

Over 2000 Dancers Attend 11th Convention

ATTENDANCE at the 11th Florida Square Dance Convention was recorded as 2001 couples, plus 1021 paid spectators and 300 teenagers who were admitted free. The convention tabulation was reported at the Federation meeting June 21 at Miami Beach.

A constructive report on status of the Federation magazine, Bow & SWING, was presented to officers and delegates. Now under supervision of a permanent advisory committee chaired by Hink Smith, Bow & SWING will be enlarged to 16 pages per issue, include art work and color on the cover, and feature typographical changes to make the magazine easier to read. Printing costs will be re-examined by Cody's of Kissimmee to make a 16-page publication economically feasible.

Orlando was selected as site for the 1966 state convention through a bid submitted by the Central Florida Association. The Orlando group offered 25,000 sq. ft. of dance floor, reasonable nearby hotel and motel accommodations, and cooperation from the local recreation department.

Jacksonville and Hollywood also bid for the convention site. Jacksonville withdrew in favor of Orlando, and the Hollywood bid was rejected due to lack of time to sanction the bid by the sponsoring Southeast As-

sociation. Both Jacksonville and Hollywood groups were requested to submit their bids again next year for consideration by the Federation.

Seating of area delegates on the

Square Dance Vacation Resorts Lure Floridians During Summer Months

FLORIDA square dancers traveling through northern states this summer and fall have their pick of many fine vacation resorts that feature square dancing with other recreational activities. In addition, festival dances staged by area associations carry an appeal to the traveling dancer.

Flyers and publicity brochures from such resorts and festival dances regularly come to Bow & SWING. Some of the more notable events upcoming in August and during the fall are included in the following.

Traditional with many Florida dancers are the Fun Fest and Swap Shop sessions at Fontana Village, Fontana Dam, N.C. This year the Fun Fest is set for Sept. 5-13 and the Swap Shop for Sept. 26-Oct. 4.

Both sessions are similar in facilities and arrangements, but where the Fun Fest will accept reservations for one to eight days, the Swap Shop will accept no reservation less than three days.

Couple dancing is featured in the morning and square dancing in the afternoon, with a festival dance each evening to music by the Fontana Ramblers. After parties at the conclusion of the evening dances are a regular feature. Recreation events in addition to dancing are planned for each day.

Both the Fun Fest and Swap Shop have permanent and guest staffs. Recreation Director Bob Sloan recently announced that the permanent Fun Fest staff has been enlarged to include Ed & Kay Mack of Clearwater Beach, Harry & Clara Lackey of Greensboro, N.C., and Chuck & Jessie Raley of Lakewood, Calif.

Every caller who attends dances at Fontana is invited to contribute to the total program, to "swap" calls, dances, ideas and fun.

Another vacation retreat in the Blue Ridge Mountains is the Rainbow Lake Lodge at Brevard, N.C. The Rainbow Lake Square and Round Dance Institute is booked from July 26 to Aug. 15 under direction of a Florida staff. Jim Pearson of St. Petersburg and George Campbell of Miami are calling the squares, with Jim and his wife Noriene handling the rounds. The Dancin' Daze program, planned for August 16 to Aug. 29, features Ron Schneider and Irene & Bill Hart.

Always popular with Florida dan-

cers is the Blue Ridge Square Dance Camp at Clayton, Ga. This year the fifth annual camp is slated for Aug. 16-22. The package plan includes complete recreational facilities in addition to square dancing. Heading up the staff are Gordon & Edna Blaum of Miami, Jim & Ruth Brower of Texas, Jack & Grace Livingston of Indiana, and Tom & Betty Johnson of New York.

The Jekyll Jamboree scheduled for Sept. 17-19 offers "everything under one roof" at Stuckey's Carriage Inn, Jekyll Island, Ga. The three-day square dance program at the Inn will be guided by Harry & Clara Lackey, Irv & Betty Elias, Roger & Mary Jane Chapman of Winter Haven, and Ed & Kay Mack of Clearwater.

Ideal event to take in on the way to the World's Fair is the Star-Spangled Banner Square Dance Festival Aug. 28-29 at Baltimore. Featured callers and round dance leaders include Les Gotcher, Bob Page, Arnie Kronenberger, Al Brundage, Gloria Rios, and Joe & Es Turner.

Sightseeing trips and fashion shows are also in the offing. The festival is slated to be held at Baltimore's new civic center.

Les Gotcher returns to Miami Beach in November for 10 big days at the Crown Hotel. With him will be the Macks of Clearwater Beach, Larry Dick of Savannah, and Frank Kaltman of Newark.

Gotcher is booked at the Crown Hotel from Nov. 20 to 30. A package deal is offered for the two weekends, a week or the complete 10 days.

For dancers who plan ahead, there's the 12th annual Azalea Trail Square Dance Festival on March 5-6, 1965, at Mobile, Ala. As announced by Jimmy Harris, "this festival will be especially attractive as it will be held in our new multi-million dollar municipal auditorium."

Featured at the Saturday night dance is Earl Johnston of Vernon, Conn. The Friday night dance programs Dave Taylor of Grosse Pointe Farms, Mich. Manning & Nita Smith will m.c. the program, and music will be supplied by the Rhythm Outlaws square dance band.

The dance is under sponsorship of the Mobile Square Dance Association of which Rufus Moore is president. More details will be upcoming in B & S.

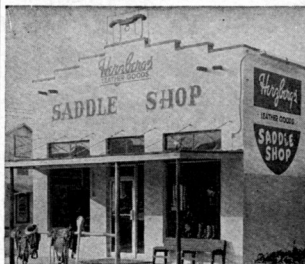

Lloyd Litman To Call at Orlando Aug. 8

LOYD LITMAN comes to Central Florida during August for a special dance co-sponsored by the Orlando Recreation Department and Western Square Dance Council.

The event is booked at Orlando's Municipal Auditorium from 8 to 11 p.m. on Saturday, August 8.

Litman, from Cleveland, Ohio, is the author of *Instant Hash* and a recording artist on the Grenn label. He conducted the caller's clinic last October at the annual meeting of the Florida Callers Association.

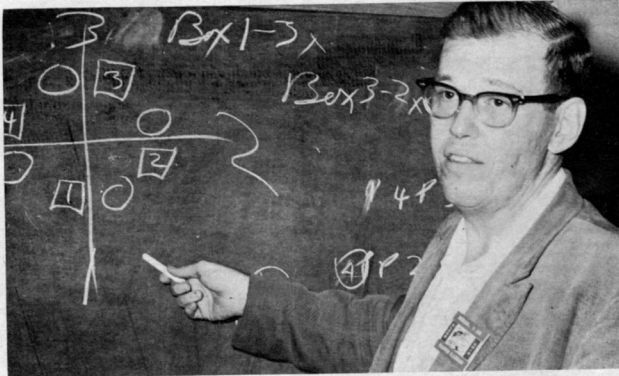
Max Forsyth is another traveling caller booked in Central Florida this month. The Forsyth dance is set for Aug. 3 at Daytona Beach City Recreation Hall under auspices of the Daytona Highland Squares.

The Central Florida Association is slated to resume its regular monthly dances in the fall. New president of the association is Chuck Kuhn of Cocoa. Vice president is Bob Brown of Orlando, with Jim & Claire Clancy of Eau Gallie as secretary and Jewel Mills of Sanford as treasurer. Mailing address of the Clancys is 712 Sherwood Blvd., Eau Gallie.

At the State Federation meeting at Miami Beach, officials voted to accept the Central Florida Association's bid to host the 1966 State Square Dance Convention. Designated as chairman of the convention is Al Cody of Kissimmee.

Tentative plans call for use of the new Orlando Exhibition Hall at Exposition Park for programmed dancing. This building has 25,000 sq. ft. of oak and tile dance floor, compared with the 13,000 sq. ft. offered at the recent Miami Beach convention.

The average room rate for nearby motels and hotels was pegged at \$8 per day. Shuttle bus service for the eight block distance between down-



town Orlando and the Exhibition Hall would be provided. The local recreation department stated that it would provide advertising, and print badges and ribbons. A catered buffet also can be served.

Other areas bidding for the '66 convention were Jacksonville and Hollywood. Jacksonville withdrew its bid in favor of Orlando. The Hollywood bid, involving the use of the Diplomat Hotel and Country Club, was not sanctioned by the Southeast Association due to lack of time and was thus rejected by the Federation.

"NOW THAT the 11th annual Florida Square Dance Convention is over, let's turn our efforts to the 12th annual convention slated for Tampa in 1965," requests President Matt Bryan of the West Coast Association. "I urge all associations to begin now to publicize the 1965 convention. Let's think 25 in '65—a 2500 attendance that is."

J. Warriner (Hink) Smith of St. Petersburg has been nominated as vice chairman of the '65 convention. All county vice presidents, appointed Bow & SWING representatives, and presidents and chairmen of the Tampa clubs and others will be asked to serve on the convention committee.

"Meetings will be called from time to time and all committee members are urged to attend," states Bryan.

Main activity for West Coast area square dancers during August centers on the second annual Cancer Benefit Dance August 15 at Fort Myers. The dance is planned for the Lehigh Acres auditorium, an air conditioned facility well known to square dancers around the state.

Ave., Fort Myers. Cost is \$1.00 per person and 50 cents for spectators.

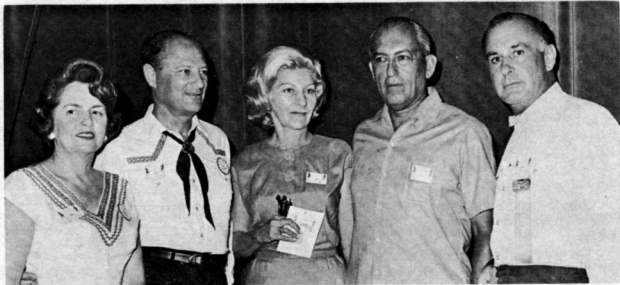

New Policies In Effect for Bow & Swing

THE LATE circulation date of the July issue of Bow & SWING raised the eyebrows of some Florida square dancers. And at Cody's of Kissimmee, too, where the magazine is published.

Failure of key production equipment caused the delay.

Publication of a magazine such as Bow & SWING can be systematic and routine—provided both personnel and equipment are functioning according to schedule.

It usually takes less than a day to set the type for each issue. After page-make-up and printing, the magazine is automatically gathered, stitched, addressed and trimmed at the rate of 5000 per hour. More than two dozen monthly periodicals are handled this way by Cody's.

But when production equipment fails, the time schedule for all magazines is jumbled. In the case of Bow & SWING's July issue composition was delayed several days due to Linotype breakdown. Then, when the magazine was ready for binding, the addressing equipment developed a bug.

Cody's has agreed to stick to a rigid time schedule for Bow & SWING. The publication is guaranteed to be in circulation by the 25th of the preceding month. News and advertising deadline for each issue is the 10th of preceding. Copy received at Kissimmee later than the 10th of preceding will be considered, but runs the danger of being omitted.

It is recommended that area correspondents have their copy to the editor by the 9th of preceding, so that work on the issue can begin promptly on the 10th. Ideally, copy should be typewritten, double-spaced on one side of the paper. Photographs of square dance activities are much in demand. Black and white photos are preferred, although color photos may be accepted.

President Harold Jenkins has an-

nounced a call for a special meeting for the presentation and discussion of important Federation business. Federation business will be discussed at the morning session scheduled at 10:00 a.m. and matters pertinent to the publication of the magazine will be discussed at the afternoon session at 2:00 p.m.

be seated as soon as elected. Others believed that the delegate must serve concurrently with the Federation fiscal year beginning in October. A 15-2 vote ruled in favor of the latter interpretation. As a result, President Dick Rae of the Southeast Association will wait until October to be seated by the Federation.

To avoid future controversy on the subject, a committee was appointed to study the constitution and report to the Federation if changes in wording are necessary. Appointed committee include Chairman John Sullivan, Mr. Tyson, Mr. Cody, and Mr. Olson. The committee will report its findings at an upcoming Federation meeting.

Division of profits from the state convention were agreed upon. A 50/50 split will see the Federation and the Callers Association receive equal amounts. 60% of the Federation's share will be retained by the Federation, the remaining 40% going to the association sponsoring the convention. The Callers Association will determine what percentage of its share will be given to the Round Dance Council.

33 persons were present for the Federation meeting. The callers' group was represented by Jack Lasry.

Area association representatives at the meeting included the following: Southeast—George Watters, Dave Tyson, Frank Cornwall; Central Florida—Harold Jenkins, John Sullivan, Al Martin; West Coast—Matt Bryan, Hink Smith, Walter Stoltz; Northeast—Lou Olsen, Paul Lane. The Pensacola square dancers were not represented.

The Federation's annual meeting will be held in October. Watch Bow & SWING for complete details on the time and place of this important function.

Two Timin' Blues

"Do YOU WANT a real swinging singing call that moves? Then try Two Timin' Blues by Bill Peters of San Jose, Calif.," states Jay Fenimore, Square Dance Coordinator responsible for Bow & SWING's Square of the Month for August.

"This one is close-timed, has a tricky pattern and the dancers will really love it."

Peters wrote the dance and also calls the flip side of this record, a Longhorn (LH-138) recording produced by Kalox Record Distributing Co. of Dallas. Music is by the Longhorn Playboys.

Opener-Break-Ending
Join eight hands and make a ring you circle
Head up and sing
Singin' 'bout those two-timin' blues
Allemande left go allemande that go forward
two and star

I'm feelin' blue clear down to my shoes
Shoot in now, four ladies chain, you turn
in this pretty Jane,
Then rollaway and swing somebody new
(promenade)

The meanest blues I find are those two-timin' kind
I'm singin' 'bout those two-timin' blues
Figure:

Heads (sides) go up and back cross trail
Make an Ocean Wave, six in line
Star thru and do a little Do-Sa-De
Make an Ocean Wave like that same gal
you box the gnat
(and) Make a right hand star and to your
corner go

Allemande left your corner, walk right by
your own
Swing the right hand lady, baby, promenade
The meanest blues I find are those two-timin' kind
I'm singin' 'bout those two-timin' blues
Sequence: Opener, Fig. Twice Heads, Break,
Fig. Twice Sides, Ending.

Here is a beautiful four couple pattern by Pete Sansom of West Palm Beach which is destined to become a favorite nation-wide . . .

OCEAN WAVE by Pete Sansom

Four ladies chain across and back again
Here we go for the Ocean Chain
Head ladies center, Ocean Chain
Side ladies to the right turn this Jane
Make an Ocean Wave, six in line
Rock it up, Rock it back
Turn by the right, half way around
Turn your opposite when you come down
Side ladies center, Ocean Chain
Head ladies right, turn this Jane
Make an Ocean Wave, six in line
Rock it up, rock it back
Turn by the right, half way around
Turn your own like an allemande that
Slip the clutch, left allemande, etc. . . .

Explanation: Head ladies chain all the way around and return to partner. Take him by the left for an Ocean Wave. At the same time, side ladies go to the right, turn the head men by the right half way. By this time, head ladies have returned home and you will have a six in line Ocean Wave. Balance. Now all swing by the right half way around, everybody courtesy turn opposite girl.

Repeat, with side ladies going into the center and head ladies leading to the right. On completion of second Ocean Chain, all ladies will have returned to original partners.

Bow & SWING's workshop material for August includes a number of interesting movements by Pete Sansom. Try these with your dance clubs:

OCEAN CHAIN QUICKIES by Pete Sansom

Four ladies chain across and back again
Here we go with the Ocean Chain
Head ladies center, Ocean Chain
Side ladies right, turn this man
*Rock it up and back once more
Pass thru and circle four
Head gets break and line up four
Star thru, those who can square through
3/4 round
Allemande left . . .

* Another variation:

Rock it up, rock it back
Head men turn back
Turn this line half way around, wheel and deal
Pass thru three pass thru
Circle four, head men break
Pass thru, cast off three quarters round
Right and left thru
Cross trail thru, left allemande . . .

TANDEM A by Pete Sansom
One and three both squares lead out to the right
Let's circle four, head gets break make a line
Forward eight and back, do a double pass thru
Now wheel and deal double, double pass thru
Triple centers in, cast off three quarters round
Star thru, two ladies chain in the middle
Now pass thru, circle four allemande, etc. . . .
Outside square California twirl
First left, next right
Right and left thru
Cross trail thru, left allemande, etc. . . .

TANDEM B by Pete Sansom
First and three both squares lead out to the right
Circle four now make two lines
Forward eight and back, those who can, star thru
Dive thru, pass thru, star thru, pass thru
Right and left thru, dive thru, pass thru
Right and left thru, star thru
Dive thru, pass thru, right and left thru
Dive thru, pass thru, star thru
Dive thru, star thru, dive thru
Pass thru, star thru, pass thru
Right and left thru, dive thru
Cross trail thru and everybody left allemande etc. . . .

TANDEM C by Pete Sansom
Everybody substitute
Heads, both squares lead to the right
Circle four, head men break in lines of four
Go forward eight and back again
Insides dixie chain, now the outside do a dixie chain
New insides dixie chain again

Callers Slate Lee Helsel At Fall Clinic

LEE HELSEL will head up the Callers' Clinic at the Fall meeting of the Florida Callers Association October 20-November 1 at the Sarasota Holiday Inn. Announcement of the annual fall session was made at Miami Beach during the June 20 meeting of the FCA.

Vice President Ed Newton, chairman of the FCA Educational Committee, reported on the minimum basic requirements for beginners' classes. Citing ability of the teacher, size and age of the class, and number of nights of the class as variable factors, Newton presented a checklist of 20 basics that are recommended to be taught to beginners.

"It is the belief of the Educational Committee that a great many of the teaching methods and particularly the material taught is obsolete. We have not tried to eliminate the traditional figures, but firmly believe these to be the 'frosting on the cake' to the caller or teacher who has the ability to go beyond the 20 basics we feel to be a minimum requirement.

"We do not try to limit any caller or teacher to this list. We do recommend at least 15 lessons of beginner actions; classes of 2½ hours each."

The following basic actions based on the minimum 15 weeks were recommended by the committee:

Swing, Promenade (single file and couples), right and left grand, allemande (left and right), do-sa-do, see-saw, ladies chain, right and left thru, pass thru-split ring-couples, stars (right left)—star promenade, X-t thru, California twirl, promenade wheel round, break to a line, allemande thar (shoot star slip cl), do-pa-so (arm turns), ¼ sashay, star thru, square thru.

FCA members serving on the Educational Committee, in addition to Newton, include Sam Prescott, Bill Muench, Mel Clark, Howard Parrish, Hollis Wagner, and Cliff Reazak.

The FCA board of directors recommended that the dues be increased to \$5 per year with a \$5 initiation fee.

In other business conducted at the meeting, President Prescott acknowledged the excellent work of the convention committee, especially Gene Baylis and Les Lynn on programming and Lew Green on sound. Bill Roundtree moved that the Education Committee create within the Callers Association a Junior Callers Division—youngsters not able to vote or hold office but able to participate in the activity. This motion was seconded and passed.
