at how soon they will "know it all" but be patient, that is a phase which

There are two things that should be impressed on every prospetive dance. .. First, a beginner is one who has finished a beginner class ... Many people have the mistaken idea that they are beginners the first night of a class and upon graduating they are dancers... This mistake leads to embarrassing situations and hurt feelings.

Second, to become a good dancer get out and go places...Don't dance with the same caller all of the time...No matter who he is or how good he is he can't present everything in the square dancing picture...He is only human, he has his likes and dislikes too, he uses the material he prefers...By dancing to other callers you obtain a well rounded program which is what it takes to make an experienced dancer.. Of course

you will prefer a certain caller, you will be associated with a certain group or club, your loyalty is there-that is good. But also make an effort to see the rest of the square dancing world ...Don't be afraid of offending a caller by dancing elsewhere... Progressive callers advocate visiting around.

The ambition of every beginner is to become an experienced dancer—get out and go, and that ambition will soon become a reality.—Allie Manleft.

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Lindstroms Founded Western Style Dancing on Gulf Coast

FOREVER ENSHRINED in the deep freeze of the memory of countless Floridians who have enthusedly discovered the delights and therapeutic values of square dancing, is the name of Trailer Estate's caller Bob Lindstrom.

To the tuneful cadence of songs that were old when the nation was new, Bob and his wife, Bella, are revered as the founders of square dancing on Florida's West Coast. There are few devotees of "Allemande left" and "Do si Do" presently dancing in the Sunshine state and across America who haven't been initiated into the primrose path of terpsichorian dalliance by this hard-working team of teachers.

Under the guiding hand of educators like Lindstrom, square dancing has come down out of the haymow and taken a step upward as a purely American art form. Evidence of this is seen in its acceptance in the curriculums of the adult education programs of high schools, its incorporation in the curricula of all major universities, including the University of Florida, where it has become a most popular course.

Lindstrom teaches at Trailer Estates and the Sarasota High School evening classes in this diversion, and neither Bob or his lady ever dreamed that life would come to this when Bob retired from operating a successful retail food business in Idaho Falls, Idaho, back in 1948.

In younger years Bob and Bella had cut a caper at a few barn dances back in the land of the Idaho potato, but when they retired and moved to Palm Springs, California, they decided they were too old for such "foolishness."

But owing to the boredom that sometimes is a by-product of retirement, they eventually joined a beginner's class, and, like thousands of others who thought dancing days were behind them, the Lindstroms discovered that the "Promenades" and "Swing your Lady" were immense fun and prevented premature hardening of the arteries brought on by sittin' and starin' in the rockin' chair.

After progressing through a series of square dance studies, Bob returned to his home town and introduced his fellow citizens to modern western square dancing. Soon, Lindstrom's pupils were staging exhibitions, and the community became hopelessly addicted to the tuneful scrapings of the fiddle and the commands of the caller.

Then Bob was invited to Arizona to do his stuff. It wasn't to his liking, nor did he feel "among his own" until he moved to Florida. Here the Lindstroms introduced western square dancing in the big Kiwanis Mobile Home Park in Bradenton. It was an instant success, and senior citizens deserted their trailers, put aside their canes and ailments, and filled the big hall.

The May issue of TRAILER TOPICS MAGAZINE, national publication serving mobile home owners and trailer parks across the country, carries a full-length feature story on square dancing in Florida.

Written by Harry J. Miller, President of Sarasota's Grand Squares, the article traces the growth of square dancing in the Sunshine state and its current popularity in America's trailer parks. It highlights the therapeutic values of this modern recreational art form and traces the influence of callers and teachers like Bob Lindstrom, Bill Cook and others in creating, fostering and perpetuating interest in square dancing.

Then popular demand drew Bob to teach classes in Tampa, Sarasota, Venice and other West Coast areas. And when the dancing trailerites returned to their Northern and Western homes, they found that a person who learns square dancing in Florida can follow dance patterns in any state in the Union. Lindstrom, proponent of nationwide standards for the popular diversion, has helped, through the various state societies, to create rules as rigid as those for baseball or any other athletic activity.

Much in demand as a caller, Bob puts the dancers through the varied patterns, the while Mrs. Lindstrom soothes the worried, encourages the timid and extends individual instruction to "Hardly Ables."

Bob delights in recounting cases of people whe entered their golden years of retirement physically ill and emotionally

It requires couples and if some gay widower or widow wants to trip the light fantastic, it means a search for a partner, who, like Barkis, is 'willin."
