

Square Dancing is Fun For Almost All Ages

One of the happier aspects of modern western style square dancing is its almost universal appeal to all age groups. In Florida we have clubs made up of pre-teens, teen-agers, as well as adult groups and senior citizens. It is not too uncommon to find at least two and often three generations dancing and enjoying their own or mixed clubs. This is a healthy condition and one that should be expanded as far as possible.

The large numbers of pre-teens and teen groups that participate in square dancing in our state augers well for the future of our favorite form of recreation inasmuch as many of these young people continue to dance as adults. Provided, of course, that we manage to keep square dancing as a recreational form appealing to the many and not to the This is vital and cannot be stressed too much.

In many areas of our state our senior citizens have their own clubs and to them it gives welcome relief from the boredom of retirement and advancing age. It can be truly said that square dancing appeals to all youngsters from 8 to 80.

I believe that this family appeal is one of the very real strengths of square dancing and maybe should receive more stress than it has received to date. We read all kinds of articles that point up the decline of the family as an important unit in society under the pressures of high speed living and which is contributing to the moral decline in America.

Perhaps the family that participates in square dancing will have some small degree of greater cohesiveness and in its own way help to stem this trend. Most families that have at least some likes in common, whether it is square dancing, bowling, music, etc. have a greater tendency toward close relationships between its members than one that goes strictly in many directions at once.

This, is just one more reason, that we all should do all we can to promote square dancing as a recreational activity for r y people regardless of their station in life or their ability to dance frequently or infrequently. There must be roo. or all.—VIRGIL GREEN.

The month will begin with Square Dance Week October 2 through 8, wind up with a rush of Halloween Balls. In between is a schedule of events to confound the most active dancers.


High points in the extra-busy month will be the 1966 Callers Clinic and dance with Bruce Johnson in Lakeland October 14 and 15, the FFSD meeting in Lakeland October 16, the first annual Football at Orlando October 14, the Ancient City Festival at St. Augustine also on October 14, the Canaveral Squares' Pirates Ball at Cocoa October 18, the Central Florida Association Halloween Ball October 29 at Holly Hill, and the Fifth Saturday dance at the Square Dance Center of Lakeland October 29.

October will see nationally-known callers appearing all over Florida. Singin' Sam Mitchell will be appearing at the Round-Up in Hollywood October 16. Red Warrick is billed for October 15 at the Lake City Armory. Carl Geels of Fort Wayne, Indiana will be calling at Eau Gallie October 8, Hialeah October 12 and also in Jacksonville. Bob Bennett of Valdosta, Georgia is scheduled for the Grand Slammers' dance in Jacksonville October 8, and Bob Arnold of San Antonio, Texas will call for the Plant City Strawberry Strollers October 25.

Other events that promise to make October a month to remember are the Marco Island Weekend with Gordon Blaum October 22, the second annual Round-up at Hollywood October 30 and the Paxon Prancers Dance-athon at Jacksonville October 8.

Regularly scheduled events will include the Southeast Association meeting and dance at Adelphi Hall, Hollywood October 9, the first Sunday Rounds at St. Petersburg October 2, and the Fourth Sunday Evaluation meeting October 23 at the Roque Club in Orlando.



Date for State Convention Is Controversial Issue for FFSD

FLORIDA MISSES the boat by not having an effective promotional effort at the National Square Dance Convention, Wally Stoltz, of Bartow told the board of delegates of the Florida Federation of Square Dancers, and Harry Moore, chairman of the National executive committee, urged Floridians to make plans to be in Philadelphia next summer where there will be facilities capable of accommodating 11 thousand dancers in a single room.

This discussion of Florida's role at the National was made at a meeting of the Florida Federation at Clearwater during the recent Florida

Knothead Konvention.

Moore, a past chairman of the Florida convention and chairman of the Eleventh National Square Dance Convention held in Miami Beach in 1964,urged clubs to send their leaders to Philadelphia to participate in the panel discussions and exchange promotional ideas and material.

In Florida, "fun" seems to be a bad word, he said. "We need a change in our philosophy of square dancing," Moore continued, "so that we will accept everyone who danc-

es."

Square dancing must provide an environment for those who want to dance once a month as well as for those who dance several times a week, he added, and quoted one Miami caller as saying that we can have "thinking man's dancing" for an entire year without introducing any new material whatever—simply by providing variations in the arrangement of existing figures.

"Plans for the 1967 state convention in Jacksonville will be firmed after Chairman Carl Law returns from the Sets in Order European tour," Chairman Virgil Green of Jacksonville reported, "but more study must be given establishment of date and site for the 1968 convention, scheduled for Miami or Miami Beach."

Jim Kier, heading the Southeast Florida delegation, told of fruitless efforts to find solutions to several problems, and it was agreed to hold the matter open until the October meeting in Lakeland.

At the same time, a committee was asked to work with the Florida Callers Associations toward flexibility in establishing dates for the state convention.

It was pointed out that state conventions had consistently be en held in April and May until June dates were used to provide a dryrun for the National Convention several years ago. It was also pointed out that many dancers leave the state during summer months and that the state convention should be separated by several weeks from the national convention.

Weather is a factor. Both Bay area and Miami area spokesmen felt the earlier dates would be better, while Northeast Florida spokesmen felt that April dates should be avoided because of cool and rainy weather. Bob Brown called attention to the Florida Industrial Exposition which uses Orlando facilities in April each year.

Registrations at the Konvention Jump

1202 REGISTRATIONS were reported for the tenth annual Florida Knothead Konvention held over the Labor Day weekend in Clearwater, eclipsing the 1039 registrations racked up in 1965. Plans for 1967 include an even larger plywood floor in the Jack Tar Harrison ballroom and doubtless a repetition of the 1966 format in which two nationally-known callers conducted programs in two separate halls.

Vaughan Parrish of Boulder, Colorado and Chuck Raley of Anaheim, California were teamed for the main go this year. Friday night pre-dance calling was by Florida Knothead kallers and Li'l Tom Hidding of Jacksonville demonstrated his reverse calling at the Labor Day closing session after giving spectators a taste at the Sunday night skit session.

As usual, round dancing received full emphasis, with daytime workshop session scheduled in the Clearwater auditorium while square dancing workshops were in progress in the Jack Tar ballroom.

Roy and Olive Sprague of Miami revived the Jessie Polka and Bill and Louise Roundtree of Wilton Manors brought back Mannita Waltz (Western Jubilee 45-701A and Grenn 14018 respectively).

Cornwall of Miami, Al Martin, Stoltz and Chairman Green comprise the committee to work on flexible dates.

Financial report of the 13th Florida Square Dance Convention was embraced in the report of Treasurer Matt Bryan of Tampa, who said a net of \$1700.70 was distributed between the Florida Callers Association (and the Round Dance Council), the Central Florida Association and the state Federation, which netted \$510.60.

Chet Vetter, president-elect of the Northeast Florida Square Dancers Association and Jack Shuler of St. Augustine, recording secretary, were presented as new delegates representing Northeast Florida.

Past Chairman Frank Cornwall, Harold Jenkins of DeBarry and Smith of St. Petersburg "Hink" were named as a committee to present nominations at the Federation's annual meeting in Lakeland in Octo-

In a word of welcome at the Saturday night dance, a representative of the mayor's office hoped when the Knothead 20th Konvention is held "that you will have enjoyed holding all of them here with us."

Parrish and Raley alternated during the daytime workshop sessions, worked separate halls and exchanges podiums at mid-point for the two evening sessions. Dancers generally picked one hall or the other so that both locations were comfortably filled with no overcrowding.

Raley, who works with the Anaheim recreation department, had kind words for the Walt Disney organization, which he said helps support square dancing in the public recreation program.

Holiday for Rounds Set for November 5-6

THE FALL HOLIDAY FOR ROUNDS sponsored by the Round Dance Council of Florida is to be held at the Colonnade Beach Hotel at Lake Park November 5 and 6.

Election of officers will be key business at the organization's annual meeting held at that time, President Bill Fleshman of Jacksonville reported at the Clearwater meeting held September 4. A motion approving the arrangement at the Colonnade was duly approved.

A nominating committee consisting of Bill Leonard of Bradenton, Helen Crout of Jacksonville and Bill Fairchild of Miami was named by Fleshman to report at the November

A recommendation from the board of directors clarifying the status of honorary, associate and active members was presented to the membership and was referred to a special committee for further study.

Harbor City Squares Have Ups And Downs, Are Growing Now

HARBOR CITY Squares first began dancing in the fall of 1961. When caller Bob Rust came to the mike on those first Thursday night dances, there was an enthusiastic group of dancers ready for an evening of fun.

The club was, and still is, sponsored by the Eau Gallie Recreation Department, and danced at the Eau Gallie Civic Center.

The first club officers were: Jim and Claire Clancy, presidents; Ken and Mabel West, vice presidents; Walt and Ethel Minnerly, secretary-treasurer.

Shortly after the club was organized, the Wests become presidents and remained in that same capacity until the spring of 1963.

About this time, interests in square dancing was growing and other clubs were springing up in the area. Many Squares began dancing with clubs nearer their homes. This decrease in participation caused a re-organization of the club with Bruce and Judy Schultz as presidents and Jim and Bertha Hutchinson as vice presidents. The club caller was Rod Copeland of Eau Gallie.

Despite the new organization and the efforts of club officers and members, the Harbor City Squares didn't grow.

Finally, in November of 1963, with only six couples, the club had to move to smaller quarters provided by the Recreation Department. George Hinkel was signed as club caller.

Through the efforts of these six couples and George and Ruth Hinkel, the club began to grow. At this time, the present badge was adopted and in recognition of the work of this small group, a gold anchor was added to the badges of these seven couples.

George Hinkel graduated his first class of 32 dancers in June of 1964, and succeeding classes helped the membership to grow. In June of 1964 Councilman Vance Bell of the Recreation Department awarded plaques to the group and to George Hinkel for his outstanding services as caller.

Honorary memberships were awarded to Jim and Bertha Hutchinson for their outstanding service to the club. In 1966 honorary memberships were given to Harold and Florence Hennelly for their untiring efforts and help in round dancing.

In 1964, Mike and Nonie Brock became presidents; in 1965, Jim and Betty Hansen were presidents; Bob and Margaret Fisher are the 1966 leaders.

By May of 1966, the club had outgrown the smaller quarters. Activities were moved back into the large Eau Gallie Center, where the club continues to dance every Friday night.

A high point in the club's history was the first annual Sweetheart's Ball February 12, 1966, when the club hosted 40 squares of dancers to the calling of Frank Bedell. Ottis and Eleanor Hendrix of the Canaveral Squares reigned as the first king and queen. The second annual Sweetheart's Ball is scheduled for February 11, 1967, in the Eau Gallie Civic Center.

The Harbor City Squares is an open club and all dancers are invited to join them for an evening of fun and fellowship at their Friday night dances in the Civic Center.
