HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES - 2018



Don & Ann Slocum were inducted into the Florida
State Hall of Fame February 2018.

They started dancing in 1986 and although they dance
at the advance level, they enjoy dancing all levels and
helping out new dancers as much as they can.
Don has been the Facilities Chairman for our
State Conventions for several years. With the change in
venues, this has been a challenge.

Even though the Hall of Fame Inductees are from the West Coast, it is an award that encompasses the whole state of Florida.

Ron & Mary Lee Van Valkenburg were also inducted into the Florida State Hall of Fame.

They started dancing in 1965 (over 50 years ago.)
Sadly, Ron passed in 2000. Mary Lee is still active as she continues to attend the Florida Federation meetings, including the Working Weekend, and the West Coast Association business meetings. Many years ago, she became the manager of the Florida Square Dance Hall of Fame, which is located at the Strawberry Square Dance Center in Plant City where she has resided for many years.

FLORIDA HALL OF FAME



Nominees must have a minimum of 10 years statewide involvement in the Florida Square and Round Dance activity. Their contributions must encompass the entire state of Florida, not just 1 or 2 areas. This should require unselfish dedication of time and labor. Being an area president, Federation president, Caller/Cuer Association president and/or State Convention chairman is not enough. The

Hall of Fame is seeking individuals or couples whose efforts have affected the majority of the State of Florida.

Preparing a nominating resume will take some time and investigation to make it complete. Talk to other dancers, callers and/or cuers for dates, places and times the nominee was involved in statewide participation. Follow the who, what, when and where rule as you investigate and prepare the resume. The more information submitted, the better.

Once the resume is finished there are two ways in which to present the information to the Hall of Fame Committee. The resume may be submitted to the board of directors of any of the five area associations, Callers Association or Cuers Association. The area or association board of directors will review the resume and vote to reject or pass it on to the Hall of Fame Committee. The resume may also be sent to the Hall of Fame committee chairman. Resumes must be received by the Hall of Fame committee by November 1st of each year. It is suggested that any association not submit more than 2 resumes for consideration per year. The Hall of Fame Committee shall meet and review all resumes presented and vote by secret ballot to forward such resumes to the Selection Committee for the final vote.

All resumes should be submitted to the chairman of the Hall of Fame Committee on or before **November 1**st.

Directions to the Kansas City Convention & Entertainment Facilities:

From the East: Take I-70 west, then ALT 70 West to the Broadway exit (Exit 2S). Turn right on Broadway. Turn right on 14th and proceed to Central or Wyandotte and turn left (north) and seek parking as numerous lots are available. The Municipal Auditorium/Barney Allis Plaza Garage is located south of 12th Street between Wyandotte & Central.

From the West: Take I-70 east to I-635 east to the Central Street exit. Turn left (north) and proceed on Central and seek parking as numerous lots are available. The Municipal Auditorium/Barney Allis Plaza Garage is located south of 12th Street between Wyandotte & Central.

From the South (Kansas side): Take I-35 north to the Broadway exit. Turn left (north) onto Broadway. Turn right on 14th and proceed to Central or Wyandotte and turn left (north) and seek parking as numerous lots are available. The Municipal Auditorium/Barney Allis Plaza Garage is located south of 12th Street between Wyandotte & Central.

From the South (Missouri side): Take 71 Highway north, and merge onto ALT 70 & I-670 West via the exit on the left toward Kansas, exit the Broadway exit (Exit 2S). On Broadway turn right on 14th and proceed to Central or Wyandotte and turn left (north) and seek parking as numerous lots are available. The Municipal Auditorium/Barney Allis Plaza Garage is located south of 12th Street between Wyandotte & Central.

From the North: Take I-35 south across the MO river bridge. Follow I-35 south staying to the East of the downtown buildings. Take Broadway. Turn left on 12th and proceed to Central or Wyandotte and turn right and seek parking as numerous lots are available. The Municipal Auditorium/Barney Allis Plaza Garage is located south of 12th Street between Wyandotte & Central.

Parking

There are numerous parking lots around the Kansas City Convention Center (which includes Bartle Hall, the Grand Ballroom, the Great Hall, the Conference Center, the Little Theatre, the Music Hall, Municipal Auditorium and Arena.) The prices to park run from \$5 to \$12 per day. Street side parking is metered.

The main parking lot is: The Municipal Auditorium /Barney Allis Plaza Garage located between 12th & 13th and between Central & Wyandotte. (It is in front of the Marriott Hotel.) There is a convenient underground tunnel into the Convention Center from inside the Barney Allis Plaza Garage.
















On Sunday, March 18, 2018

Many years and square dancers ago, a couple opened their garage to help dancers improve their skills and prowess on the floor. Zonie met Jack at a square dance in Biloxi Mississippi. The dancing became romancing and they married. Jack retired from the Air Force and took employment with a contractor in Iran. They were one of the few couples that escaped thru Turkey after the Iranian government was overthrown in 1978. Eventually they moved to the Space Coast.

In the 90's, a very active decade, they were Florida Federation President, Central Florida Association President and served on several committees advancing square dancing. Zonie was the Historian for a number of years. Both were CFA Area Representatives for many years. That is when and how we met them.

And we were subjected to the garage abuse. A1/A2 lessons with Skip Clelland many years ago - two squares went down to one and it is still remembered warmly today. The good times that is - not so certain about the calls. Skip would listen to Jack's input on how we were doing and then work us accordingly. Then we'd all hit Ashleys for the late nite ribs special after 9:00. In the garage - Jack would work us on the floor while Zonie would work him to get us where she thought we should be. It really was a wonderful time - we danced; we learned; we laughed at Jack and ourselves; then we did it again; we had goodies; then we did it over again; and finally we knew the blinkety-blank move! There's a lot to be said for the CAMARADERIE born in their garage. They extended it further - to the classes they were in - to their life.

She was in good health until the last moment when her heart failed. She has joined Jack in the Master's Square. Their time on Earth was well spent; enjoyed and loved by many friends and two beautiful daughters - Gail.

And so it ends, we say *goodbye*, *adios*, *adieu*, *aufwidersen* -until we meet again! to a dear friend and comrade.

P.S. Two daughters - Gail - both Zonie and Jack had a daughter - daughter Gail.

ALL THINGS CONSIDERED

The 11th Commandment

If you Google the "Ten Commandments of Square Dancing," you will find several variations, and every one is well written. But all of these Commandments have one thing in common, namely: Be considerate of others.

Whether they talk about bathing, being kind, smiling, not having alcohol before a dance, being a good listener or getting into squares quickly the Commandments all boil down to one thing: Everyone is here to have fun, so do not do anything that keeps people from having fun.

But there is one Commandment that is never written and is rarely spoken, yet everyone agrees that it exists. The 11th Commandment is: **Thou shall learn the calls.**

This Commandment is not written or spoken, because many people find is socially unacceptable to do so. The rationalization is: "We are here to have fun, and learning call definitions is not fun. Our real purpose is to socialize, smile, be pleasant and only learn enough in class so that we can exist in a square. If this means having to be pulled through the calls, so what, because our real purpose is to socialize, smile and be pleasant."

But where is the fun in having the square break down time after time? Where is the fun in causing seven other people to stop and square back up because one person does not know the calls. Sure, everyone is expected to laugh and joke about breakdowns, and this is fine up to a point. But what if we go past this point? What if breakdowns occur time after time because a few people do not know the calls? Are we still having fun?

When dancers do not learn the calls, they negatively impact the fun of everyone in the squares.

I am not saying that people should be excellent dancers, able to do calls half-sashayed or left-handed. I am saying that it is logical for dancers in a square to expect that the others in the square are at least "average."

In the past year I have seen many examples of dancers who are a disaster, who should not have been allowed to graduate and who should not be allowed on the floor of a standard average dance.

I'm being too strict you say? What about the woman who turns away from her partner on a Right & Left Thru? What about a woman who goes the wrong way on a Right & Left Grand? What about the man who wanders around when he hears "Circulate" called when he is in the center of an ocean wave? What about the man who always tries to Courtesy Turn on a Square Thru? What about people who break down consistently on Square Thru, or who constantly turn around in place?

These are not just brief mental lapses. These are blatant examples of people who have no idea of what is going on. It will not be very long before dancers cease to laugh at this, because their FUN is being severely impacted.

Let's go back to the previously stated common theme of the Ten Commandments: Be considerate of others, and ask a few questions. Is it considerate to force people to pull someone through, because that person has not bothered to learn the calls? Is it considerate to others in class when someone shows up without having bothered to review what was taught the week before?

Is it considerate of others for a class dancer who has missed several lessons to just show up without ever having called the teacher to find out what has been taught on the nights that were missed? Is it considerate for a person who has graduated to just go through the motions, laughing every time he/she breaks down a square on simple calls, as described above? Are others laughing at this: Are others having fun when this occurs?

I've Got a Little List (and none of them'll be missed)

Ever since it has been possible to travel further than 15 miles for an evening's entertainment there has been the problem of lists of calls.

In earlier days, it did not matter what calls or dances the caller used because he was the only show in town. It became a problem when people (callers and dancers) could travel across town or to the next town that the lists became important. If a dancer danced with Caller A then tried to dance to Caller B there was a problem. Each caller had his own list of "calls," and even the names of the same call could be different too.

The problem was exacerbated by World War II. Before the war, callers taught all dances from the beginning each time he wanted to use that dance...there was no such concept of learning the "basics: and then responding to the calls. "Calls" were combined into complete patterns, and each pattern had its name. If a caller was exposed to a pattern, he may have written down a description of the pattern, but he may not have written down the name. Well, he needed a way to remember what pattern it was, so he gave it his own name.

No big deal...until after the War. Returning troops, young families, businesses, etc., were on the move across the country. Places like San Diego and Phoenix and Houston had been smallish cities, but their populations ballooned following the war. If people ;were not in the cocktail party frame of mind, they needed alternative entertainment, and nothing was better than square dancing.

These burgeoning cities became hot spots for square dancing. But the people came from all kinds of dance backgrounds...some were from

Appalachia and were raised on Scottish-American dances; others were from New England and the British Quadrilles and Contras; others came from areas where there was a mixture of styles that had been developed during the great Western migration. They all had in common teaching the whole dance (including the rhymes and nonsense verse that accompanied the calls).

A Los Angeles caller of the late 1040's/early 1950's recalls a couple from the Mid-West attending a dance on their vacation trip. Every time the caller approached the mic, they stood up, ready to get in a square. As soon as the caller announced what dance he was going to do, they sat down. Finally someone asked if they couldn't dance. They replied that it turns out that they knew every single one of the dances, and they even used the same styling back home. But they did not want to mess up a square and they did not recognize the dances by the names the caller used.

As early as 1948, callers in the Los Angeles area came up with a list of basic "calls" and the most popular dances. They requested that if callers used a movement to please use the meaning as described in the list. And if they were going to use a dance, please name it according to the list.

To misquote an old song: "Here comes confusion racing down the back stretch an the winner loses all."

CALLERLAB did rein in the runaway horse for a while. But dancers and callers saw that there were multiple finish lines. In this race. No one wanted to be "Basic" or even "Mainstream." From a dancer's point of view that was good enough for all of those other dancers and callers, but I am special...I am better...I am a Plus dancer...You're Plus 2?...Uh oh, Back to workshop to learn those 15 more calls because if that guy is Plus 2, I know I am just as good a dancer as he.

The race course was turned vertical to be a ladder, and to be considered a good dancer you had to climb the ladder. Except...what if you liked dancing only once or twice a month? What if you liked the feel of the wind in your face? What if you liked seeing happy smiles?

Some callers, earlier than others, recognized that in our ambition, we had made square dancing amazingly complex. These perspicacious callers believed that some how we needed to reduce the number of calls used at

open dances. But the callers ran into resistance from dancers who wanted to use all of those calls they had spend so much time in learning.

But the reinvention of the List persists. In the mid-1980's a group of callers in Northern California took the CALLERLAB list and just knocked some of the calls off it, and they rearranged the teaching order. Unfortunately, later on, their dancers could not dance at the California State Convention when it was held in that area. American Callers Association came up with the One Floor idea, intending to break down the fences between programs.

At this time, I am aware of at least six alternate lists of calls, all based on the original CALLERLAB lists, but intended to simplify dancing. Santa Clara Valley (California) has come up with its list which is a shortened Mainstream List with a handful of the more popular but easily taught Plus calls. Rio Grande Valley callers shortened the Mainstream list, dropping out calls that were rarely called. They ended up with a list of 50 calls to be taught in 15 weeks. Supposedly a club could have 3 classes in a calendar year. There is still the CALLERLAB Basic 50. And there is the CALLERLAB concentrated teaching list. Etc., etc., etc.

None of these programs really address two basic problems (which are not solved just by changing lists): 1) Peer pressure...to climb the ladder...to attend local festivals...to dance to other callers...to visit other clubs...to attend dances while on vacation. And 2) Where do they dance after completing the 15 lessons? And a #3) which should not concern the dancers. How can a caller make a living full time calling if he does not have multiple workshops to teach (and collect fees from).

But here we are once again and this topic remains the main topic of conversation in the square dance world.

Previous chairmen, in their last talk as chairman, ehave all xpressed thanks to many people and I would like to be no different. I thank the Home Office staff, JoJo, Royce and Donna. I thank the CALLERLAB Executive Director, Dana Schirmer. Only a few people know how hard he works and how much time he devotes to this organization. His efforts are to be commended. Dana, we will never be able to repay you for all that you do and on behalf of the membership of CALLERLAB, thank you!

I want to thank the Executive Committee and the Board of Governors for your confidence and support. I would also like to thank my wife, Kayla (who has witnessed the times when I would throw up my hands and say things that I can't repeat here), for her great support and encouragement. Without the effort and support from her and all of you I

would not have been able to uphold my duties. Thank you all!

The theme for this year's Convention is "Build the Base Now," and truer words could not be more prevalent! All square dance people around the world must work harder at generating a more sustainable base by "Building the Base Now!" Without this, everything else will slowly fail. We must stop dwelling on the good ol' days and the way things were done back then and focus on new ways and ideas that will meet the needs of today's people and "Build the Base NOW!" Whenever someone attempts a new method of doing anything in square dancing, they are met with obstacles and road blocks that are not natural, but instead are thrown up by existing square dance people. These existing square dance people may not like what is being attempted and that is certainly their prerogative, but what is amazing to me is the lengths these same people will go in order to stop others from trying something different in an effort to "Build the Base NOW!" It's as if these people would rather see square dancing stay the same (and suffer the same results) than change what they are comfortable doing instead of making an effort to "Build the Base NOW!" Frederick Douglass said "Without a struggle there is no progress." Therefore, it is time to fight or we will not move forward!

For last years speech I talked about what do we all want to be remembered for and how the "The Time is Now!" This year I ask all of you, "What legacy do you want to leave behind?" Do we want to leave this situation as it is now, or do we wish to leave it in better shape than we found it and "Build the Base NOW!"

There are many keys to "Build the Base NOW!" The main key, in my opinion, is to not only attract new people, but to show these people a good time, keep these people in square dancing and "Build the Base NOW!" The way to keep these people and "Build the Base NOW" is to cater to them. If we want to attract new people - we must cater to them. If we want to show them a good time - we must cater to them. If we want them to go dancing and enjoy themselves - we must cater to them.. And on the subject of them going dancing, we must not just send them to dances we must accompany them, dance with them, encourage them, and give them compliments. Sending new people to dances is like sending your prom date to the prom with someone else and being surprised when they go home with that someone else. Catering to new dancers will "Build the Base NOW!" And, if you have talked to

everyone you know about square dancing, then it is time to talk to someone you don't know and "Build the Base NOW!"

It is time to put aside our differences and concentrate on building square dancing. It is time to stop fighting with each other and concentrate on "Building the Base NOW!" It is time to stop worrying about who might not agree with us, getting our picky little feelings hurt, and concentrate on "Building the Base NOW!" It is time to work towards leaving a legacy that has square dancing in better shape than it was given to us and "Build the Base NOW!" Thank you.

One of the most successful square dance class recruiting techniques I have ever seen was developed by Dick Harvey of the Allemande 8's in Manchester, NH. A set of three post cards was printed in enough copies to give a set (or more) to every member of the club. The idea was that the cards would be sent by the club members to friends they believed might be potential class members. They were to be sent a week apart starting three weeks before the class. The wording Dick used on the cards was as follows .

Card #1 A REAL LIVE EVENING OF FUN HAS BEEN PLANNED FOR YOU

Card #2 Last week you received a card just like this one. Don't forget Tuesday, September 17. We'll call and pick you up. Don't ask what or where because we want it to be a surprise. We have to be there at 8 pm so we'll be at your house at xx.xx pm We guarantee that you'll have fun. Sincerely,

Card #3 Don't forget Tuesday the 17th at xx.xx pm. Be ready to go. We know that you want to know what to wear. You don't have to dress up "fancy." Just wear comfortable clothes. For the girls, low heels please. No high heeled shoes. The men can wear anything comfortable with long sleeves. This will be an evening geared for adult entertainment (over 18). Come prepared to have fun and we will guarantee that you will. Incidentally, this won't cost you a cent.

CALLING FOR NEW DANCERS

Folks entering a new activity whether it's sports or social clubs, all face similar challenges. First there is mastering the skills necessary to participate at even an entry level, then there is adapting (fitting in) with the other participants. Beginner square dancers, in my opinion, face a more daunting challenge compared with other recreations because our entry program requires many months of progressive learning. Progressive learning is like a jug of water that gets more and more liquid added in every class. There is no way to skip any section of class and still be in the program.

The grind of continually having new material introduced can be softened by encouragement from their peers and dancer angels who have already mastered the necessary skills. Furthermore, if a student has a "bad" week where nothing seems o go right but is followed by a "good" week, the beginner is apt to continue. Consecutive "bad" weeks will drive anyone out of the class.

Probably one of the most important moments in a beginner square dancer's life occurs at their first open "new dancer" dance. This is the event that either shows the new dancer that they have learned the necessary skills and are feeling encouraged to continue in lessons or the experience goes poorly with the beginner dancer subsequently becoming an ex-dancer.

In a class setting where you have hours to spend with the group and weeks of recurring sessions, the caller/teacher has the opportunity to build a rapport with the dancers but an open dance setting is very different. "New dancer hoedowns," "new dancer halls," "halfway dancer," etc. - the students find themselves in a strange hall, dancing

with people they've never met, and probably a parade of callers they've never heard. This is where a skilled caller can move the beginner past these challenges, raise the self-confidence of new dancers through the roof and create a positive tipping point where the new dancers are convinced they have made the correct decision in choosing to square dance.

Calling a dance for new dancers is the most difficult and rewarding enterprise a caller will face. It requires an understanding of what is happening on the dance floor beyond trying to sight call to their corner. For the caller working with new dancers they've never met, here are some thoughts to consider along with tips for success.

- 1. Your voice is different from what the new dancers are accustomed. Different gender, accent, annunciation. Project your voice to the back of the hall and clearly enunciate your calls.
- 2. Your terminology may be different from the new dancer's teacher. Can the dancers easily understand "Gents Star Right" versus "Boys Star Right" or "Men Star Right?" From an ocean wave, will "Centers Trade" work as well as "Boys Trade" or Men Trade?" If dancers don't succeed, even if the caller is using technically correct terms, then it is still an over-all fail. Dancers have to win, so watch how dancers respond to your calls and choose your terms carefully.
- 3. Your style of patter calling may be something like: "Heads Square Thru in the middle, in the middle four hands round to the tune of the fiddle and a Right & Left Thru" but the new dancers may be accustomed to simple commands like, "Heads Square Thru ... Right & Left Thru." Your filler words may be a distraction to the new dancer so it's a good idea to omit them and even prompt your calls in this setting.
- 4. Stay away from anything that might be even the slightest offensive. This includes scolding dancers, pointing out their inadequacies, negative comments about their caller, club, or angels. Yellow Rocks this gimmick is out of touch with today's sensibilities, especially if you have young ladies being commanded to get hugged by strange men. Yellow Rocks are offensive to more people than you may know.
- 5. Be careful with music choices, especially for patter calling. Music with vocals in the background will create a cluttered sound for new dancers, making it difficult to discern your calls from everything else playing. Fiddles and saxophones in the music will also create

- distinctions for the dancers. Choose simple music with a clear beat so the dancers will feel like they are dancing. When it comes to singing calls, choose songs with happy lyrics that everyone, including kids, will be comfortable with.
- 6. The new dancers may not know everything they are supposed to know so use calls that are well within their dance experience. For example, if the hall labeled "Mainstream," but it's for dancers currently in class, then choose calls limited to the "Basics" list. You will find calls that everyone is comfortable with while avoiding accidently using a call they may have just learned but not have mastered. "Basics" when used with great variety creates great new dancer dances.
- 7. Every one of the students already has a teacher. The guest caller should be entertaining, letting them practice their new found dance skills while having the time of their life. Avoid calling anything that would "test" their skills as it is inappropriate for the guest caller to be an examiner. If you are a novice caller, please use memorized patterns that are easy for the new dancers. This is not the time to practice your sight calling skills. It is the time for the dancers to win as close to 100% of the time, as possible.

When new dancers are able to dance the calls smoothly in time with the music then they feel like dancers, not just students. It is that feeling, which keeps dancers in our activity. Be the caller who makes them feel like dancers and you will be their hero while actually building our activity. Please send your comments to buddy@buddyweaver.com.






SIXTEEN REASONS FOR **BUYING FABRIC**

Dance Tip — Touch Hands (Adapted from Bill van Melle, Stanford Quads) Touch hands when next to another dancer. Touching hands helps set the formation and keeps dancers oriented and working as a team. It's vital if you're to complete the next call and one person in your square is lost. Failure to take hands is a common source of disorientation. For example, after "Flip the Diamond," if the new centers don't take hands, they'll likely be confused if the next call is "Fan the Top." But avoid too firm a handhold; the dancer holding on with a death grip impedes both himself and those he grips. In "Square Thru" holding on too long makes for a disaster. Change your handhold to reflect the current call. In facing lines if the caller says "Centers..." those in the center should drop hands with the ends even before hearing what they are supposed to do. That way they will focus their attention on what they are to do and not confuse the ends.

Parliamentarian's Corner

There are a number of frequently asked questions parliamentarians get; a few of them with the answers are below:

The answers here assume that RONR is the adopted parliamentary authority and that there are no bylaws, superior laws, or Special Rules of Order which supersede the rules in RONR:

Can the chairman vote?

If a presiding officer (chair) is a member of the assembly he or she has the right to vote, and does so in small boards of not more than about a dozen members present. In larger assemblies, the chairman (who has a duty to maintain an appearance of impartiality) may vote when his vote would affect the outcome: to make or break a tie or to make or prevent a two-thirds vote, or when the vote is by ballot (at the same time as everybody else). For more information, refer to RONR 11th ed. pp.405-406. Can the chairman make motions? In larger assemblies of more than a dozen members, the chairman has a duty to remain impartial, so would usually not make a motion directly. The chairman could say, for example, "The chairman will entertain a motion to..." and then wait for a member to make it, or "Is there a motion to suspend the rules that interfere with hearing the speaker at this time?" .In small boards the chairman may make motions. The chairman may also assume a motion, as in: "If there are no [further] corrections, the minutes stand approved as read [as corrected]." or "If there is no further business to come before the meeting, this meeting will now adjourn. [pause] Hearing none, this meeting is adjourned."

So you see, without actually directly making a motion, the chair can accomplish pretty much the same thing without blatantly compromising his or her impartiality. Another option is to ask someone before the meeting to make a motion that the chair wishes to be considered. After all, the chairman is a member, too, and has just as much right to have things go their way as any other member. Accepting the job of chairman does not remove any rights as a member. For more information, refer to RONR 11th ed. pp.487-488, 473-474,240-241,

Can the chairman enter into debate?

In small boards of not more than about a dozen members present, yes. In larger assemblies, if the chairman wishes to debate, he/she should relinquish the chair to the vice president or another member, until the matter is disposed of, before resuming the chair.
