State Convention Served as Dry Run

WHETHER THE 7th Florida Square Dance Convention was successful as a dry run for the National or not, a record number of dancers and a record number of callers participated in what was undoubtedly the "most-organized" square and round dance event ever held in Florida.

Miami Beach's peerless 10th Street and 17th Street Auditoriums—plus the ball-room of the DiLido Hotel strategically located at Lincoln Road and the Ocean—afforded for the first time the opportunity of running three completely independent programs throughout the day. The DiLido ballroom was perfect for the after-parties.

Of course the mammoth Miami Beach Exhibition Hall which will be the center of next year's National was not used in any way for the May 12 and 13 state event.

"Not a minute less than 50 hours work on the convention program!" commented Jay Fenimore of Hollywood, co-chairman of the convention and acting president of the Florida Callers Association. "The big problem arose when we found callers scheduled in the same place at the same time. Several callers were scheduled as many as 8 or 9 times and I had to work out a system—not only to avoid conflict, but to give sufficient time for them to get from one hall to another.

"I fully believe the National will not entail as much work since it is doubtful any caller will appear more than 2 or 3 times because the supply will be greater," Fenimore told Bow & SWING.

The Round Dance Council of Florida framed the entire round dance portion of the convention and provided manning for workshops both morning and afternoon. Rounds presented Friday at the convention include Redhead by Harry Howe and Lee Ryan, Daisy Waltz by Phil and Joan White, Domani Waltz by Patsy and Erma Celentano, Terry's Theme by Gene and Ima Baylis, Dreams of Happiness by Art and Dorothy Brammeier, Medley in Three-Quarter Time, Bill Cascio and Hazel Bennett, Lonesome Mama Blues by Bob Waites and Ruth Bartley, and Some of These Days by Harry and Anne Hynes.

The Saturday rounds included Many Tears Ago by Ed and Kay Mack, Take My Love, by Fran and Clare Malhiot, Goodnight Two-Step by Jo and Karen Keller, Sweet Perfume by Andy and Helen Glittone, Hucklebuck by Jim and Noriene Pearson, Button Up Your Overcoat, Delight and Paul Trent, Dreamy Melody by the Baylises and a two-step by Jay

Record-Breaking Convention Opens at Detroit June 29

FLORDIANS attending the Detroit convention will have an opportunity to study at close hand an exceptionally well-organized convention staff headed up by General Chairman Harold Erickson, according to Harry Moore, general chairman of the 11th National which will be

held in Florida next year.

"The Detroit committee has invited our Florida chairmen to be at their side throughout the convention so that we may profit from their experience," Moore said, adding that it appeared Detroit would break all records for attendance, with more than 10,000 registrations by mid-April. "Moreover Detroit has taken the pains to set out in written detail every step taken by each committee; this will prove invaluable for conventions to come."

Held in famed Cobo Hall in Detroit's new riverfront civic development, the 10th National Square Dance Convention will provide square dancing from 10 a.m. until 11:30 p.m. for three solid days—June 29 and 30 and July 1. There will be a level for everyone—comfortable or challenging—with the top callers from all

over the continent.

For the round dancer there will be continuous workshop rounds and impromptu rounds from 10 a.m. until 5:30 p.m., and programmed round dancing each evening from 8 until 11:30 p.m. Nationally-recognized leaders will teach new dances, clinics will be held on the basic two-step and waltz, and on styling and body movement. The teak-floored Cobo ballroom is reserved for rounds throughout the convention.

Folk, contra and old time dancing are included in the programming: International folk dancing from 1 to 3 p.m. daily preceded morning workshops, and followed by request periods from 7 to 8:30 and parties until 11 p.m.; Contras will be run from 3 to 5 p.m. daily; Old time dancing is scheduled from 8:30 until 11 p.m. on Thursday.

Exhibitions are scheduled nightly in the arena beginning at 8 o'clock, panel discussions on a variety of subjects are planned (Bow & Swirks's Al Cody is booked on "Mechanics of Publishing a Magazine" in Room 3044, Saturday at 3 p.m.), a luncheon and style parade is scheduled daily at the Roostertail restaurant (reservations are limited, so send \$3.00 per plate now to Lois Billings, 3682 Bedford, Detroit 24).

Trail dances and trail-end activities—while not officially a part of the convention—are a must for many conventioners. Included are day (9:30 a.m.) and night (6:00 p.m.) cruises on the luxury liner S. S. Aquarama on Wednesday, June 28, offering a convention rate of \$6:00 per person including a sumptu-

ous meal.

Also on convention eve is an evening of round dancing at the Hotel Tuller (Arabian Room), a trail-end square dance in the Sheraton-Cadillac (Founders Room) sponsored by the Thunderbird club and free to all, another at the Detroit Leland (headquarters for Florida dancers), sponsored by the Kentucky dancers, and an outdoor dance at the Civic Park at Woodward Avenue and the river, under sponsorship of the Michigan Callers Association.

On June 27 will be trail dances at Lima, Ohio (Tex Brownlee at St. Gerards Gym), and Fort Wayne (Joe McDowell at Steels Maples Club).

Extraordinary Support for Bow & Swing Pledged by Associations

EXTRAORDINARY SUPPORT from organized dancer and caller groups has breathed new life into Bow & SWING and plans for an expanded and more useful magazine were announced in mid-May by Cody Publications, Inc., the publication's owners and publishers.

Effective with the August, 1961 issue, Bow & SWING will be published 12 times a year, with the Club Directory feature scheduled for publication on odd numbered months only. Club Directory changes will be reported on intervening months.

Dancer and caller groups had been warned in a letter from the publisher that the magazine would wither from malnu trition unless additional revenue from advertising or circulation could be found. At the April meeting of directors of the Central Florida Square Dancers Association, that group urged an increase in the subscription rate as a first step.

Officers of the Florida Knotheads proposed a commitment to underwrite \$250 in advertising annually, and suggested that the Florida Callers Association and the dancer groups might follow suit to provide \$1000 to overcome the publication's projected deficit for the current

At the Miami Beach meeting of the Callers association it was agreed that the association's treasury could be used to underwrite the publication's deficits and eliminate the need for severe editorial boiling that has characterized the publication since the first of the year. Coincidentally the dancers' federation endorsed an increase in the wholesale subscription rate, but urged the publication be published every month instead of 10 times a year.

The dancer groups appeared to see the desirability of enlarging the circulation to approximately 3000 and promised to pursue subscriptions to non members.

possibly at club level throughout the state.

In an announcement to contract advertisers, the publishers called attention to an increase in advertising rates to \$121.80 per page, but guaranteed to protect current advertising contracts for a full 12 months. New advertisers may qualify for this advantageous rate by placing their orders before July 1 effective date.

"One of our Florida advertisers reported that a third of a page in May drew 12 out-of-state requests for catalogs in addition to a raft of business from Florida readers," the letter said. "And during the next 12 months Florida square dancing will undergo the heaviest promotion of all time, as the Sunshine state prepares to entertain some 15,000 square dancers at the Eleventh National Square Dance Convention June of 1962."


In a statement to the callers and dancer associations, the publisher pointed out that the established price for subscriptions will continue to be \$2.00 per year (retail) and that discounts for multiple-year subscriptions will be discontinued.

Al Hixon, speaking to the Callers, commented that "we must face the fact that Bow & SWING must depend to a large degree on reader support rather than advertiser support if it is to continue."

Bill Muench of the Knothead Charter Square, stated that "your magazine is the medium for contacting our large membership; at one time we published a small four page magazine because we realized the importance of this contact. It was a big job as it was, and I don't believe any of us would want to do it again." He proposed several organizations earmark about \$1000 for support of the magazine. "I know the Knotheads alone would have to spend well over that amount to contact their members for just one item, their convention—if it were not for Bow Bow & SWING."

Dancer Federation Annual Meet To be Held in Central Location

DELEGATES OF the Florida Federation of Square Dancers agreed that their annual meeting would be held in a central location-perhaps Melbourne or St. Petersburg-and cleaned up a basketful of pending business at their meeting in Miami Beach May 14.

Other items:

(1) The West Coast Square and Round Dancers Association was asked to proceed in its own way to determine the advisibility of splitting up to form a new South West Florida association.

(2) Heard a report on progress on House Bill 1871 which would clear the air so far as application of the state dance hall occupational license law to nonprofit hobby clubs.

(3) Gave an overwhelming vote of confidence to Harry Moore as chairman of the 11th National Square Dance Convention, and heard a representative of the Florida Callers Association report their similar action

(4) Noted that a state-wide meeting of the executive committee for the 11th National would be held in Melbourne this

(5) Adopted the Heath Committee report on disposal of surpluses from state and national conventions under a formula which would split profit of the 11th National among the state federation and four regional affiliates in such a way that the host group would get 30%, the state group 10% and all other affiliates 20%. Under the proposal all available funds of the federation would be made available for financing the 11th National.

(6) Voted that affiliated associations would require all members to be subscribers to Bow & SWING and approved an increase to \$1.50 in the wholesale cost of Bow & SWING for their members, urged the publisher to give full consideration to the possibility of making Bow & SWING 12 times a year instead of 10.

A report by Treasurer J. Warriner Smith, Jr., showed a total of \$1172.99 on hand; \$1000 is to be transferred to the 11th National committee as soon as the June 30 dividend has been earned.

The meeting was held in the DiLido hotel coincidentally with the meeting of the Florida Callers Association.

MEMBERS OF the Florida Callers Association instructed its educational committee to determine whether Max Forsyth of Indianapolis might be available for a callers clinic in connection with its fall meeting, somewhere in Central Florida.

The callers' group met at the DiLido Hotel in Miami Beach following the Seventh Florida Square Dance Convention

on May 12-13.

Vice President Jay Fenimore of Hollywood presided at the meeting, in the place of Howard Miller of Tampa whose resignation was dated March 25.

It was explained that Fenimore would serve as Acting President, and that if it became necessary to have a president, di-

rectors could appoint one.

Ernest Bartley reviewed dancers' efforts to enact House Bill 1871 and suggested that a callers' committee could handle this problem in cooperation with the dancers.

An honorary membership was voted to Bob Lindstrom of Bradenton, and a vote of confidence in Harry Moore as chairman of the 11th National Square Dance

Convention was given. Jimmy Clossin's front page picture on the current Sets-In-Order was recognized and the secretary was instructed to send him a letter saying in effect, "We think a lot of you, too,"

Ed Newton proposed a special badge for callers' partners, which present members will purchase at .75, and new members will receive with their dues

A letter of sympathy to the widow of Houston Thompson, Daytona Beach caller who died recently, was authorized. Treasurer reported a balance on May

1 of \$2,404.31 in the treasury.

The organization voted to leave up to their officers details of an arrangement to cover deficits incurred in the publishing of Bow & SWING and urged support of the publication through use of advertising and sale of subscriptions.

Expressing confidence in the leadership of the 11th National, Fenimore added that "if each person contributes some small part, the burden will not be too great on anyone, you will derive much more pleasure because of your participation and it is bound to be successful.

"The way our callers responded to the recent state convention (the most tre-

mendous and wonderful thing I have ever experienced) I have no doubt they can be counted on to carry out anything asked of them."

ters to be used in the Motor City. The Detroit convention makes available a booth for use by the Florida delegation in promoting the 11th National. Eastern Airlines—"The Square Dancers' Airline"—will have an adjoining booth for the purpose of selling package Florida vacations, and Gordon Brothers of Miami will have four booths to display made-in-Florida square dance costumery.

When Miami Beach extends an invitation to a national convention, it is backed up by facilities almost without parallel anywhere. The Exhibition Hall covers four and a half acres, provides in the main area alone seating for almost 16,000 people, affords an unobstructed floor area of 108,000 square feet. Immediately adjacent to the main hall are smaller rooms ranging from 20x25 to 60x100 feet—and this year a huge storage room has been air conditioned for use as additional exhibit space.

A formal meeting in early June, probably at Melbourne, will bring the entire state committee for the 11th National Square Dance Convention together for an organization meeting, on the eve of the 1961 convention opening in Detroit June 29, according to Harry Moore, general chairman for the 1962 show

In the meantime, dancer groups throughout the state launched the sale of certificates redeemable for registration at the 1962 convention, in an effort to provide funds for financing the convention committee's initial promotional efforts.

Prior to the Melbourne meeting convention leaders arranged a meeting of club representatives and others interested, including officials of the Southeast Florida Square and Round Dancers Association, in an effort to bring together various elements in the immediate host area

Since registrations for the 1962 conven-

tion cannot be sold until after the Detroit convention, the certificate system was authorized. Sale of 1000 certificates at \$3.75 per person will result in \$3750 in operating capital, Moore pointed out. The certificates can be written for \$7.50 to cover two people, he said.

Governor Farris Bryant has been asked to lead the invitation contingent at Detroit personally, but as Bow & Swing went to press it could not be confirmed.

Through Bow & SWING, however, he sent his words of welcome anyway. "It is a sincere pleasure, both personally and officially, to extend an invitation to your group and their families to visit our Sunshine State." he said.

Dry Run for Cobo Hall was Held Last November

As 2600 pair of slippered and booted feet shuffled and twirled rhythmically to the calling of Max Forsyth and Arnie Kroneberger, in Detroit's new Cobo Hall last November 12, history was being made.

For not only was this the first square dance convention sponsored by the Michigan Council of Square and Round Dance Clubs, but it was the first square dance ever to be held in this spectacular new convention building, just recently completed and scheduled to house the 1961 National Square Dance Convention next June 29th 30th and July 1st.

Aside from its success as Michigan's first state square dance convention, the event was significant as a "test run" for the big national convention in 1961. And while only a portion of the space reserved for the National Convention was used at the November convention, the dancers had an excellent opportunity to test the floors, sound qualities, and other features of the building which contribute so much to comfortable and enjoyable square dancing.

Spaciousness is the keynote of the vast \$54,000,000 structure. Often during the day more than 200 sets were dancing comfortably in the teakwood-floored ballroom overlooking the Detroit River as various state and national callers chanted their commands to the eager dancers. Batteries of loud speakers, located in the ceiling of the ballroom, enabled the dancers to hear every command clearly and distinctly - even at the most distant points in the mammoth hall. This room, incidentally, will be the scene of the round dancing activity during the National Convention. Square dancing will be held in one of the huge halls which will easily accommodate as many as 800 squares at one time! Also available, and reserved for "challenge," contra, oldtime, and folk dances will be several somewhat smaller halls in the building where dancers will enjoy uncrowded, sound-perfect dancing to many of the nation's top callers and instructors.

In honor of Michigan's first state convention, Dona and Elwyn Fresh, of Wichita, Kanasa, presented their latest round dance—the delightfully danceable "Toyland" which became an immediate hit.

In addition to members of the Tenth National Convention Committee, interested guests at the November convention included all eight members of the National Executive Committee, composed of the General Chairmen of past National Conventions. After being exposed to the splendor and vastness of Cobo Hall, all agreed enthusiastically that the facilities for square dancing was "tops."
