Message from the President:

Promote Square Dancing During Dance Week

GOVERNOR BURNS has proclaimed the first full week in October as Square Dance Week. This is a good time for all square dancers and callers to plan to promote square dancing on a level we like to see.

With our square dance leaders, dedication is not To make meaningful efforts leaders must be knowledgeable as well as progressive. It would be well to read your constitution and By Laws to find out why they were organized and how they operate. Next, make a list of your plans and projects for the last year or so, and ask vourself if they have been adequate. Have they promoted the growth of square dancing in your area? If not, why haven't they?

A good place to bring your ideas and even failures is the Florida Federation of Square Dancers meeting in Orlando. There you may find out why those bright ideas failed to be the big successes you expected, and you may present an idea that would provide answers for many of the problems that face everyone promoting square dancing in Florida.

Most dancers are interested, also, in how the money your association made hosting the Florida Square Dance Convention is used. (Jacksonville was the first area association to receive part of the profits in 1963). Even though the convention publicity always makes it easier to recruit members for beginner classes, you can always hear someone say that they could really make progress if they had a couple of hundred dollars to spend.

The Florida Federation of Square Dancers election meeting slated to be held in Orlando, October 23 at 2:00 p.m. at the Robert Meyer Motor Inn is open to all square and round dancers.

As we are on the threshold of splitting up the large associations into smaller localized associations, meetings of this type are even more important. If your area is organized and you represent enough clubs (approximately 16 or 300 dancers) have your elected officers and club delegates attend the Orlando meeting.

As this is a new venture we cannot promise any immediate results. This is a chance to find out what we can do to improve the all-over square dance movement in Florida.

Sauare Dance Week Is Coming Up

October's big news is Square Dance Week, recently proclaimed by Florida's Govenor Haydon Burns. Dancers from Miami to Jacksonville will be celebrating this exciting first week of the month.

Among the first Square Dance Week plans to be announced are those of the Tallahassee Capital Squares who will host the Dixie Federation Dance as a highlight of activity in their area. A caravan of dancers from the West Coast will travel to Tallahassee for the event.

The West Coast Association has laid plans to publicize Square Dance Week over radio and television. At a recent Association Executive Committee meeting it was decided that this type of promotion would be a boon to enlistment of new dancers for classes beginning this fall.

As soon as Square Dance Week is over, dancers will be planning costumes for the round of Halloween Ralls

The Starlite Shufflers' Goblin Dance, set for October 30 at the Jacksonville Mayflower Hotel, promises to be a big event for the Northeast.

Many Central Florida dancers will attend the Association dance at Sanford Civic Center with Colin Walton, October 30, while others will travel to Frontier Farms for the Jack-O-Lantern Jamboree, October 29 to 31.

Highlighting West Coast festivities will be the Fifth Friday Dance at Lakeland October 29 with Jim Pearson and the Junkins. Other West Coast dancers will do-sa-do at the Sunshine Shufflers Halloween Costume Dance at Naples with Jake Shellnutt October 30.

Business is on the dancers' agenda for October, too. The annual meeting and callers workshop with Les Gotcher is set for October 22 at Orlando's Parliament Inn. October 23 will see the annual meeting of the FFSD at

Federation Charter Revealed at FFSD Meeting in Clearwater

THE 1965 Florida Square Dance Convention netted \$1025.19, Chairman Matt Bryan told the board of delegates of the Florida Federation of Square Dancers at their meeting in Clearwater during the Labor Day weekend.

A check for this amount was presented to the federation, which in turn presented a check for half to the Florida Callers Association, and a check for \$205.04 to the West Coast Square and Round Dancers Association, the host organization. It is understood the Round Dance Council will participate in the Callers' share.

Treasurer Walter Stoltz reported the federation treasury stood at \$2100.84 after settlement with the two associations with a few bills unpaid. He called attention to the fact that affiliated local associations are to pay their annual affiliation fee of \$10 before October 1.

Chairman Frank Cornwall commented on improved postal service as a result of imprinting the words "second class" prominently on the cover of the August issue of Bow & Swing, asked Al Cody to explain a check for \$33 from Cody Publications which represented a clearing of all magazine accounts between Cody's and the federation as of the end of August, 1965. facilitate bookkeeping each monthly issue will appear on a separate ledger and statement in the future.

Bill Fleshman presented a codified version of the federation charter which is published below as official notice to affiliated local associations that it will be voted upon at the annual meeting of the Federation in Orlando, October 23.

Text of the charter follows: ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the

FLORIDA FEDERATION OF SQUARE DANCERS, INCORPORATED

(Adopted as amended October 29, 1960, and revised through August 31, 1965)

We, the undersigned incorporators and founders do hereby mutually agree to unite and assemble together for the purpose of founding a body corporate not for profit under the laws of the State of Florida, and to that end do make, execute and adopt the following articles of incorporation to be known as the "Charter."

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be the Florida Federation of Square Dancers, Inc., a corporation not for profit, and its location shall be at 410 W. Verona Street, Kissimmee, Osceola County, Florida.

ARTICLE II

The general nature and object of this corporation shall be as follows: 1. To promote the extension of square, round

and folk dancing in the State of Florida by in-

forming the general public of the moral and healthful recreational opportunities in square, round and folk dancing.

2. To encourage the formation of square, round and folk dancing clubs.

3. To serve as clearing house for information among the unaffiliated dance groups and as an instrument of liaison with square dancers elsewhere in the nation.

4. To bring about a spirit of cooperation among the callers, teachers and dancers of the State of Florida.

ARTICLE III

The qualification of members and the manner of their admission to membership shall be as follows

1. All persons who hold membership in good 1. All persons who hold membership in good standing in any of the regional square dance associations in the State of Florida affiliated with the Florida Federation of Square Dancers shall be members of this association.

2. Florida dancers, not resident in an area of Florida served by a regional square dance association, may affiliate directly with the Florida Federation of Square Dancers upon payment of appropriate fees as hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE IV The term for which this corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V

Officers and organization:

1. Each regional organization affiliated with the Florida Federation of Square Dancers shall choose three members in good standing, includ-ing their then president, who shall serve as voting delegates. The chairman of the Florida Federation of Square Dancers, with the approval of the Board of Delegates, shall appoint one additional delegate from each affiliated region to serve as a voting delegate. These persons shall be known collectively as the Board of Delegates.

2. As long as they remain active square dancers, all past chairmen of the Florida Federation of Square Dancers shall have the privilege of voting delegates.

3. The voting delegates shall choose from among themselves a chairman, vice chairman, secretary and treasurer.

4. A technical representative, to be named by the Florida Callers Association, shall be invited to sit with the Board of Delegates. Such representative shall not have voting privileges but shall serve advisory and liaison functions.

5. The Board of Delegates shall choose one of their number to serve in a liaison capacity with the Florida Callers Association.

6. Voting delegates shall be named by the regional affiliated organizations not later than October 1 of each year and shall hold office for a term of one year beginning with the Annual Meeting of the Florida Federation of Square Dancers. If, for personal reasons, the appointed delegate is unable to serve his full term, a successor shall be appointed by his regional presi-dent to fulfill the unexpired term until the next Annual Meeting of the Federation. Voting delegates may succeed themselves in office, but no person shall succeed himself as chairman of the

Florida Federation of Square Dancers.
7. When unable to attend a meeting of the Board of Delegates, a member shall notify the president of his regional association who shall name another dancer member in good standing to serve as alternate delegate for that meeting.

ARTICLE VI

Meetings of this corporation shall be held as

1. Announcement of times and places of meetof Board of Delegates shall be made writing at least 10 days in advance to all delegates and representatives, and shall be reported in the official publication, BOW & SWING, A majority of the Board of Delegates shall consti-

2. Any member of Florida Federation of Square Dancers in good standing may attend the meetings of the Board of Delegates. Members may address meetings of the Board of Delegates but may not move that the Florida Federation of Square Dancers take a particular action nor may they vote on any motion

3. The annual meeting at which new officers shall be selected shall be held in October on a date selected by the chairman.

ARTICLE VII

The amount of indebtedness which the corporation may incur at any time is the sum of \$10,000.00. The corporation shall be financed \$10,000.00.

1. Each regional association shall pay to the Florida Federation of Square Dancers an initial fee of \$25.00 and annual dues of \$10.00. Payment of such moneys shall be made on or be-

ment of such moneys small fore the annual meeting.

2. Individual membership under Section III, paragraph 2, shall pay an initial fee of \$5.00 and annual dues of \$2.50 (per couple).

3. The Florida Federation of Square Dancers

shall have the power to raise and disburse moneys from such other sources and activities as may contribute to the purpose of this organization

State Convention Plans to Be Voted at FFSD Meet in Orlando

A PROPOSAL to add 50¢ per day to the registration fee and provide a midnight snack for all dancers present at the 1966 state convention in Orlando was presented to the Florida Federation of Square Dancers and will be formally accepted or rejected at their October meeting.

Appointments to the general convention committee include George Everett, Maitland, pre-convention registration and housing; Howard Miller, Orlando, convention registration; Syd King, Orlando, treasurer; George Barton, Orlando, halls, booths and banners; C. J. Colodonato and Danny Robinson, Orlando, demonstrations; Bob Brown, Orlando, liaison with local officials; Irving Bell, Orlando, Jack Jackson, Winter Park, and Eric Sohn, Winter Haven, afterparties; Bill Beckett, Orlando, and Paul Harding, Windermere, greeters; Ed Sincic, Pine Hills, publicity; and Gerry King, Orlando, decorations.

Committees appointed by the Florida Callers Association and the Round Dance Council of Florida would participate in the programming of the dances and in the arrangement of the sound systems.

Without the refreshment fee, early bird registration would be \$5.00 for the entire convention. After June 1 the full convention would be \$6.00, one day only would be \$3.00. Friday night only would be \$2.00, it was proposed.

October 3 through 9 will be FLORIDA SQUARE DANCE WEEK

OCTOBER is a traditional time for recruiting of square and round dancers in Florida, and this year the full force of a gubernatorial proclamation will be added through the designation of the first week in October as Square Dance Week in Florida.

Governor Haydon Burns made it official on August 12 and proceeded to "heartily commend this form of

recreation for all."

Just what form the observance of Square Dance Week will take throughout the state depends on the activity of local groups, but jamborees or rallies tying in with the occasion are being planned in Tallahassee and Jacksonville.

Members of the Round Dance Council who tabled action in June, went on record at their Labor Day meeting requesting that round dancing be officially included in any future proclamations. But everyone expected both round and square dancing to profit from the publicity.

Signed by the governor and countersigned by Secretary of State Ton Adams, the proclamation points to the general popularity of square dancing in Florida, adds that "it has proven highly entertaining and affords wholesome recreation for all, bringing close together all folks in all walks of life."

Proclamation Is Climax of Weeks of Work, Waiting

It was a Thursday morning when Barry Aronovitch, President of the Capital Squares, received a call to round up a photographer—he had an appointment with the Governor at high noon!

At precisely noon, the Governor graciously came into the anteroom where Aronovitch, the photographer and Bob Williamson were waiting. The Governor introduced himself and ushered the trio into his office to sign the proclamation. Shaking hands with the governor and thanking him on behalf of square dancing in general, Aronovitch gave him a badge prepared in advance, making him an honorary member of the Capital Squares, Tallahassee.

As the flashbulbs popped, one thought kept going through Aronovitch's mind—we've got it!

ment for Aronovitch, whose efforts, beginning last January, had sparked a campaign to mark the first week of October as Square Dance Week.

Aronovitch says that the idea came to him at a Dixie Federation Callers meeting held in Georgia in January, when he realized that many mayors proclaim in certain weeks as Square Dance Week for their towns. This gave him the idea of going for the big one—a state-wide proclamation by the Governor for a Square Dance Week for all of Florida.

In order to get the necessary sig-

natures, Aronovitch circulated a letter throughout Florida containing the petition requesting that the respective presidents sign it and mail it back to Tallahassee. Aronovitch says that he had many a concerned moment, worrying that the petition might get lost in the mail.

Finally, after two months of circulating, the petition, with its final signature, made its way back to Aronovitch. The following Monday the petition was presented by Williamson to the Governor's office for his consideration.



ARTICLE VIII

Amendments to this Charter shall be by the

following methods: Amendments to these articles may be initiated by two-thirds vote of the Board of Delegates, or by petition of members, such petition to state exactly the proposed amendment and to to state exactly the proposed amendment and to be signed by 20 members in good standing. When an amendment be initiated by petition, such petition shall be submitted to the Board of Delegates, which body shall not debate the matter or take any action upon it, but shall cause the amendment so initiated to be forwarded to the regional bodies for ratification.

2. Ratification shall be accomplished by unanimous affirmative vote of the regional dancers associations affiliated with the Florida Federation of Square Dancers.

> ARTICLE IX SEAL

The corporation shall adopt a seal with the words in the center circle, Florida Federation of Square Dancers, Inc., and in the inner circle, Corporate Seal. The corporate seal of the corporation shall be kept in the custody of the secretary and shall be necessary to give validity to all contracts of the corporation in according the secretary and shall be necessary to give validity. ance with the Charter and By-Laws of the same.
