MARCH 17, 1996 BOARD MEETING
AND MARCH 30, 1996 GENERAL MEETING

SUMMARY OF MINUTES

TREASURERS' REPORT: The report was read and filed for audit.

AREA REPORTS: Full reports are on file. All Area Directors report that the clubs are doing well and that some beginner classes will be graduating soon. Some highlights follow: Phil Bolson, Caller for the Saddle Oak Club, has recovered from major surgery. Due to Don Furnish moving to Colorado, the Starlight Promenaders' new caller will be John Barrett, Granada Squares Caller will be John Saunders and the Orlando Singles will have guest Callers. Kissimmee Squares, the Wagon Wheels and the Wagon Wheel Rounders have all returned to their original dance halls. A new Round Dance Club is meeting at Ben White Ranceway on Wednesdays with Wayne Guice and Bev Landwher. The Honeybees hall is being renovated; there are no definite plans as to where they will dance in the interim.

BLOOD BANK: Seven units were added since December for a total of 214 now available.

INSURANCE: There are 2022 members enrolled and 31 clubs insured.

KEEPIN' POSTED: Area Directors were urged to ask clubs to send names of class graduates to KP.

MEMBERSHIP: Membership as of March 30, 1996, is 425 paid and 18 honorary members for a total of 443.

HISTORIAN: Vivian Wilson relayed some information she found out by going over some of the past minutes. The official name of our Blood Bank is The John Berger Blood Bank. The first issue of the CFS&RDA newsletter was issued in November 1980. A contest was held for the winning name and Bev Whitney of Wagon Wheels in St. Cloud came up with *Keepin' Posted*. They are still active dancers. Vivian also displayed two books they are compiling of the early years of CFS&RDA. They would still like information, articles and pictures.

45TH FLORIDA STATE SQUARE AND ROUND DANCE CONVENTION: Jim McConnaha announced that a meeting had been held with the Kick-Off Team. The location of the Convention has not been definitely decided yet as Lakeland Convention Center has not sent any price information. However, it must be held on the I-4 corridor which restricts it to Tampa, Orlando, Lakeland or Daytona. He also requested that people sign up to work on a committee of their choice. The Convention Outfit was displayed at the March 30th dance.

FLORIDA FEDERATION REPRESENTATIVE: As Federation Historian, Jack and Zonie Taylor displayed a book on the 46th Pre-Convention in addition to reporting the following highlights from the Federation Meeting. A new State Square Dance Dress will be designated. Guidelines are reported elsewhere in the *Keepin' Posted*. A change in State Convention procedures will permit the ribbon sales for the following year's convention to begin at noon on Saturday at the discretion of that chairman. Closing

time for the convention to be Sunday night at 10:30 instead of 11 p.m. Callers Ass'n and Round Dance Council must also vote on the closing time.

46TH NATIONAL CONVENTION:

EARLY BIRD REGISTRATION: Jack Hoffman states that the Early Bird program is over. 4139 dancers purchased Early Bird Ribbons.

PRE-CONVENTION: Full report on file. Duke and Doris McCleskey expressed their thanks and congratulations to all who worked on the Pre-Cee. Thanks were also extended to them from the CFA Board and statements were made by several as to the overwhelming success of the Pre-Cee due to Duke and Doris being so well organized. Duke listed numbers and statistics of persons attending various segments of the Pre-Cee which indicated that Florida had the highest attendance ever, without a doubt.

WAYS AND MEANS: PeeWee Stewart stated that over \$3500 worth of merchandise was sold at the Pre-Cee, and everyone needs to turn in their inventory before the Florida State Convention. There are only 100 dress kits left and there will be no additional.

OLD BUSINESS:

46th BENEFIT DANCE: A check for \$812, the entire revenue from the dance held on February 17th at the Federation Working Weekend, was donated to the 46th NSDC and presented to Worley and Nan Carrier.

HOUSING CHAIRMAN - 1996 FLORIDA STATE CONVENTION: Randy Poole reported that 55 room reservations have been made at the Holiday Inn.

RV CHAIRMAN - 1996 FLORIDA STATE CONVENTION: George Knapp reported that Tiki Village will reserve 25 slots at \$15 for square dance campers attending the convention on the Memorial Day weekend in 1996.

SHOWCASE OF IDEAS FOR NATIONAL CONVENTION: The Knapps will develop a topographical layout of International Drive, from Wet & Wild to Sea World. The Pooles and the Chabots will set up models of the Convention Center, hotels and other special areas of activity on this layout.

NEW BUSINESS:

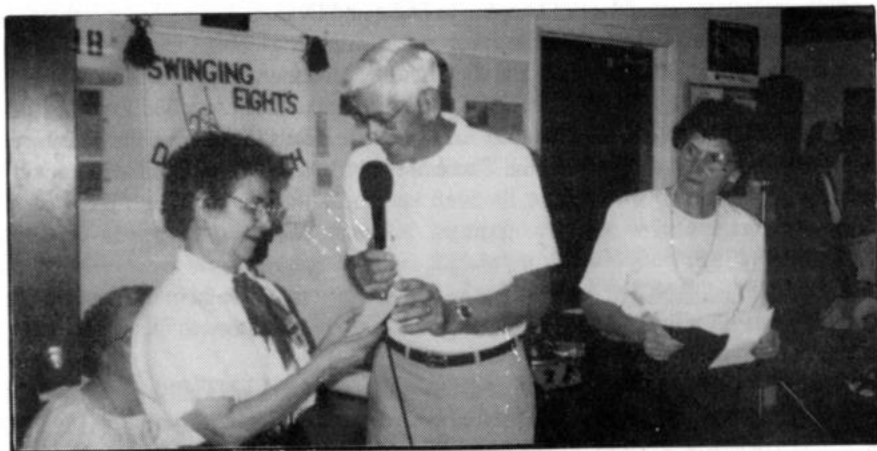

dance by Jack and Miki Krimmel and they will take office on July 1, 1996.

FREE CFA DANCE TO GRADUATES: The membership voted to issue "coupons" to all new dancer graduates entitling them to one free CFA dance. Coupon will expire on December 31, 1996. The new dancer may choose which one dance he wishes to use the coupon for.

HANDICAPABLE DONATION: Vivian Wilson requested that CFA make a donation to assist the Yellow Rockers in attending their National Convention. The membership voted to donate \$300 to this cause.

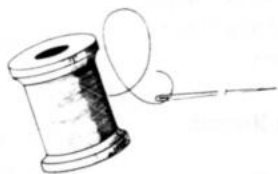

But when the round dance is performed properly;
The styling and movements are something to see.
With petticoats and dresses moving in unison;
Cuers get delight out of viewing such execution.

The ladies glide along as if on cushions of air;
Gentlemen directing them with an eloquent flair.
So if you're ever in the mood for something new,
Dancing in the round may be the thing for you.

A press release from the American Callers Association appearing in the May 1996 issue of *Bow & Swing* contains information pertaining to licensing procedures for State and National Conventions which may be misleading to leaders of dancer's associations in the State of Florida.

Please be advised that there is no need for any Association, Club, or Dancer in the State of Florida to contact A.C.A., or either of the licensing agencies for information and in fact would be detrimental for any dancer or association to do so.

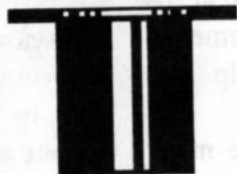
The Florida Federation of Square Dancers has an existing agreement for licensing with both BMI and ASCAP. Therefore no further requests for licensing information should be made to either of these organizations. Nor should A.C.A. be contacted for forms or other information.

This agreement, which has been in effect since 1990, pertains to dancer's associations and/or club functions only and is separate from any agreement made with Callerlab, Roundalab or any other caller/cuer organizations.

The licensing agreement between the Florida Federation and BMI and ASCAP would be seriously jeopardized if any individual dancer or association contacted the agencies on their own. The Cooking Corner



Here is a recipe for corn bread that is very similar to that we have eaten in Boston Market. It is sweet -- almost a dessert, but ummm, it is goooood.

Honey Corn Bread

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup yellow cornmeal
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup whipping cream
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 1/4 cup honey

Combine the cream, oil, eggs and honey in a small bowl. Beat until well mixed. In a medium bowl, combine flour, cornmeal, sugar, baking powder and salt. Stir the cream mixture into the dry ingredients just until moistened. Pour into a greased 9-inch square baking pan. Bake at 400° for 20-25 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in the center comes out clean.

Yield: 9 servings

Note: For guilt reasons, I could not bring myself to use whipping cream, so I used half and half coffee cream. Worked fine.

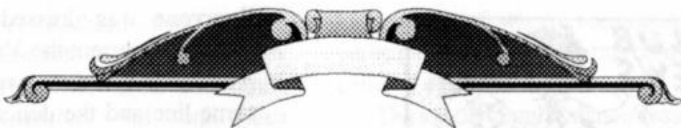
Educational Opportunities

HISTORICAL TID-BITS

February 15, 1957: The first business meeting of the Association was held at the home of Mary & Hack Chilton. Temporary officers were elected to hold office until June. They were President, Al Cody; Vice President, Jack Harwisch; Secretary, Rose Harwisch; Treasurer, Mary Chilton.

July 11, 1971: After the General Meeting held at the Ben White Recreation Center in Orlando, delicious pie and coffee were served by Pee Wee and Mary Stewart in honor of their 1st Anniversary.

November 1980: The first issue of a newsletter for the Central Association was published by Betty Bruce and Curtis McDowell. A contest was held to name it which was won by Bev Whitney of the Wagon Wheels, St. Cloud. (Bev and her husband are still listed as members of the Wagon Wheels—1995-96.) The winning name was KEEPIN' POSTED. The prize was \$25 cash and a years FREE Association membership for Bev and her husband.

1981: After the death of John Berger, Blood Bank Chairman, the Association Blood Bank was officially named "The John Berger Blood Bank." Roland Hamel, who had been Assistant Chairman was named Chairman.

January 16, 1982: There was discussion concerning the practice of using the Golden Key that has been used for free admission to dances. This Golden Key has not been used recently and it was suggested by Pee Wee Stewart that the Key be found and the program continued.

were asked to step to the front of the hall and be recognized and 15 couples stepped forward.

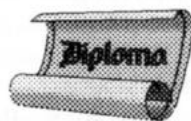

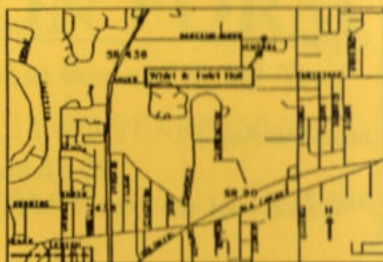
