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

Bow & Swing regrets that it cannot present these various expressions in this issue, but the pressure of spot news is too great. Extra copies of this issue, for distribution at Denver, will assist in expressing Florida's desire to entertain the nation's square dancers.

The Florida Federation of Square Dancers has become a strong organization, deserving and achieving the respect of the dancers of the state. Four strong regional associations, affiliated with the state body, carry organized square dancing down to the local dancer groups.

Equally well organized is the Florida Callers Association, and both groups have met the test of cooperatively staging what is agreed to be the finest state convention ever held last month in Miami Beach.

The unmatched physical facilities of Miami Beach, the human resources available in an enthusiastic and energetic dancer organization, the fullest cooperation of the callers and instructors, and Florida's international reputation for being a good host-these all combine to complete Florida's invitation for the 1961 National Square Dance Convention.

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Full Schedule of Square Dance

DANCERS IN Florida will have virtually unlimited opportunity to attend the sort of square dance institutes or camps which have proven popular throughout the country in recent years, with at least half a dozen such affairs planned for the summer and fall.

The Central Florida Square Dancers Association will hold a one-day institute in Kissimmee May 23 (with Orlando clubs planning a pre-institute dance on Friday evening) at which the emphasis will be on squares and rounds for the advancing adncer. The pitch is frankly toward the large number of beginning dancers who have been graduated in Central Florida. The affair culminates with the association's annual election ball, and includes a fashion show luncheon at noontime.

On the following day, May 24, a Sunday afternoon workshop is planned at Shell Point, Ruskin, by Bill and Ruthe Muench of Tampa and Ed and Kay

Mack of Clearwater.

The Memorial Day Weekend will see the "Clar-Aqua-Nar" under direction of Bill Muench, Kay and Ed Mack, and Sam Prescott, in a 4-session workshop for advanced dancers. Sessions will be held in the Clearwater Marina and in Roebling Hall, both air conditioned. Accord-

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Callers, Dancers, Give **Nod to Winter Haven**

A TOTAL of 1706 registrations, including 763 spectators, made the seventh annual Florida Square Dance Convention the largest in Florida square dance history, with more than 100 squares filling the Miami Beach auditorium at peak periods during the two-day festival.

Only the absence of the heralded Melody Ramblers marred the affair which was followed on Sunday, May 2 by business meetings of the Florida Callers Association and the Florida Federation of Square Dancers.

The dancers' directors met informally to agree on general procedure and joined with the callers to work out details for the 1960 state convention and review prospects for the 1961 National Square Dance Convention, official invitation for which is being extended at month's end at Denver

An invitation to hold the callers' annual meeting in Winter Haven in October was accepted, with date to be announced later. Presumably the dancers' federation will follow with announcement of their annual meeting on coinciding dates. A jamboree dance for the Saturday evening preceding is planned.

Callers' by-laws prohibit holding the state convention in the same area two successive years, but Gene Baylis suggested that a typographical error on Bow & Swing's May cover may have been the reason no invitation was extended by Miami Beach to return in 1960. After some debate the callers approved a dancer proposal to allow the latter group to have full responsibility (within limitations) for the 1960 convention. It was broadly hinted that the 1960 convention may well return to Miami Beach if for no other reason than there are very few cities with facilities to accommodate it.

President Bill Camp presided at the meeting which was held in the Delano Hotel beginning at 10 a.m., and it was after 3 p.m. before adjournment could be reached.

The state's adult education program has given important support to square dancing and the prospect of its being swept aside by an economy-minded legislature was discussed. No formal action was taken, but dancers interested were encouraged to write their legislators concerning the program. Miami Caller George Campbell suggested use of the term "modern square dancing" instead of "western style square dancing" as a means of creating a more satisfactory public image and to counteract the effect of so-called "beer-parlor" square danc-

With reference to the Callers' Workshop, Committee Chairman Gordon Blaum recommended the committee be

Dancer-Caller Relations Explored

A NEW feature at the 1959 state convention was a seminar on dancer-caller relations at which President Carl Heath of the Florida Federation of Square Dancers served as moderator.

It was suggested that callers, in their classes of instruction with new dancers could help in two or three areas:

1. Goofing-Teach the new dancers that when they are in a square and someone goofs-do not get mad-insulting -upset or disturbed, but just laugh it off and go on with the dance. After all it is not that serious. It was brought out that a lot of the old dancers could really use this education program too.

2. Making Up Tips In Advance-It was generally agreed among those present that it was perfectly all right to make up the NEXT tip with people that they would like to dance with, but no more than just the next one. They thought that this would help a couple to get around and dance with more different people in one evening.

3. Square Filled Or Not?-An educational program put on by Club Callers

and teachers so that a couple could tell whether they were wanted in a square or not. When squares are made up in advance for the next tip and one or two of the couples are across the hall when the square is formed a universal system should be used to let the other dancers who are not in prearranged squares know this to prevent confusion and embarrassment. The system suggested—If the square is made up and no others are needed, DO NOT HOLD UP A HAND. The dancers would then know not to try to step into a square even tho it was not at present full unless there was a hand up.

It was brought out that in some clubs it was difficult-if not impossible-for the dancers to talk to their caller about problems. The suggested solution in these cases was that the president of the club appoint two couples (known to everyone) to act as dancer-caller liaison. The members could then take their information to them and they could pass it on to the caller and he would not know where it came from.

rotated every 6 months, declared Florida callers were furnishing little new material for the mimeographed publication.

The association agreed to abandon the project and Bow & Swing begins this month a page devoted to the "square dance of the month" and contributed calls from Florida sources.

In his report for the convention committee Campbell outlined the problem posed by the union with reference to the music, and under new business the group later agreed to reimburse the Woytek organization for part of its lost revenue. The contract was canceled by mutual agreement after the Miami local refused to permit live square dancing music and recorded round dancing music on the same program.

A rather full discussion of the problems in square dances under union jurisdiction, included a suggestion that callers might form their own union and include their musicians, and another proposal that association activity be restricted to the holding of institutes wherein instruction rather than entertainment would be featured.

Carl Heath, Winter Haven president of the dancers' federation, and Harry Moore, Miami Beach dancer who was co-chairman of the convention, spoke in praise of the cooperative spirit manifest by callers and dancers' committee members in the weeks leading up to the convention. "Gripes are at a minimum," Heath said. "I believe it is the best convention ever held in Florida." In the absence of specific bids for the 1960 meeting, he asked the callers to give dancers full responsibility for the convention, except for programming, and mentioned possible use of large Miami Beach convention hotels like the Deauville.

Prof. Ernest Bartley and his wife, Ruth, reported on progress of the 1959 Short Course to be held in Gainesville July 1-4, mentioned Bill and Ann Peterman of Fort Worth, Harper Smith of Celina, Texas, and Bob and Doris Stone of Melbourne, as staff members. Already some fifty reservations were on hand, somewhat more than a year ago.

Publication of a state-wide Dancers' Directory shortly following a cutoff date

of October 1 was agreed by the callers' with Bow & SWING seeking to get the information in up-to-date form through its information sources around the state. Editor Al Cody asked that callers notify Bow & SWING how many copies of the directory, printed on light cardboard for mounting, they could use. Distribution will also be made through dancers' associations.

The matter of standardization of fees was discussed at length and finally dropped by the callers. Dancer groups have sought within recent weeks to write into their by-laws a minimum fee (usually \$25 plus 7¢ a mile) and Dancer President Heath pointed out it was to avoid bickering and embarrassment that the idea was originally proposed. On such a standard basis, it was felt, regional associations would make inter-sectional use of good Florida callers, rather than pay fancy fees to out-of-state callers.

At the suggestion of Baylis the group agreed to ask its educational committee to reappraise the qualifications for instructors at the University of Florida Short Course and report back at the October meeting.

The Southeastern callers and instructors association requested that "actively participating" callers and their wives be given a refund of their registration fees at the state convention:

The Tuesday evening dance is sponsored by the Merrysteppers Square Dance Club of Gainesville and will be held in the air-conditioned city recreation center. Aside from the usual afternoon devoted to swimming, fishing, boating or plain lazying around at the University's Camp Wauberg, the week will be spent in serious application to the dance.

This year's faculty is headed by genial Harper Smith of Celina, Texas. This is Harper's third appearance at this event, a striking testimony of his ability as a square dance caller and teacher. 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
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West Palm Beach Squares

ON THE CORNER

ROUGINESS IS one phase in square dancing that Callers, Leaders and Dancers, all, would like to eliminate . . Webster defines phase as, "One of the changing stages of development of a person or thing" . . . Roughness is definitely a phase, usually it will pass, but often much harm is done before it does.

Roughness gets its start in classes where there are many types of individuals . . . There is the timid gal who has to look around before she moves, to be sure she is doing the right thing. . . . The call is left allemande . . . Her corner (a go getter with muscles) swoops over, jerks her around and is gone before she even digests the call. He usually leaves her out of position and generally confused . . . Meantime, her partner does his allemande and is ready with a right hand, but she is facing the other way . . . He jerks her around and aims her right and the next man gives her a pull . . . By the end of the even-ing she has had it. She hurts . . . She is fed up . . . If she is mad enough she marches up to complain-or she gives up-square dancing is not for her . . . It isn't always the gals who get hurt, some of our so called "weaker sex" are as rough as the boys.

Jerking and pulling are not the only forms of roughness . . . There is hand squeezing, common in a grand right and left . . . In any twirl action gripping is a hazard . . . Clutching is present in actions using the forearms . Swinging also comes in for a share of the complaints-gals HATE to be swung off their feet . . . Another form of roughness in dancing does not use the hands or the feet but the mouth . . . Criticism made during the square or afterward, unless invited, is rude and ill mannered -even self criticism . . . There are dancers who comment aloud, to themselves, blaming themselves for fouling up the square . . . These comments are often misunderstood-others in the square think they are meant for them and react accordingly.

Generally, roughness in dancing is a sure sign of inexperience . . Time will cure it . . However, there are exceptions to all rules . . . One is the show off . . He is rough because he has to prove that he knows it all . . He jerks, pulls, pushes and mouths his way through the squares and has no idea why he is ostracized . . These individuals (and, thank heaven, they are few) soon gain a reputation . . The word gets around . . They are not invited to join clubs or included in getto-gethers.

Roughness is not confined to squares, it is also present in round dancing . . . Callers and leaders combat is in every way they can think of.

Most roughness, especially among newer dancers comes from trying to lead or from an eagerness to keep the square going . . . They are absolutely unaware that they are being anything but helpful . . Bear with them, they'll be ok . . The menace is the fellow who has years of experience and hasn't learned a thing.

It might be a good idea to take a look at yourself-Are you one of the rough necks?-Allie Manleft.

Florida Recipe Gets Back Home Via Memphis Publication . . .

JEAN SAWTELLE in the Southern Dancer, gives us a recipe for bread which she got at Fontana from Erma Celantano, who told Jean that she got it from a Floridian, Dawn Donavin.

1 cup granulated sugar

2 eggs, beaten

1/4 teaspoon salt 1 1/2 cups sifted flour

1 1/2 cups sifted flour 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder

3/4 cup chopped nut meats

1 five-ounce glass maraschino cherries, quartered

Juice from cherries.

1. Beat sugar and eggs together.

2. Mix flour, baking powder, and salt.

3. Add cherries and nut meats.

4. Alternately add flour and cherry juice.

Bake one hour in a one-pound loaf pan at 350 degrees.
