### September is 'Spring'

To MOST PEOPLE, September is probably thought of as the beginning of autumn, of cooler weather. However, to square dancing, this month is actually the spring of the year.

Spring is a time of beginning and of renewal and September with its many new classes is truly such a time for square dancing. Without these new classes, our hobby would very quickly disappear, therefore it is of vital importance to all of us to see that our classes are both numerous and large. I trust that dancers in Florida have been actively planning for their new classes and that most of them have friends they intend to bring to class on opening night. I want to emphasize the word bring in reference to getting people into class as there is no substitute for people to people contact in promoting a class. If you just invite them, they can easily say yes but will not show on the opening night. However, if you go out and get them, they often will find it hard to say no. Once you get them into class, square dancing has a way of selling itself, but it is very often necessary to go out and get beginners on their first night.

If each couple in Florida would go out and bring one couple to class during September, Square Dancing would have a very good year ahead of it in our state.

This is also a good time for square dance promotions like shopping center exhibitions, TV appearances, etc. These in themselves will not bring many new dancers into the fold but they do serve a very useful purpose in that they expose many people to our hobby and they will at least know what we are talking about when we try to recruit them for class.

This is a time of renewal for the older dancer as well. It is of no importance whether you are frequent or an infrequent dancer or whether you dance at high or low level, all of us need to recharge the spirit once in awhile and there is no better time to do it than now. If each of us would just watch a class, we would see that the most enthusiastic and happiest dancers anywhere on the average are the beginners. They are being exposed to the fun of square dancing for the first time and it has been a revelation for them.

All of us can take a lesson from these beginners and renew our own spirits with a liberal dose of this beginner enthusiasm. Bringing a new couple to class and helping and watching them get started is a good way to do this.

Good Luck to all clubs and callers with their new classes.

I no wish that the editor or president would comment on this matter. I became involved in square dancing about five years ago. During that time I have seen so much wrong with dancer courtesy that I wonder why some other person has not mentioned it.

### Square Dance Week Slated For October 2-8

THE FIRST WEEK OF October will have special significance for Florida square dancers. October 2 through 8 has been proclaimed by Florida Governor Haydon Burns as Square Dance Week.

Requesting the proclamation on behalf of Florida square dancers was Virgil Green of Jacksonville, president of the Florida Federation of Square Dancers. Announcing the signing of the proclamation and the dates of the 1966 observance, Green urged Florida clubs and callers to hold special events to mark the week.

All of Florida's associations are expected to celebrate Square Dance Week. For one of the associations, a dance held the last of September will serve as kick-off event for Square Dance Week. The West Coast Square and Round Dance Association will stage their kick-off event September 30 at Lakeland. Caller John Saunders and round dance instructors Ed and Kay Mack are billed for this dance.

This is the second year that a gubernatorial proclamation has made Square Dance Week official. In 1965 Governor Burns proclaimed the observance for October 3 through 9.

Last year's celebration was aimed primarily at publicizing square dancing. In the Northeast area, a group of Fun and Frolics appeared on WFGA TV's Today in Jacksonville show with caller Jack Griffiths. Bill Fleshman was interviewed on the show.

A kick-off dance for the week was held on the carrier Shangri-La with over 450 dancers attending.

In Tallahassee, a city-wide Square Dance Week was proclaimed by the mayor, and a city-wide dance was held at the Florida State University Ballroom.

Last year in the Southeast, caller Colin Walton and National Convention Committee Chairman Harry Moore were guests on WIOD's Larry King Show. Newspapers in Fort Lauderdale and Hollywood carried publicity items about square dancing in the area.

On the West Coast, Lakeland Mayor Lois Searl proclaimed a city-wide square dance week. Local clubs joined for an exhibition dance at Searstown Shopping Center.

#### PROCLAMATION

State of Florida Executive Department Tallahassee

WHEREAS, the square dance has become one of the most popular pastimes in our State, and

WHEREAS, it has proven to be highly entertaining, and affords wholesome recreation for all, and

WHEREAS, it is now time to "Square Up" since it is Square Dance time in Florida, and

WHEREAS, it provides fellowship, and goodwill, bringing close together all folks in all walks of life;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Haydon Burns, by virtue of the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Florida, do hereby proclaim October 2 - 8, 1966, as

SQUARE DANCE WEEK.

in Florida, and heartily commend this form of recreation for all.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Florida to be affixed at Tallahassee, the Capital, this 31st day of March, A.D., 1966.

At the close of last year's celebration, it was suggested that a coordinated effort be made to hold area festivals for the 1966 event to publicize square dancing in every part of the state. Florida clubs and callers are being urged to begin planning now for their Square Dance Week festivities. Officals call the event "a golden opportunity" and encourage Florida groups "to make good use of it."

### **Three Big Ones Lined Up For Labor Day**

SEPTEMBER will begin with three bang-up events set for Labor Day Weekend.

Topping the list of events is the annual Knothead Konvention at Clearwater. A complete program for the three-day Konvention appears on pages 10 and 11 of this issue.

A second Labor Day Weekend event for Florida's West Coast will be the annual Ox Bow Spectacular at St. Petersburg. The 1966 edition of the Spectacular features callers Colin Walton, Joe Johnson and Jim Pearson. Round Dance leaders Russ and Mable Ayrton complete the lineup. The Spectacular will begin Friday night with a "fun for everyone" dance at 8:00. Saturday and Sunday dancing will begin at 1:30.

Labor Day Weekend in the Southeast will be highlighted by the second annual Whirligig at the DiLido Callers Jack Jackson and Lew Green with other guest callers will be at the mike. The Whirligig gets underway in Miami September 3, ends September 5.

The Florida Federation of Square Dancers and the Round Dance Council will meet September 4, dur-

ing the Knothead event.

A second September event in the Southeast will be the Association meeting and dance September 11 at the Round-up in Hollywood. The meeting will begin at 2:00 p.m. followed by dancing to area callers.

Another association dance for September is the West Coast Fifth Friday event at Lakeland Civic Center September 30. John Saunders will call. Ed and Kay Mack will handle the rounds.

A feature of September in the Northeast will be the Camp O'Leno Hoedown sponsored by the Starlite Walt Knight, Scotty Shufflers. Thomas and Floyd Hazen will call. The dancing will begin Saturday September 24, continue through Sunday.

Most important to square dancing is the beginning of new classes in September. From the Bow & SWING news desk, it appears that prospective dancers all over the state will have an opportunity to attend classes in their area. A listing of many classes to begin is featured on page 6 of this issue.

### **How To Get Publicity**

There's no time like the present. This old saying applies well to square dance clubs who would like to promote their hobby. New classes should be an incentive to publicity efforts, and Florida Square Dance Week provides a good opportunity.

A quick survey of dance publicity shows that, while many clubs are taking advantage of publicity possibilities, other clubs are not making an effort or are not getting cooperation from local news media. Some of these clubs say they have been disappointed in past efforts.

What should a club expect from a notice in the newspaper or an exhibition dance? Certainly not a rush of prospective dancers pounding at the door, emphasize club officials who have been promoting dancing for years. These people say that the main benefit of publicity is to acquaint non-dancers with square dancing, to make them more receptive to a personal invitation to join a class, and to improve the "public image" of square dancing.

To many clubs the words "publicity" and "public relations" sound expensive and complicated. They don't have to be. In most towns an active publicity committee can get free publicity for a club or class.

Publicity efforts by Florida clubs and callers include the flyer "It's Fun to Square Dance" for George Hales' new class and the newspaper advertisement for Adelphi College, Miami.

Most newspapers, both weeklies and dailies, carry a calendar of events. A listing in this calendar can usually be obtained by contact with the newspaper. Many clubs are featured in articles with photographs in local newspapers. Here personal contact with the society editor is important. Clubs who have had difficulty in getting publicity from newspapers can use Square Dance Week to full advantage.

Square dancing is colorful. Its activities can provide exciting photographs, clever headlines, and light copy—all close to the heart of any society editor or reporter.

In attempting to get newspaper coverage for a special dance or event, notify the society editor well in advance, as much as two weeks. How the newspaper will handle coverage will vary, but the society editor will explain what she wants in material from your club.

Paid advertising in the local newspaper can be helpful. Costs for a small notice in a large daily can be under \$10, in a small weekly under \$5. Least expensive of all is the classified ad or personal notice.

Local radio stations often feature calendar events type announcements. Here is another opportunity. Many local television stations will feature square dancing on daytime shows, as demonstrated during last year's Square Dance Week and this year's State Convention. A club hoping to arrange this kind of publicity for 1966 Square Dance Week should begin now.

One of the most-used publicity tools is the poster. While printing of posters can be expensive, a club can cut the cost. Several clubs can get together and have a basic poster printed that all can use, sharing the cost. The posters can be designed so that they can be used year after year, with space for filling in details about classes or important dances.

A club with no budget for publicity can have a publicity party. Here each dancer or each couple can create a poster, with the best winning a prize. Afterward posters can be put up in local stores. Effective posters can be made easily with inexpensive poster board, red and black felt-tip pens. An easy illustration would be a silhouette of dancers cut from black carbon paper. Pictures of the club

### 441 Club Keeps Interest High By Dancing to Different Callers

In April 1960, in response to continued requests for more fun-level dancing from relatively experienced dancers in the Lake City, High Springs, Gainesville, Ocala area, Dr. and Mrs. Ernest R. Bartley organized the US 441 Square Dance Club. The original intent was to meet one Saturday night a month from October through June and to alternate dance location to equalize travel distance among dancers in the area.

Aubrey and Elizabeth Griffis suggested the design for the badges. Manny Amor, now calling in Lakewood, New Jersey, painted the first club banner.

The new club was an immediate success with a membership of eight squares. The first few dances were held at Buchholz Junior High School in Gainesville. Later dances were held in Alachua and at Camp O'leno near High Springs. Within a year membership had increased to about thirteen squares.

Travel attrition, relocation of dancers, and inter-city club activity conflicts reduced attendance to dancers primarily from the Gainesville-Ocala area. Within the second year attendance dropped to about four squares. This did not provide sufficient revenue for the Bartleys to meet expenses at the existing single dance prices, so a reorganization was initiated by some of the Dancers.

In April 1963 the reorganized 441 Square Dance Club was launched under dancer control. A set of bylaws provided, among other things, for a 40 couple limit, quarterly dues payment, and caller rotation. Some 30 couples joined the club, one-half of whom are still members.

Caller and hall arrangements are the responsibility of the vice-president with the concurrence of the president. All receipts and disbursements are handled by the secretary-treasurer. Host and hostess duties are rotated among members but supervised by the special events chairman. Club officers and past presidents serve as the selection committee for new members. Memberships are extended by invitation after the second dance visit for prospective members.

Present membership numbers 22 couples. All are also members of

other clubs in the area. The club dances at Gainesville's Howard Bishop Junior High School Cafetorium on each second and fourth Saturday night of the month. The regular dance year extends from October through June. In the summer the club operates an open workshop session for current and prospective members. Out-of-town visitors are always welcome. The club has had as many as six squares of visitors at a dance.

The policy of engaging a different caller for each dance has kept member's interest high and sharpened their knowledge of new basics and figures. Club members have danced to 23 different callers one or more times in the past three years. Four couples have Century Club badges and several others have danced to the required number of callers.

Club members Don and Gwynneth Brookes commented, "Our visitors have kept us aware of our social responsibilities and encouraged members to visit other clubs and attend special dances. A policy of awarding miniature 441 badges to third-time visitors has been well received. Bill and Ruth Fleshman of Jacksonville were the first recipients.

Most of us travel widely so don't be surprised if your corner or opposite couple at a future dance is weara US 441 badge. P. S. We all have Ed Mack's Goofers' permits."

(Continued from page 7) dancing pasted on the poster can show how much fun dancing is!

Perhaps the most popular publicity idea is the demonstration. A suggestion here would be to not wait for opportunities, but to look for them. A first step would be to get in touch with local groups-the Chamber of Commerce, Parent-Teacher Association, and others-and offer to present demonstrations. As in all publicity efforts, clubs should emphasize the non-profit and fellowship aspects of square dancing.

Bow & Swing can also be used as a publicity tool. Each month copies can be placed in waiting rooms, lobbies and the local library. An added touch would be a letter signed by a club member inviting non-dancers to join local classes or visit local clubs. The letter can be stapled to the page featuring area news or Where to Dance.

This issue of Bow & Swing can be put to good use promoting classes. The appropriate classes listed on page 6 can be marked and an invitational letter inserted.
