Asa Clark has been dancing since he was 8 years old. He was transferred to Brevard

County by RCA in 1954 and started dancing with the Rockeights on Merritt Island. They folded so he traveled to the Allemanders in Satellite Beach. He attended his first Knothead Konvention in 1956. The County Rec Director asked him to form a Club in Central Brevard so in April 1960, the Canaveral Squares were formed. In the late 70's Asa was contacted by a minister to start a youth square dance group ending up with four squares of teenagers for over two years. In July 1983, Asa helped in forming the Space Trackers Club and is one of the few founders still dancing.

Asa attended the 1960 National Convention in Miami and has attended many more since. He served on the Hospitality and Tours Committee at the 1997 National in Orlando. He helped in the 1988 and 1993 CFA sponsored Florida State Conventions and most recently was on the Hospitality Committee for "Mardi Gras Time in '99".

Asa joined CFA in 1960 and is presently serving as North Brevard Director. He was awarded the Circle of Service last year for his work over these many years.

He has served as President of Canaveral Squares several times. Also, has served as Vice President of Space Trackers. He angels for classes, participates in demos and banner raids for both Clubs. Board of Directors Meeting - December 10, 2000
SUMMARY OF MINUTES



The meeting of the Central Florida Square & Round Dancers Association held in the home of Randy & Carol Poole, was called by President Jim & Jan McConnaha. Judy Frye gave the Invocation followed by Jim McConnaha leading the Pledge of Allegiance.

AREA REPORTS - Full reports are on file. Highlights follow:

Area Vice President - Ron & Lois Renwick reported they had visited 3 Square Dance Clubs and two Round Dance Clubs. The Round Dancers that were not Square Dancers did not see any reason to join the CFA. He found each club had CFA applications and Shamrock Swing flyers available at all but one club.

North Brevard - Asa Clark gave a detailed report on 6 clubs. He is President of the President's Council of Brevard County and their next meeting in the 3rd Sunday in March.

South Brevard - Jack & Zonie Taylor have visited 5 clubs, and have cleared up a great deal of misunderstanding of what the CFA does. They have scheduled two more clubs before the end of the year.

East Lake - Vernon Cannaday reported on two local clubs, neither of which have Beginner classes this year. He also stated that the Spruce Creek club will hold their last on December 18th.

West Lake and Sumpter - Dan & Anna Foust have had CFA membership drives at two of the clubs in November - two more for January. The Salt & Pepper Shakers have no dance schedule until further notice. Anna has made up packets containing a letter, a State Square Dance Convention flyer, blood bank information, insurance information and information about the other Square Dance Associations in Florida to be given to the new CFA members.

East Orange/Seminole - Dick & Nany King reported that there is a new club in Sanford, the Millennium Squares which has 17 members. Reported the Orlando Singles rent had tripled in price, due to the change of facilities.

West Orange - Arnold & Marie Rabenberg reported they have visited both Round and Square Dance Clubs. The Apopka Pirates could not get a beginners class running, however they have 4 squares of Advanced dancers on Tuesday nights.

Osceola - Steve & Diana Kehr's report by Ron Renwick. Steve and Diana have taken all of the CFA information sheets to the various clubs and were very successful in collecting the CFA dues.

East Volusia - Kenly & Alice Spilman reported that they had visited 4 clubs. Three of the clubs have beginners classes and there is a class being taught in S. Daytona by Ann & Ron Roan.

West Volusia - Gale & Laura Boak reported that they had visited both clubs in their area promoting C.F.A. membership and the Shamrock Swing. Both clubs have small classes.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT: Don & Sharon Smith said that as of December 10, we have 287 members in the C.F.A. 50 are New Members and 237 are Renewals. We have 94 members who have not renewed. We need 44 more members to match last year's membership.

BLOOD BANK REPORT: Will & Carol Barnhart's report was read by Bruce Morgan. As of November 28, 2000 our account had 3 credits and 6 disbursements for a Total Available Credit of 438 units of blood.

INSURANCE: Randy & Carol Poole reported that they have 8 clubs insured with a total of 798 members enrolled. There has been one claim this quarter.

KEEPIN' POSTED: Tom & Eivor Brown reported that this quarter they will print 400 copies of the 40 page booklet. They have added some new features to the magazine: recipes, club banners as mastheads, articles on club leadership and management and articles on Round Dancing. They have suggested new advertising. They have had 4 additional clubs report club activities to the Keepin' Posted and want more.

50th FLORIDA STATE CONVENTION REPORT: Bruce & Colleen Morgan reported that they will be signing the preliminary contract with the Lakeland Center and have been assured that the rates will be the same as in 1999.

FUNDRAISER CAMPING WEEKEND: Randy Poole reported that the River Forest Campground in DeLand, has been reserved for the weekend of October 12 & 13. There is room for 35 - 40 camping units. It is dry camping at \$10 per night. Preliminary plans include a Casino night on Friday night, with a Convention Committee Meeting on Saturday, a covered dish supper and a Square Dance with Skip Cleland and Bev Lanwehr, the caller and cuer convention chairman. Non-campers are invited to bring sleeping bag and sleep in the recreation hall.

HISTORIAN: Judy Frye thanked everyone for items that had been turned in.

FLORIDA FEDERATION: George & Shirley Knapp reported on the meeting held in Boyton Beach in November. The officers for 2000-2001 are: President - Dee Dee & Bessie Stovall, Vice President - Ken & Sandy Brasfield, Secretary - George & Shirley Knapp, Treasurer - Fred & Shirley Cornett and Parliamentarian - Garland & Carole McKenzie. The next meeting will be the Florida Federation working weekend, held at the Best Western Diplomat Inn in Lakeland on February 24 and 25.

OLD BUSINESS

Shamrock Swing Progress Report: Randy & Carol Poole reported that 26 ribbons have been sold with 150 ribbons out. They asked for the money to be sent to them as soon as possible.

5th Saturday Dance: The next 5th Saturday dance will be held on March 31, 2001 in Clermont. The host club will be the Groveland/Clermont Squares. Whit Brown will be the Caller and Jeannette Chauvin will be the Cuer. Flyers will be available at the February Meeting.

Free Dance Coupons: We will again be giving the Free CFA Dance coupons to graduating Square Dancers whose names are printed in the Keepin' Posted. These coupons will admit one person and used in the year 2001.

UNITED SQUARE DANCERS OF AMERICA

ARE YOU DANCING UNINSURED



Every square dance organization needs General Liability and Accident Medical Expense coverage while conducting and sponsoring dance activities. As closely as safety rules are followed, accidents can and will happen. This insurance program, especially designed for USDA dance groups, provides for \$1,000,000 liability and \$10,000 accident medical reimbursement coverage. The other advantages include certificates of insurance for special dances (including provisions for additional insureds or when required by a property owner) at no additional cost. This is becoming increasingly more important as more owners of public and private facilities demand that groups show proof in insurance before they will allow use of their facility.

LIABILITY INSURANCE

Limits of Protection: \$1,000,000 combined simple limits of liability for bodily injury and property damage per occurrence (subject to a \$100 property damage deductible per claim) while participating in scheduled and sponsored dancing activities. There is a \$3,000,000 General Aggregate.

Who is covered: The club and its members while participating in club or organization sponsored and supervised dancing activities.

ACCIDENT AND MEDICAL INSURANCE

Limits of Coverage:

\$10,000 Accident Medical/Dental Accident Expense

\$10,000 Accidental Death

\$10,000 Dismemberment Benefit for loss of both hands, arms, eyes

\$10,000 Dismemberment Benefit for loss of one hand, arm, eye

Note: Coverage is excess over any other valid and collectible insurance covering the same accident

Who is covered: Club members while participating in any regularly scheduled and sponsored dancing activity, worldwide, including group travel in a commercially licensed common carrier vehicle operated by a person holding a valid operators license for such vehicle being transported to or from a covered dancing activity which is a minimum of 25 miles from point of origin to destination (one way).

What is covered: Accidental bodily injuries sustained while participating in dancing activities sponsored by a recognized club or organization, for a period of one year from the date of the accident.

Period of Coverage: The insurance year is January 1 through December 31. It is important every club effect coverage in January to receive the full 12 months coverage. There is no pro-rate provision. This is necessary due to the large administrative expense of maintaining different policy dates.

PHOENIX PLAN

*Research Results Are A
SURPRISE!*



CALLERLAB, through its Foundation, has completed the analysis of its initial research study. It was conducted as a 'first step' of The Phoenix Plan, a new marketing program. And the findings were surprisingly pleasant! The survey, conducted by StarWorks Inc, a Michigan based Research firm, under the direction of Jim Hensely, the Foundation's Marketing Director, was a preliminary study of general public opinion with the following objectives:

- Assess the image of Square Dancing
- Explore potential for expanding interest in Square Dancing
- Test viability of "Boomers" as a target for marketing efforts
- Identify other possible marketing targets

The nearly two thousand respondents, who were balanced geographically and demographically, were given three questions, establishing: If they had ever square danced, whether they had negative, positive or neutral opinion? about it, and whether they might consider joining a square dance class.

The findings were surprisingly positive in many areas. Square dance activity is a wide open market, with less than 15% of our population ever having experienced it as an adult. The image issue was decidedly stronger than anticipated. In this study, it proved to be moderately POSITIVE, with only a small minority (12%), having a negative opinion. Most people were neutral, but a THIRD were positive. People who had contact with square dancing as an adult, were twice as likely to be positive. Experiencing the activity apparently breeds goodwill. Almost all income levels reacted the same way, with lower level incomes being twice as positive. Positioning square dancing as a 'Fun-Social-and-Healthy' activity would draw one in six, to consider joining a class, with another 40% maybes.

Additional work will be needed to validate results, but this preliminary study showed the general context for square dancing as relatively favorable. There is considerable potential for expanding interest in this activity. The "Baby Boomers" are a viable target market for square dancing. Other marketing targets should include singles, who have been married and people with lower incomes.

In August, 2000 the Foundation began a series of Focus Group Research Studies in three cities: Charlotte, NC; St Louis, MO; and, Portland, OR. These will be in depth, face-to-face sessions, with a professional moderator questioning a small, representative group of carefully chosen people, in detail, about their opinions and feelings. In each city we will visit with three separate groups, two who have never square danced and one group who dropped out of square dancing, after only a few lessons. Names of discontinued dancers will be obtained through local callers and club leaders. If you know of people who have dropped out of a square dance class, please send that information(name, address and telephone number) along with your name and telephone number to the CALLERLAB

Office. These sessions, which are video taped and reviewed, will give everyone better insight into our problem areas. Hopefully, other square dance organizations will want to participate in similar research studies to learn more about their individual market area. The results of our final report will be made available through the Foundation at a later date this Fall.

USDA Insurance in the CFA
What every dancer needs to know

Every club member and officer of every club needs know the 'rules' of our insurance

program.(See article earlier in this publication for dollar amounts and limitations.) As we are all well aware, America has become suit happy - if it hurts; find the deepest pockets and sue them. Hey, that's us who are being sued. Or at least possibly so.

We mailed a copy of the "Club Accident Report" to each club, carrying our insurance, in the Association. It starts the insurance claim. If you or anyone at a sponsored dance or event are injured or have an accident(property damage or bodily injury), complete the form and forward it to us. We would appreciate a telephone notice so we can start the ball rolling. Remember - time is of the essence - complete the form as soon as possible. Each club has a copy of the form. You can ask your local club officer to provide the form and complete it. Mail the completed form to:

Remember also that injuries may appear later; so it is far better to "waste" a bit of time completing the report and protecting our club than not doing so and have the insurance denied. We, aging humans, suffer memory loss - details become blurry with passage of time - a quickly completed form will be more accurate in the details. Again; should you as a dancer become injured at a dance, request the club officer or member in charge of the dance to **IMMEDIATELY** fill in the club accident report. It should then be mailed to us — address above— within 48 hours. Fill out this form even if you don't think you will seek medical care. Something may turn up at a later date. After receipt of the club accident

report a claim form will be mailed to you. Club officers should fill out this form even if the injured dancer is NOT a member of your club and mail it.

The Pleasure Principle Square Dance Etiquette

I was rumaging around in one of the boxes of material I inherited with this job. I think it was from

the National Convention - maybe not. However, an interesting and appropriate article caught my eye and attention. If the shoe fits - - - It is reprinted below - neither the author or the source are known.

"What is square dancing all about? Square dancing is all about pleasure; the pleasure of calls well executed, the pleasure of a good laugh if your square breaks down, the pleasure of a social activity in a friendly atmosphere of mutual respect and cooperation. To keep square dancing pleasurable, we must all observe a few guidelines. After all, square dancing is a group activity.

1. Avoid drinking and drugs that may affect your reaction time and cause to break down a square or even cause serious injuries.. Most clubs discourage drinking before or during a dance.
2. Start out fresh. Shower, use deodorant and brush your teeth. Avoid eating strong smelling foods like garlic right before dancing.

3. In most clubs, for each new tip, dancers form new sets by squaring up randomly. It is considered unfriendly and discourteous to pass by a forming square to look for another.
4. At the beginning of a new tip, introduce yourself to dancers you don't know. Friendliness is one of the best aspects of square dance activities.
5. **RULE:** once in a square, under no circumstances abandon it. Exception: in case of a medical emergency or if someone is injured. There is absolutely no other acceptable reason to leave a square until the tip is over. There is an accepted "emergency call for medical assistance".
6. Help your set to dance its' best. Be friendly about it. If you see a need to direct a fellow dancer, be sure that you are correct and be gentle in your assistance. Think of the best interest of the group and take care not to hurt other dancer's feelings. Do not be too critical of others. This can ruin everyone's fun if it results in bickering or a condescending attitude. Remember, we all make mistakes and the next one might be yours. Be especially supportive of new dances; without them our pleasurable pastime would die out.
7. Listen to the callers. Do not talk when the caller is talking or calling. Not only is it rude, but all dancers may need the information provided."

While officially the Camporee is a three day midweek event, arrangements are always made so that NSDCA members may come in and set up Sunday afternoon. Many members take advantage of this opportunity to arrive early, get settled and then tour the area. It also gives the attendees more time to resume friendships with dancers they may see once a year! Callers and cuers who come in early will often participate in impromptu Trail In dances Sunday and Monday evening.

The Camporee officially begins on Tuesday with mornings devoted to various sports, games and crafts. Square and Round dance workshops are scheduled during afternoons. Traditionally the Tuesday evening program begins with a Grand Parade of all the chapters in their chapter outfits. After a short welcoming program everyone disperses to the various halls for a full program of dancing. All three evenings always conclude with everyone gathering in one hall for an after party with skits by various chapters.

Since the International Camporee is family oriented, members often bring along their children and/or grandchildren who participate in a separate, full program of youth activities. Thursday evening before the evening dance program gets underway, the youth always put on a special performance of skills acquired during their activities.

A daily newspaper, the "Snooper", keeps all informed on schedule changes, door prizes, camper news, and other happenings. Mid afternoon on Thursday is always set aside for the NSDCA official Business Meeting. Even though it is an overflowing three days, members always find time to make new friends, renew old acquaintances and share some wonderful pot luck meals.

Health Hint: Lonesome Heart Attack

Let's say it's 6:15 PM and you're driving home (alone of course), after an unusually hard

day on the job. You're really tired and frustrated. Suddenly you start having severe pain in your chest that radiates out into your arms and up into your jaw. You are about five miles from the hospital nearest your home, unfortunately, you don't know if you can make it that far. **What Can You Do?** You've been trained in CPR but the course did not include how to perform it on yourself.

HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK WHEN ALONE. Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack, this article seems in order. Without help, the person whose heart stops beating properly and who begins to feel faint, has only about ten seconds left before losing consciousness.

However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest. A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let up until help arrives, or until the heart is beating normally again.

Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it regain normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get to a hospital. Tell as many other people as possible about this, it could save their lives!
