Several clubs are having classes at this time. Are your class dancers insured? No, if you have not enrolled in the square dancer's insurance and, no, if you have not sent in the Class Roster form that the United Square Dancers of America require from the insured clubs. There is no charge for submitting the students name. You can find the form on the floridasquaredance.com website. Fill it out on line or print it and send it to Keith Olds by email keitholds@att.net or USPS 4549 Canard Road, Melbourne, FL 32934. Coverage on the insurance starts when it reaches the USDA Insurance Director. So, don't delay. Accidents happen when you least expect them. The insurance is only \$4.75 a dancer. That is probably the cheapest insurance you can buy. The insurance covers you when you dance at a recognized dance (not your friends garage). It is a secondary insurance but think how much your portion would be if you broke an ankle or arm in a fall. Of course, every dancer in the club must be covered because of the million-dollar liability coverage the policy offers. Think about it and give Keith a call.


The board has started visiting clubs. We have been to three so far. So, watch out you may be next!

64th FL Square and Round Dance Convention Update #1

A calming mist has settled over the enchanted forest as the wizards take a brief rest from the frenzy of the Convention Kickoff. There is so much to do; find a place for the Trail End dance, get more hotels to give us discounts, tell Daytona that square & round dancers will be invading in February and we want discounts; but for now there is also time to dance.

Our story began at the Kickoff for the 64th Convention, where we learned that the Magic of Dance Will Enchant You. Your squares will not break down, and round dancers will float gracefully as if on clouds.



We also learned that Clarence, the Misguided Magician, had cast a carpet spell on the Lakeland center, causing it to grow luxurious carpeting from all of its floors. He thought that his spell was in keeping with the Convention theme, "The Magic of Dance Will Enchant You," but he discovered that dancers are not enchanted by carpet, even if it sings perfect harmony. Alas, Clarence was unable to undo the spell, and we had to find another place to dance.

Convention Chair-Wizard Lewis stepped in, and, after consulting with Grand Wizard Google, he determined that the best place for the dance would be the Ocean Center at Daytona Beach. Unfortunately, Clarence had already visited the Ocean Center as well. In fact, he has been very busy throughout Florida, and it is impossible to find a large enough dance hall with a decent dance floor. Chair-wizard Lewis agreed to plant some trees in the Enchanted Forest so that the dancers would have a nice wood floor to dance on. Registration Wizard Dennis Taylor consulted the Magic Mirror to find out how many dancers there would be, but the Mirror was hazy on the subject, so we depend on the dancers to register early, so we know how much floor we will need. To encourage early registration, we are keeping the early-bird price of \$35 through May.

In case you missed our kickoff, there are a number of new features on the way for 2018. Foremost is the Daytona Ocean Center, a modern facility on Daytona Beach, surrounded by restaurants, attractions, and, of course, the beach. Our intrepid Web-Wizard, Bruce Morgan has posted a brief video about Daytona Beach and the Ocean Center at the Convention website:

120 people registered at the Convention this year, which means that if you have not registered yet, 120 people have the jump on you in getting their Dance Passports signed off.

Dance Passports are a new feature for 2018. Every person who registers for the Convention gets a Passport. You bring it with you all year, and have it dated and initialed every time you dance. Then bring it with you to the Convention, and we will award prizes for the most nights danced, the most clubs or events visited, and some random drawings for prizes. Be sure to turn in your passport at the registration desk on Friday at the convention. If you know you will be unable to attend the convention, we will give you a passport for a donation of \$5, so you can play too. The best way to get lots of sign-ins is to register early and get started! Dance Passports are not valid for international travel. Clarence the Misguided Magician offered to enchant all of the Dance Passports so that they would make a loud buzzing sound if they were left behind when their owner went dancing, but the Ways and Means Wizards admonished him that it would only be annoying. Anyway, people will want to keep their passports handy because of all the great prizes.

The other thing that we are really excited about is our Blast Class. Why a blast class? The blast class is our answer to an early-in-the-year convention. We would not want to all go off to the convention and tell our new students "you can't come to the party this year because you don't know enough." That would be awful. So a blast class is for our new students to come join the fun. In California, they had 4 squares of students and one square of newbies off the street. We need new approaches to introduce square dancing to our friends. Bob Ormsbee and Keith Stevens will give our new dancers a great experience. We want them to come for a weekend, and stay for a lifetime! Please invite your friends to join you for a wonderful weekend. Please post the invitation for the blast class on your social media. It is the same cost as the convention.

We would like to thank all of you who attended our kickoff at the 63rd Convention. We appreciate your support, and we hope that it was fun and informative. We also acknowledge Keith Stevens and the Flowing Figures, who provided the dance number at the beginning, and we would like to give a special thank-you to Keith and Angie Olds, who did such a great job creating the book of Our Story.



Unintended Consequences

When some activity we are involved in does not go as well as we hoped (or we didn't get our way), we often look for someone or something to blame. When we can place the blame, we get excited because identifying the culprit is a big step to solving the problem.

I hope no one took that first paragraph seriously. Assigning fault does next to nothing in fixing a problem. But we can feel better because we can say, "It's his fault, not mine. He set up the situation I stuck in. All I can do is make the best of a bad situation."

Ever since the number of people involved in square dancing began to decrease, square dancers and callers have tried to figure out why. The blame game began. The most obvious target was CALLERLAB. For example, some critics say since CALLERLAB held its first convention in 1974 it weaseled its way into the National Square Dance Convention. The critics continue that in 1976, when the largest National was held in Anaheim, there were CALLERLAB level or program signs all over the place – Mainstream, Plus One, Basic, etc. The number attending National Conventions began to drop. Twenty-five years later, when the National was in Anaheim there were less than half the number that attended in 1976. The 50th NSDC held in 2001 was the largest one in the twenty-first century. The fault must lie with CALLERLAB because of all the levels: Basic, Plus (No Plus I & II, but a combined list), Advanced, Challenge, not to mention levels in Round Dancing and even in Contra Dancing.

The critics say that CALLERLAB with all of its complexity of levels, and figure definitions, etc., took the fun out of square dancing.

Of course these critics and blame setters rarely look at what has happened in society as a whole. Occasionally they mention TV and DVDs. They do not see that participation in almost all social group activities have fallen off. The membership in groups like the elks and the Shriners are not near what they had been in the 1960s or 1970s.

But, once we can say with certainty that CALLERLAB is at fault, we can now look at what CALLERLAB has done, then undo it. Well, square dancing became very fractionalized, so we need to go back to just square dancing. One floor for all.

Starting in the early 1960s, before there was a CALLERLAB, callers and dancers were complaining about too many new figures. And they had good reason to complain. As many as 200 new figures a year were being published in callers' note services. CALLERLAB set out to analyze the figures to see which ones were truly new (not just combinations of old figures jammed together and given a name). For a call to survive it must be danceable, that is flow smoothly, timeout with music, etc. Most of all, all figures must meet the approval of callers and dancers alike.

To measure the approval rating of calls, CALLERLAB asked a large number of callers from around the country and the world to respond to suggested calls that could end on the lists. That endeavor was pretty successful in helping to update and stabilize the lists.

But said some, where is the input from the dancers? So they tried counting how many times a figure was actually called at dances. This frequency counting has been used by several groups with the theory that if the lists change to what dancers want to dance and callers want to call, people will come flooding back into square dancing.

That idea was a big flop. Callers thought they had solved the problem, but it did not really cross their minds that non-dancers have no idea about lists. Non-dancers are attracted to square dancing because of what they see and hear of it. If dancers are enthusiastic about square dancing, they are more likely to bring new dancers in. On the other hand, if people try square dancing and feel like they have been driven out because they cannot keep up with the number of figures and the ways that callers can put them into sequences, they drop out. And they tell their friends that they tried and it was no fun.

There have been a number of attempts to create programs where there is much less to learn. There are two kinds of simpler programs: one is an entry program, whose goal is to get people hooked on square dancing and then send them up the ladder of programs. The other kind of programs is a destination program. One example of this type of program is the Community Dance Program, which limited the number of figures to be learned, but it did use those figures in a variety of formations and with a greater variety of music. In the same style is the modern, live-music

contra dance – attend the pre-dance workshop to learn the basics, then dance the rest of the night.

The Community Dance Program did not catch on with modern square dance callers. And contra dance became a separate world.

So, the problem remains: how to attract and retain dancers. One plan is to create and advertise a program that lasts only 15 weeks (not a whole year) and, obviously has a shortened list. The vote is not in on this program, but it has attracted the attention of a number of callers nationwide. The unproven part of the program is what do the new dancers do after they have completed the 15 week course? Are the callers/teachers going to offer an on-going series of dances at that level? Or is it expected that the new dancers will then move into a new program with more figures? Can these new dancers mix with dancers who have gone through the traditional CALLERLAB program? Does the new program meet the needs of dancers and callers across the country, or is it designed for RV park residents and callers?

Those who have designed and are promoting this new program are very sincerely trying to increase participation in square dancing. Unfortunately, I see a lot of unanticipated consequences that will not be easy to repair.

If we are looking for a program that is both entry and destination, I can't think of anything better than the CALLERLAB Basic program. I have not met a new dancer who wouldn't love to stop at Basic and just dance for a length of time. If somehow we could let new dancers get comfortable with the basics and give the dancers time to learn to dance with grace and style, we would retain more dancers than we lose. How much better it is to make our dancers happy with square dancing and thereby change the reputation of square dancing.

Bob Osgood said it well when he said that no one ever dropped out of dancing because it was smooth and comfortable.




