BOARD MEETING

September 10, 2000

Shoney's Restaurant, Deltona, FL.

Meeting called to order at 2:01 PM by President Will Barnhart. Invocation by Mary Stewart. Pledge of Allegiance led by Will Barnhart.

Secretary called the Roll. A Quorum was present.

Guests included: Duke & Doris McClesky; Jack & Zonie Taylor; Bruce & Colleen Morgan; Dick & Nany King; and, Mickey & Betty Sams.

Secretary's Report: Motion made to dispense with reading of the minutes. Seconded and Carried.

Treasurer's Report: Our bank, NationsBank, is now charging a service charge for the checking account. Banks are being queried. Total cash and bank accounts is \$ 3,898.32. Total assets are \$10,785.40.

Blood Bank: 432 units available. Donor danglers will be presented to donors. With a gallon to their credit. Donald Russell has donated over 50 Gallons. You can start earning the danglers by giving the Gift of Life NOW!

Membership: Now have 319 members. Area Directors will be visiting each club to persuade club members that CFA membership is very beneficial.

Keepin' Posted: Next issue will be sent to the printers electronically. Editors are on vacation.

Historian: Mike had triple bypass and is coming along fine. After much research, we discovered how CFA acquired the flag used for all our ceremonies. Mike wrote a synopsis which is now available. Scrapbooks are up to date and will be displayed.

Federation: Cities in line for the National Convention are: 2001 - Anaheim, CA; 2002 - Minneapolis, MN; 2003 - Oklahoma City, OK; 2004 - Denver, CO. Starting in 2004, bidding cities will not be competing against each other. Next meeting Nov. 5 in Boynton Beach, FL.

Area Directors: The usual summertime slowdown has affected all our clubs.

North Brevard - The Allemanders have visited several local clubs to boost attendance. Their visits were returned. They also will start a class on October 7th. Canaveral Squares have had a slow summer. The Fun Loving Squares are down for the summer - they resume dancing on October 4th. Palm Bay Promenaders have moved to Trailer Haven in Melbourne and are now in the North Brevard area. The Silver Squares resume dancing on November 7th. Space Trackers have remained active over the summer and have started a new class of twenty. They will hold the Fall Fling with Dee Dee Dougherty on October 28th at Travis Recreation Center in Cocoa, FL.

South Brevard/Indian River - The Yellow Rockers celebrated their 19th Anniversary Dance and are planning a Knothead trip on October 14th. They will also start a new class on Oct 18th with the first ten weeks free to the students. The Barn Dancers attended the Knothead Konvention and won the Idiot Award for their pajama outfits. The Barefoot Bay Spinners dance Mainstream and will welcome raiders. The Barefoot Bay Twirlers will resume dancing in October.

East Lake - No report.

West Orange - Daphne's Diamond meet every Sunday except the 5th and sponsor a beginner class on Sept 10th. Mirror Images dance every Monday at the Fran Carleton Center; class begins Oct 2nd. Garden Patch Squares dance at Vignetti Recreation Center; they will celebrate their 11th Anniversary on Oct. 12th. Apopka Pirates dance at Fran Carleton Center on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays.

Osceola - Wagon Wheels used a live band for an everything type of dance Aug. 19th. They advertised in the Orlando Sentinel. Twenty-eight non-square dancers attended. They hope these folks will form the basis for a new class. And they intend to offer this form of dance at least twice more.

East Volusia - Flagler Ocean Waves have scheduled three Open Houses. Youth Group leaders and parents were invited. Dixie Squares also will host three Open Houses with lessons beginning Oct. 5th and 12th. Granada Squares began their Open Houses on Sept 26th with lessons starting Oct 10th. It was a lot of fun and raised money for the convention. We can start planning for an event next October or November 2001.

Next meeting - September 30th at City Island, Daytona Beach. John Saunders will call and Phyllis Williams will cue the rounds. The dance will be the President's Ball. CFA attire requested. General Board meeting and Installation of Officers will be at 3:00 PM followed by a potluck dinner.

Mammography
Day**

October marks the 15th anniversary of National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Since the program began in 1985, mammography rates have more

the doubled for women aged 50 or older (from 25 percent in 1987 to 67 percent in 1997) and breast cancer deaths have declined by 1.8 percent each year since 1992.

This is exciting progress, but there are still women who do not take advantage of early detection at all and others who do not get screening mammograms and clinical breast exams at regular intervals.

Women age 65 and older are less likely to get mammograms than younger women (55 percent vs. 65 percent for women age 40 - 49), even though breast cancer risk increases with age.

If all women age 40 and older took advantage of early detection methods - mammography plus clinical exams - breast cancer rates would drop much further.

The key to mammography screening is that it be done routinely - once is not enough.

National Mammography Day is October 20. Mammography facilities around the country will offer reduced fee screening on the 20th and through the month of October. Do you know about our CFA blood bank account? I did but not really. I had never even given it a thought. Then I needed the blood. CFA responded with the

fourteen units of whole blood I needed for my life.

One September day in 1998, I hurried in the front door. While stepping over the dog gate I tangled my foot and hit the tile floor catching myself on my hands. The result was one fractured kneecap, one badly bruised one and two very sore wrists. As I lay there, I remember looking toward the patio and seeing our dog coming my way, tongue at the ready and an impish grin on his face. That darn

dog was going to lick my face! I tried to get up and couldn't. I snaked along the tile floor to the toilet and pulled myself up and with the help of the cabinet stood. The next day, all was taken care of or so we thought.

Some six weeks later, returning from a weekend visit with my elderly two aunts in Tampa, with the "mother of all headaches", I started slurring my words - without a drink or any other cause - it was only 11:00 AM. Eivor told me point blank something is wrong. I slurred back the challenge denying it and called the doctor myself. He met us in the Emergency room as I presented all the symptoms of a stroke. Immediately on the cart and to a room I went. Test confirmed no evidence of a stroke. Following an MRI of my head, the results were known - it was empty - my brain was bruised and a capillary leaking. My blood thinner was working against me. I needed whole blood to overcome its effects. The thinner had to be gone from my system before they could operate. After two days and two seizures, the operating room and I enjoyed a several hour long emergency visit. The doctor opened my head up, removed twenty cc., about four ounces of blood from the bruise and closed it up. I really do have an extra hole in my head and the "patch" in my skull is only attached with stitches so it moves. Scared me bad when it first happened.

A Sweed Adventure

My Swedish-American wife and I were fortunate enough to journey abroad this summer.

After all, her

family must decide whether the new husband of eight years can pass their test(s) for membership.

We heard that John and Linda Saunders were taking a tour group to England and Scandinavia. We decided to join up with them and at least dance one or two nights during both our short but hectic stay in Sweden.

We sallied forth, arriving in Stockholm, Arlanda Airport early on a Saturday morning, September 2. The rental car was picked up and the family evaluation started. Uncle, Aunt, Cousin, Second Cousin;



and, family friend all entertained us - rated me; for the first week days. We traveled to Norrköping, pronounced, Norshepping, and met the "Saunders Bunch" at the Skandic Hotel as they arrived at 5:00 PM. They were as ragged as we. We had dinner while waiting for the Swedish caller. We feasted on a green salad, Schnitzel with boiled potatoes and green beans; and, a dessert of ice cream. Eivor asked if they had any cloudberry jam; and could she have it heated and put on the ice cream. Cloudberry is a typical wild berry of bogs and wetlands; a yellow berry, looks like a raspberry, with a small hard edible pit in the center. In jam it is absolutely delicious - even better warmed on ice cream. We, really Linda, called ahead to tell our hosts that we would be late.

The best laid plans **DO NOT** always work. John's mother passed away on the morning of the intended departure; he stayed behind to "take care of things". By the way, John, very sorry to hear; we think



of you and share your grief. Linda was stuck with the tour. The tour bus driver, Chris, a wonderful English chap, had been delayed in the bus yard; was delayed on the road; had "run out of time on his trip ticket"; and, the hotel was short on staff to assist in the unloading process. Incidentally, he has been with the Saunders for eight years.

Swedish dances are sparsely attended - only 8,000 dancers in the country. Frequently, women will double as men. In contrast to our Plus dances, the caller lights a sign to indicate the level of the dance to be called. Another custom is for anyone to approach anyone else and ask for the dance. And they can really dance. We truly enjoyed ourselves. Linda had done a wonderful job. She brought along memento key chains for our Swedish host dancers handed out by us visiting Americans. Linda told us that John would be arriving in Stockholm on Tuesday.

Another dance was set for that Tuesday evening at the Ekeby School in Vallentuna. We ventured forth with family friends; one of Eivor's schoolmates Kristina and her husband Lennart. The three of us jumped on the commuter train from the village of Salem into the

City. We met Lennart; jumped in to the car and continued out into the countryside to the village of Vallentuna. While waiting for the "Saunders Bunch" to arrive we found out the host club, Jarlebanke Squaredancers, had arranged for John to be picked up and brought to the dance. Wow, what hosts huh? Chris brought the bus into the lot with only a few millimeters to spare making the turn. We were reunited; and the dance moved on. A bedraggled and up for 36 hours John arrived during the second tip.
