
Again, our next 5th Saturday Dance is July 29 at Granada Squares in Ormond Beach. (See flyer on back cover.)

Have you already completed, or at least





64th FL Square and Round Dance Convention Update # 2

Even though the Convention is many months away, the wizards are hard at work making preparations. There is a surprising amount of work that goes into making a magical weekend of dance. The seeds planted in the Enchanted Forest have sprouted to seedlings, and Wizard Lewis has been busy tending the delicate little plants which will become your dance floor next year. It is remarkable how quickly trees can grow in the Enchanted Forest.

Several of the wizards took a walk down Atlantic Avenue in Daytona Beach, and they were impressed by the variety of restaurants, the number of stores, and the smell of the salty air wafting over from the beach. Within a couple blocks of the Ocean Center, they found the Daytona Lagoon which has a water park and a "Dry Park" for the young-at-heart. The Daytona Boardwalk and beach are right there as well. The wizards were talking about doing a "sand flea" dangle dance on the beach. At the Convention Kickoff, Wizards Lewis and Linda received a statuette of square dancers from the Huddlestons, although they were unable to provide a good explanation of the history of the statuettes and their significance. So we delved into the history mystery, and we were surprised by what we were able to uncover. As many square dancers are aware, Henry Ford was a great proponent of square dance, requiring his many employees to participate. In 1924, he wished to employ Benjamin Lovett as caller and dance teacher in Dearborn, Michigan, but Mr. Lovett was under contract with the Wayside Inn. After failing to negotiate the release of Mr. Lovett's contract, Mr. Ford purchased the Wayside Inn, satisfied Mr. Lovett's contract, and hired him to teach in Dearborn. Lovett's contract was for 2 months, but he stayed in Dearborn for 26 years. What is little known is that back then, Clarence the Misguided Magician, at the time known simply as Wizard Clarence, was also involved in dancing. Clarence could see how happy people were when dancing, and he wished that he could find a way to record the joy of dance, and preserve the history of Square Dance for future generations. Clarence made a pair of happy dancing statuettes from clay, and he enchanted them to remember the happiness of the dances that they attended. He made them look just like his friends Kenneth and Barbara Dollander, and the other wizards thought that Clarence had actually turned his friends into statuettes. This got Clarence demoted to Magician, and he has been known as Clarence the Misguided Magician ever since.

Lots of folks have asked me what Google Home is, and why they should care. Home is the Google Assistant in a little round box. It responds to your voice, answers questions, plays music, plays games, and lots of other things. With Chromecast, Home (or your smartphone, tablet, or computer) can broadcast movies, TV, slideshows, and other media on your TV. New features are added to Home all the time. It recently learned how to talk you through a recipe step by step, and it can help you manage your shopping list. All you need is WiFi, and a smartphone or tablet to set it up, and there are no monthly charges.

Have you heard? There's going to be a new caller in town November 10 – 11, 2017! Don Moger, a caller from Montreal, Canada, is going to be here calling at the West Coast Association's 43rd Annual Fall Fun Fest, along with Bob Stern, a well-known caller in central Florida. Our very own Jimmy and Carol Griffin will be cueing for the weekend. I don't know about you, but I like trying out new callers!

For those that don't know Don, here is his bio as posted on the Internet: Don started dancing in 1975, and began his career as a caller by teaching a group of teens to square dance in the same year. About a year later, a well-known caller relocated to the U.S... This changed Don's calling workload from one night a week to five nights a week.

Don has held executive positions on MASDA, CVCA, and MACA and is a member of CALLERLAB. He has also appeared on 4 different television shows to promote Square Dancing.

In 1988, a dream became a reality when Don opened the doors of a full time Square Dance hall. Don operated and called at the hall seven nights a week for many years. A different level was danced each night.

As of June 2004, after 36 years, Don retired from his job of Technical Advisor in a lithography company. He now has more time to spend traveling and calling square dances, an activity he loves so much.

Don has two sons, both of whom share a passion for sports with him. Don and Avena live in Montreal and call for clubs that dance Mainstream thru C2. The summer schedule is also very busy with regular workshops at all levels.

In addition to his club activities, calling engagements have taken him throughout Canada, many states in the U.S, as well as England, Germany, Denmark, Sweden, France, Austria, and the Czech Republic.

Don strives very hard to structure the choreography so that it is interesting and creative. Don also spends many hours in his selection of music, which is always appreciated by the dancers His ability to challenge and bring out the best in dancers at all levels is attested to by the zealous enthusiasm displayed by all who attend his dances.

Bob Stern started calling in 1974 in the Syracuse, New York area, and moved to Florida in 1999. He is currently Mainstream thru A-2 for four different clubs Bob is a member of the Suncoast Callers and Cuers Association (SCCA), the Florida Callers Association (currently serving as president), and a member of CALLERLAB since 1978 where is past Advance Chairman.

Jimmy and Carol Griffin began square dancing in 1983 and round dancing in 1985. They are members of The Round Dance Council of Florida, of which Carol was President in 1995, ICBDA (International Choreographed Ballroom Dance Association), and Roundalab. They were Vice Chairman of Rounds at the 46th National Square Dance Convention in, Orlando, FL, in 1997.

Presently they have a Phase 4 & 5 Round Dance Club, Spinarounds. They BOTH also cue at several local clubs. They were on staff of the Florida Winter Fest and the Daytona Beach Ball for many years.

They have choreographed some very popular dances such as Return to Sender, Volcano Samba, Blue Side Of Lonesome, Musical Fantasy, A Fool Such As I, Time To Rumba, I Really Don't Want To Know and La Mer D'Amour. They have taught and cued at several national conventions, numerous weekend specials, educational clinics/seminars, state conventions and charity events.

In addition to their busy dance schedule, they are both employed full time. They have three sons, who are former square dancers, and live in St. Petersburg, FL.

As you can see, we have a very impressive staff! Ribbons are available for \$18 per person for the entire weekend; Friday and Saturday \$20 per person; Split Friday or Saturday after 6:00 p.m. \$10 per person, and Saturday all day \$15 per person. Split ribbons can only be purchased at registration desk. Callers and cuers who call and/or cue in the West Coast Association area admitted free; ribbons can be picked up at the registration table.

The program includes Mainstream through Advance squares and Phase 2 - 4 rounds and workshops. An extra hour of rounds has been added to Saturday afternoon.

Host hotel is Holiday Inn Express (863-533-8070) and the alternate hotel is Stay Inn & Suites (863-533-0711). Be sure to ask for the square dance rate!

PROCEDURE FOR PRESENTING AWARD/AWARDS:

1) The award(s) should be presented on Saturday evening at the Florida State Square & Round Dance Convention held in May of the same year, by the current president of the Florida Federation.

2) The award(s) presented shall be a framed document and an "Extra Mile Award Recipient" bar or dangle.

Attack Of The Floaters By Ed Foote

Beware of the floaters! They can invade any square at any time at any program, from Mainstream to Challenge. They break down squares slowly and stealthily, without any regard or recognition of the destruction they are causing.

A floater is someone who does not achieve a precise position after a call. A floater will be 1/8 off (more or less) and often will be standing at a 45-degree angle, in an attempt to be prepared to move in several ways on the next call. Floaters are like liquid cement: you never know when they are going to set up.

A floater constantly needs help from others in the square to achieve the correct facing direction. But since a person may "float" on several calls in a row, everyone in the square must be alert and able to help at some point. If the help is not forthcoming, the floater will cause others to lose their orientation as well, and the square will slowly dissolve into one mass blob.

A floater may also float out of the square, which usually causes an instant breakdown, since there is not enough time to maneuver the floater back to the correct position. A floater will often want to turn around, which wreaks havoc with anyone who is trying to help the floater. A floater is usually always in motion and appears to be quivering all the time, never achieving a final position.

Why is a person a floater? Because he or she does not know definitions. Once dancers are confident in definitions, they cease to float. But most floaters do not seem to care about knowing definitions. Instead, they are content to float along, causing extra work for others and breaking down squares.

Floaters will often say: "I don't need to know definitions – someone will pull me through." What a selfish attitude! In other words, their position is: "As long as I'm having fun, I don't care if this causes other people not to have fun."

But floating is not a problem because, - hey, square dancing is fun, right? Perhaps for the floater, but eventually not for others. Eventually, some people say: "I've had it with pulling people through who don't know what they are doing – I'm going to take up some other activity." But this is socially unacceptable to say, so silence reigns, and the square dance population gets smaller.

The Continuation Of Our Great Activity

For all of the people who are already in our great activity of square dancing this info is well known, but what we need to do is inform more people who have not yet had the opportunity of learning to square dance, so I am taking the opportunity of sharing this info. If you have friends who might like to square, or who have learned, but are not dancing at this time, please invite them out to a dance with you so that we can all know that square dancing is a great, healthy and inexpensive activity. For all the ones who are square dancing it is our duty to educate some new people on what fun we are having. Let me give you some facts that could make our square dancing activity grow. That is what we need, correct?

First of all, most, but not all of the square dance clubs only charge 5 - 6 admission fee. For that small charge you have at least two full hours of great square dancing, round dancing, and fellowshipping with some of the nicest people that you might ever come in contact with. The dance that you attend normally has snacks, finger foods and goodies of some kind to munch on – at no extra charge. Sound good so far?

Western style square dancing today is not like it was "back in the day". Modern music is used, music that you can sing along with, has a wonderful beat and makes you want to keep your fingers tapping on the table if you are not on the floor participating in the great fun. Alcohol isnot allowed at any square dance function and to my knowledge very few people ever go outside to "smoke".

In the summertime most clubs go "casual" in dress which of course means that you can wear jeans or capris, short sleeve shits and be comfy depending on the temperature. During the rest of the year square dance clothes are adorning the floors all over the place. Yes, some people think they are "expensive, old fashioned and out of style", but hello you would really be surprised at those who love to dress up. To make matters even more simple there are places where you can buy gently used square dance clothing – including beautiful petticoats, or matching outfits for couples who love to dress up to help the caller keep up with who's who in the square.

If you do not know WHERE to dance there is an electronic newsletter called the Dancergram.com, which is put out by someone who has been square dancing for many years and who fills her electronic newsletter with all kinds of important information on when and where to dance, plus articles that contain many things about square dancing. There is also another website known as "Where's the Dance" indicating which clubs are dancing when and where. There is also the Florida Square and Round Dance Association website which is loaded with some great info.

If you have a family of four and the admission is \$6.00 per person you can spend \$24.00 and for at least two hours you can participate in a delightful night out with your family very inexpensively.

You ask, "Well what if I don't how to square and round dance?" Refer to the website references given above to find that info out. So basically why not give it thought and find out just how much fun you can have for such a small amount of money. I guarantee you will not be disappointed once you find out how many wonderful friends you will make doing something very healthy for yourself.

There are also larger events such as conventions held in various areas which are once to three days in duration where you basically dance, dance, and dance some more. Of course dance of this type, i.e. cost more than an average weekly dance.

Square dancers are known to "love to eat out together" so generally after a dance at a great square dance – guess what – you all get together and share a meal somewhere and then get to know each other on a more personal level. It's kind of hard to communicate in a square so your visiting comes later and you will be so surprised at how easy it is to become "addicted" to having a lot of fun for a small amount of money.

Please pass this info around and let's see what happens to square dancing in our own particular area as well as all over the globe. Oh, by the way, we have a hall in our area known as Strawberry Square which is known as the square dancing capitol of the south and it is located right in Plant City, Florida.



We are always looking to encourage all ages to learn to square dance and lessons are given at different locations. We welcome anyone who really wants to have some good, clean family fun. Hope you are one of the ones who will copy and paste and share this message and help us grow square dancing in every area. We welcome homeschool groups, school age children from 7 years old and on up to as far as we can go. We still have people dancing well into their 80's and enjoying themselves while keeping healthy.

How did USDA get its start?

In November of 1978, the idea for a national dancer's association was presented to the California Square Dance Council. The intent was to bring together the various State Dancer

Associations, Councils, Federations, etc. into one National organization to represent the dancers in the affairs of the activity. A questionnaire was sent to the various organizations with a very good response.

An organizing committee was formed at the 29th National Square Dance Convention® in Memphis with 12 states forming this body. In November 1980, in Oklahoma City, the governing documents for this new organization were formulated. These documents were distributed for review in early 1981, so that the organization meeting and final adoption could create this new dancer organization. This meeting took place in Seattle during the 30th National Square Dance Convention®. At this time the name of UNITED SQUARE DANCERS OF AMERICA (USDA) was chosen as the official name.

The 1_{st} Annual meeting was history. There were 22 states representing 110,000 dancers. Goals were established and they are still in force today. Officers were elected at this meeting. In the first winter meeting, the medical/liability insurance program was presented and has been covering us ever since. Shortly thereafter enough state organizations joined to make USDA the largest dancer organization in the world. Annual meetings were originally held on Friday afternoon during the National Square Dance Convention®, but were later changed to Wednesday afternoon before the National Convention.

USDA, the largest square dance organization in the world, was organized by dancers, for dancers, and is operated by dancers. For more information, please visit their website <u>www.usda.org</u>.





SUGGESTED DO'S AND DON'TS FOR SQUARE DANCING — Author Unknown

GETTING READY FOR THE DANCE

D0: Eat a light dinner; you'll have less weight to carry while dancing, have more pep and will enjoy your after-dance snack much more.

DON'T: Forget that shower or *tub, AND* that bottle or jar of *deodorant.* Hoedown is hot work and it is only good taste to make sure that you don't offend.

D0: Dress gaily and comfortable. Fancy and expensive costumes are not at all necessary, but bright and colorful clothes help to add flavor to the dance and it's nice to know that you look right. The gents shouldn't overdress and the ladies shouldn't underdress. *The men should always wear long sleeve shirts.* Leave off any accessories that might come loose or fall off unexpectedly. Who wants to stand out half a dance while someone looks for a lost earring, or ties up a stubborn shoe, or slipper lace?

DON'T: Take a drink of any kind for at least *twelve* hours before a dance; even a short snort, a single highball is enough to affect your coordination, slow your reflexes and (what is more important) make your presence objectionable to others. Furthermore, leave your bottle at home — Alcohol and allemands just don't mix. The After-Party is just as much a part of the dance as the first allemande in this respect so make that last drink coffee.

D0: Leave home early enough to get to the dance in time for the very first "Honor your partner." Don't be that tardy twosome that deprives three other couples from dancing because you aren't there to fill the set.

WHEN YOU GET TO THE DANCE

D0: Forget about business, financial, social and family cares (even taxes) and concentrate on enjoying the dance and helping others around you to enjoy it.

DON'T: Fail to be friendly and sociable with everyone; a neighborly attitude will make you a lot more popular than perfect technique.

D0: Form your square promptly, and welcome anyone who joins the set. If you don't know everyone in the square, introduce yourself before the call starts. Always thank everyone in the set for sharing your fun when it breaks up at the end of a tip.

DON'T: Ever walk away from a set because some of its members may not be the best dancers in the State. Help them along and they'll be your friends forever. If necessary, change partners to further strengthen the set. Never flaunt your superior dancing skill or knowledge (?); remember you were once a "clunk" yourself.

D0: Listen closely for walkthrus, instructions and calls — and let others in the square also listen to them by keeping quiet. People who talk constantly and try to instruct others in the set can become very unpopular, very quickly.

DON'T: Take dancing too seriously (yours or others). Mistakes are half the fun of dancing provided you don't make too many mistakes of the same kind. If someone "goofs", just laugh it off and keep pitching.

D0: Mix your sets and partners freely and constantly. Why get stuck in the same old square all evening? Change squares each tip and see how the "other half" dances. Change partners as often as you can — variety is the spice of a hoedown!

DON'T: "Hedge" about serving on a committee or accepting an officership in your club or group. It is a peck of fun and you'll find that the small amount of time and responsibility it requires is more than paid for by the satisfaction of doing something for others.

D0: Make it a point to get acquainted with everyone at the dance that you've never met before, and to renew your acquaintance with those you haven't seen for a while. You don't need a third party to introduce you to a stranger; just walk right up to him or her and tell 'em how glad you are to have them there. Every square dancer should be a self-appointed one man welcoming committee.

DON'T: Make yourself obnoxious by "cutting-in" or "cheating" into a square by objectionable means. "Cutting" is something of an art if it is to be done right, so be sure you know when and where and how to "cut". If in doubt, ask the caller if it is O.K. to cut-in, as some clubs and groups don't approve of it.

D0: Stick to the style of dancing used by the group and refrain from showing off with fancy twirls and figures. Avoid jerking, pulling, and bouncing and try for smoothness in your dancing.

DON'T: Grumble and gripe if a less capable couple fills in your set when you signal for additional members. Take whatever comes gladly and willingly and do your best to have fun with them. Rudeness certainly has no place in square dancing, but tolerance and kindness rank high.

D0: Remember that good dancing ability is nice to have, but that the greatest contribution you can make toward the enjoyment of a dance is friendliness, good humor, cooperation and a genuine desire to have *FUN*!

Editor's Note —

Many times recently we have been asked to publish something about the importance of personal cleanliness and the dancers who oft times unknowingly offend their partners, their square(s), and their friends. We searched a long time for just the right article and we feel the one we chose to publish here "says it all" very well.

As one caller with whom we discussed this problem laughingly said, "Unfortunately, when articles of this nature are published from time to time, those who need to take heed never believe the article is meant for them."

All our dance halls have adequate rest room facilities. Be on the safe side! Make a quick check between tips from time to time during a dancing evening to be sure you do not offend your fellow dancers. Surely they are worth the extra consideration! You are!

USDA UPDATE


