

Square Dancing Is Relaxation Not Competition

BEFORE YOU DECIDE to write a nasty letter to Bow & SWING, or organize a vigilante committee to tar and feather the editor, please re-read last month's editorial a couple of more times. Over 99-99/100 percent of square dancers agree that square dancing is a pleasant recreation, not a competitive sport. Relax and have fun.

Let's review another explosive facet of square dancing, "Experimental Material." Square dancing, like round dancing, has been deluged with new material, some good, some not so good. This new material is fine when it is kept in its place. Dancers who dance three, four, five, six and even seven nights a week, need and seek new material. They find a caller who workshops everything new. When the dancer and caller keep this new material in the proper perspective and recognize it for what it is, everything is fine. We know someone should workshop the new movements to separate the good from the bad, then pass it on to the regular dancers, who have neither the time or energy to waste trying to learn it. Most callers who introduce every new figure will tell you only one in ten will be acceptable. We owe these energetic dancers and callers a debt of gratitude for separating the wheat from the chaff that we might enjoy the new movements without the agony of learning, then forgetting most of them.


If you are one of the dancers that has the time and energy—dance, dance, dance. We all will benefit from your experience.—FRANK CORNWALL.

Miami Features Competition for Square Dancers

MIAMI CALLER, George Hales, is introducing a new feature in his area, along the lines of Frank Cornwall's article in the last issue of Bow & SWING, friendly competition in square dancing.

Here is how it works. Any club can bring one square of their best dancers. Sometime during the evening of regular dancing there will be an elimination dance. The square remaining on the floor is the winner for the week. The winning square will receive free passes for the following week. The club having the most wins in 1965 will receive a trophy to take back to their club—permanently.

Rules for the contest will be, clubs may change all or any part of their square, but not on the same evening. Dancers must be in square dance costume. Squares will be eliminated for breaking down, out of gear, wrong partner or wrong home position when the music stops. When the music stops no one will change his position. Arguing over the judges decision will disqualify the square for the evening. Each club will bring an alternate couple in case of sickness. These couples will also be the judges.

This will be a tryout to see how competition works in square dancing and will be held at Pythian Hall, 46th Avenue and Flagler St. on Friday, February 19.


