Message from the President:

Dancers Have Duty

ALL TOO often we hear square dancers say, "I square dance to have fun and not to work." When he is asked to work on a committee, to assume an office in a club, he either will come out with the above remark or come up with excuse after excuse to avoid taking any responsibility for the success of his club.

He may show up at his club dance only when there is no special event going on at some other club. In short he continually takes all the pleasure he can possibly gain from square dancing but steadfastly refuses to put anything back. He will then probably cap it with a blast at the "clique" that runs his club or association.

Is it any wonder that long-time leaders and callers, who by any definition, must be considered as important in the leadership of our hobby, will throw up their hands in disgust and quit? Sometimes I wonder why more of them don't do it.

If square dancing in Florida is ever to reach its fullest potential every dancer must contribute his share to its growth. He must be willing to take on the necessary duties in his club that make it go. When there is a special party in his club, he should pitch in and do his part in the decorating, host and hostess duties, etc. Above all he must support his club with his attendance to the best of his ability. Other events must take second place on his club night a majority of the time.

Naturally it is understood that we all have responsibilities outside of square dancing that will all too often interfere with club dancing but if it becomes a choice between his club and another local square dance event, his club should come first most of the time.

In regard to the "clique" that runs his club, the dancer will do well to join them and not knock them. He can let his club president know that he will be glad to help out on some committee and he will probably be amazed at how quick his offer is accepted—after the president revives, of course.

In closing, I would like to say that square dance operations require effort on all of our parts whether we are dancers or callers and we cannot continually shirk our own responsibilities. Our callers put in far more hours than even the most active dancer with very little thanks for his efforts, so we as dancers can hardly justify refusing to do even the smallest task. Think it over—the future of square dancing may depend on you.—VIRGIL GREEN.

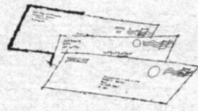

I HAVE been dancing for three years averaging better than once a week and have become concerned over the discontent that we have seen in square dancing the past year. Dancers that have been dancing as long as we have are dropping out or they no longer go to their club where they took lessons. It seems that they feel that there is no longer a challenge there. They miss dancing with their friends but some can only go one night a week and are seeking out a club that will teach them something new.

Why can't callers find an answer to this problem so that they can keep both the new dancer and the old interested. Why must we seek out a closed club to try and get in to fulfill their dancing pleasure.

It would seem to me that the caller could work out a half hour workshop that would satisfy the old and new dancers. It is true that not all dancers will get the new material but why deny those that will?

I was a witness to a sad scene the other night. A club had asked their caller to give them some workshop material and so the caller got up and called things that he had never given them and then told them that that was challenge dancing. Now I ask you is this challenge dancing or is challenge dancing a variety of calls that they have been exposed to? This is not what they wanted anyway—they wanted material that was new.

I wish that people would see, too, that the more clubs and classes we have going on the more people will come to know about square dancing. All clubs will benefit by more and more classes and clubs. They should keep an open mind and help out a new club and not be afraid that it will hurt their club. If it does there is something wrong and they better take a look and find out what. It is a square dancer's duty to promote dancing anywhere.—UNSIGNED.

More Dear Bow and Swing . . .

of us congregating in the SABENA Belgian Airlines lounge at Kennedy Airport in New York August 31. The plane, a Boeing 707, left Kennedy at 7:30 in the evening. We landed at Brussels, Belgium and changed planes, arriving at Frankfurt, Germany about 10:30 a.m., local time, where we were met by busses which took us to Mannheim, Germany.

After dinner that evening we were taken by bus to Heidelberg where we had our first square dance in the Heidelberg Castle Ballroom. The local American servicemen's square dance club was host and presented us with square dance badges for dancing in the castle and later in the evening for dancing on the wine barrel in the basement. The next day we took a three hour boat trip on the Rhine River, past the vineyards for which the Rhine is famous, and saw the dozens of ancient castles. We attended the 2nd All European Square Dance Convention in Mannheim that night and again the following night. We've been asked several times—yes, the calling is in English. The square dance callers with our tour did most of the calling. They were Dave Taylor of Michigan, Al Berry of Chilliwach, British Columbia, Don Armstrong of Florida and Bob Osgood of California. A number of American servicemen called too.

Probably over half of the crowd were American and Canadian servicemen and their wives, our tour made up the next largest group, and the balance was German and English couples. The German couples spoke fairly good English and we enjoyed talking to them between tips.

We next visited Lucerne, Switzerland, took an all-day tour of the snow capped Alps, spent one evening in a Swiss restaurant. Our hotel in Lucerne was palatial. Naturally, it was the Palace Hotel overlooking the Lake of Lucerne and with a beautiful view of the Alps. Some Swiss entertainers tried to teach us Swiss folk dances in the ballroom one night, and we tried to teach them to square dance.

From Switzerland we went to Rome, then to Vienna which we found to be the most beautiful city in Europe, mainly because of its many flowers, acres of roses and Schoenbrunn Castle with the most elaborate formal flower gardens anywhere. We had a luxurious banquet in Vienna with an orchestra playing Viennese waltzes while we dined. Between

courses all the square dancers danced and they waltzed beautifully. It may have been unusual, but nearly everyone on the tour turned out to be round dancers as well as square dancers. During this evening in Vienna some of them performed exhibition type rounds for us. When the orchestra took a break we put on records and Dave Taylor called for about an hour.

From Vienna we continued with a three day visit in Paris with its Seine River, Eiffel Tower, book stalls along the Left Bank, Louvre Museum and the Lido Nightclub where the tour group spent a wonderful evening with a steak dinner, champagne and a two hour floor show which exceeded anything I've ever seen. The costumes (what there was of them) were elaborate and colorful. The girls were beautiful, and the entire show exciting.

Next stop was London where we visited Stratford on Avon, Shakespeare's birthplace, reached by a wonderful all-day trip through the English countryside, past Oxford University and Windsor Castle. We spent a delightful evening at the Paladium Theater in London, saw the changing of the guard at Buckingham Palace and attended the "Third American/United Kingdom Square Dance Convention" in Victoria Hall, London. There were about 40 squares present at this dance, composed of about equal numbers of tour square dancers and English couples. Top callers were Tommy Cavanaugh, considered top square dance caller in England, and Dave Taylor and Al Berry of our tour.

Our last stop on the European tour was Brussels, Belgium, which appeared to be an extremely prosperous industrial city, with several skyscrapers and a subway system under construction. We had another elaborate banquet our last night in Europe at a resort hotel about an hour's drive outside Brussels. We left Brussels about 2:30 p.m., September 21, homeward bound.

Florida square dancers outnumbered every other state on this tour. With us were Robbie and Ginny Robinson and Lynn and Marge Hummel of Orlando, Chris and Julia Burns of Tampa, Shirley Chall of Miami Beach, Janet Klenke of Sarasota and tour escort Don Armstrong of Port Richey, Florida. We made a lot of friends on the tour and hope to meet them on another tour someday. — CARL AND ROSE LAW, Jacksonville.

Holiday for Rounds Tops Calendar

THE BIG EVENT of statewide interest in November is the Holiday for Rounds set for the Colonnade Beach Hotel at Lake Park November 5 and 6.

Highlights of the program promise to be the teaching of new dances and demonstrations by the state's top round dance teachers. Among the instructors who will teach new dances are Oscar and Fran Schwartz, Pat and Bill Bliss, Art and Dorothea Brammeier, Russ and Mabel Ayrtton, Ed and Kay Mack, Bill and Alma Fairchild, and Maurine and Margaret Patane.

By and Lou Markle of Venice are chairmen of the committee planning this year's Holiday.

Dancers planning to attend should note that the Colonnade Beach Hotel at Lake Park is the site of the Holiday. Tentative arrangements listed a hotel in Hollywood as the site, and the Calendar of Events was "on the press" when word of the change was received.

Special rates of \$10.30 for a room with twin beds have been set up at the Colonnade.

The second big event, of special interest in the Northeast area, is the Fall Roundup, to be held November 11 and 12 at the Mayflower Hotel, Jacksonville.

Nationally known caller Joe Lewis is featured. Lewis will conduct a workshop on Saturday afternoon and call for the evening dance Saturday night. Area callers will share the mike for the Friday night dance.

A major event for callers will be the Les Gotcher Institute at the Crown Hotel in Miami Beach November 13 through 20.

Stoltz Elected FFSD President At October 16 Meeting in Lakeland

WALTER STOLTZ of Bartow succeeded Virgil Green of Jacksonville as Chairman of the Florida Federation of Square Dancers at the annual meeting held in Lakeland Civic Center October 16.

The 1968 convention will be held in the 17th Street auditorium in Miami Beach on June 12-14, and the 1969 convention will be held on June dates tentatively reserved at Curtis Hixon auditorium in Tampa.

Continued financial losses incurred by Bow & SWING led to a recommendation that the magazine be reduced to 16 pages per issue unless advertising justifies a large book. A suggestion that subscription rates be increased did not get action by the board of delegates. A meeting of the Bow & SWING committee will be held in Kissimmee Nov. 20 in an effort to develop additional advertising and circulation revenue, and the retiring president, Virgil Green, was added to the permanent committee for the magazine.

The treasurer's report presented by Matt Bryan, showed a balance in the treasury of \$1883.74 plus accumulated savings account interest of \$3.54.

A permanent committee to help local interests to deal with the problems of state conventions was established and Stoltz named Frank Cornwall of Miami, Green, Warriner H. "Hink" Smith of St. Petersburg, and Al Cody of Kissimmee. Recommendations for the committee came out of a report by Harold Jenkins in which he suggested the four-man body with overlapping four-year terms made up from past chairmen of the federation. The group would act subject to approval of the board of delegates in such matters as selection of site, contracts, and be prepared to assume full responsibility for the convention except any portion assumed by the Florida Callers Association or the Round Dance Council of Florida.

After considerable discussion on the idea of flexibility of dates for the state convention, the importance of avoiding conflict with the national convention, and the desire to return to April or May dates in deference to Florida's winter dancing population, it appeared the matter would be left in the hands of the permanent committee to wrestle with, as both 1968 and 1969 mid-June dates were adopted.

Cornwall presented the report of the nominating committee which moved Bob Brown of Orlando to vice chairman, and placed Paul Lane of Jacksonville as secretary and Albert Martin of Orlando as treasurer.

Delegates seated on the new board include: West Coast Association—Walter Stoltz and C. W. Johnson, Jr., of Bartow, Morris Sogolow, and Matt Bryan of Tampa; Southeastern Florida Association—Jim Kier of Pompano Beach, and Kenny Kendall of Miami; Northeast Florida—Carl Law, Jacksonville, Chet Vetter of Gainesville, and Paul Lane of Jacksonville; Central Florida—Bob Brown and Al Martin of Orlando, Wayne Wallace and John Sullivan of Daytona Beach.

As he stepped down Virgil Green thanked the delegates for their cooperation during his term and past Chairman Jenkins asked for a rising vote of appreciation from delegates.

Stoltz declared "it is a tremendous job for me to follow in the footsteps of

Florida Callers Elect To Head FCA Roster

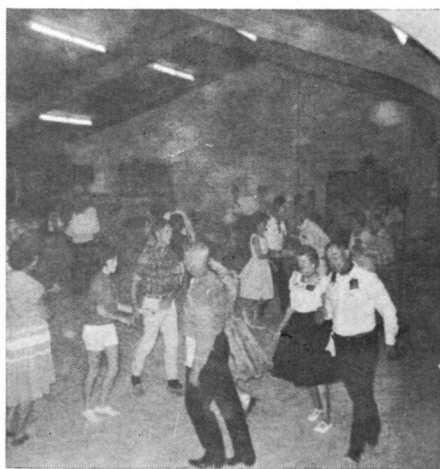

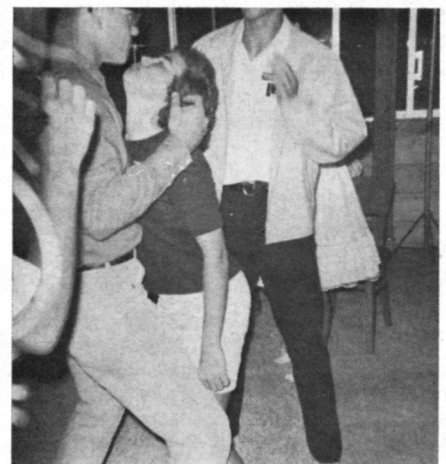

Johnson Draws Large Group to Caller's Clinic

BRUCE JOHNSON of Santa Barbara drew a record attendance—69 callers—for the Seventh Annual Callers Clinic presented by the Florida Callers Association in Lakeland Oct. 14 and 15.

Johnson called to a full Civic Center crowd Saturday night as callers welcomed Federation officers and directors and selected invited guests. Dancers and callers alike appeared to enthusiastically accept Johnson's strict cadence, his wit and humor, his piano-playing to the accompaniment of the round dance records, and his impromptu jig when the music provided the mood.

"Never before in the history of square dancing," he said in his introductory remarks, "have the communication lines between callers and teachers been so open and so available." But the volume of published material fails to meet fully the needs of the "newer leadership."

"It becomes more and more difficult to direct a newer caller or leader to information which will be useful to him at this stage of development," he said. Referring to his syllabus he said, "throughout the years I have gathered thoughts and articles from leaders whose philosophy and judgment I admire and respect. This is being presented with revisions and additions because these things are important and have proven helpful to me."

On advice for new callers, he had this: "Learn to dance well yourself first; then start a class and let them know that this is your first class and that you expect to learn as much from the experience as they will—probably a great deal more!"

When your baby gives that ole sweet talk to you

Jamaica Girl was taught at the Round Dance Council of Florida's fourth Sunday evaluation meeting for September by Joe and Ruth Curtis of Orlando.

Position for the introduction and opening is open facing, man's back to the center of the hall. Footwork is opposite throughout.

INTRODUCTION

1-4 Wait; Wait; Side, Close, Fwd, -; Side, Close, Bk, -; In open facing pos hands at shoulder level, M's bk to COH, wait 2 meas; Step swd in LOD on L ft, close R to L, step fwd twd wall on L, hold 1 ct; Step swd in RLOD on R ft, close L to R, step bwd twd COH on R, hold 1 ct (use slightly swaying motion, not touching hands);

5-8 Roll LOD, 2, 3, Tch; Roll RLOD, 2, 3, Tch; Two-Step Away; Two-Step to BJO; Still in OP roll down LOD L, R, L, tch R to L (M LF-W RF); Roll bk RLOD R, L, R, tch L to R (M RF-W LF); Do a small circle two-step turning away L, R, L, hold 1 ct (M L-W R); Continue turn R, L, R, hold 1 ct to end in Bjo-Pos M facing LOD;
