WORD STUDY OF THE WORD

THE KINGDOM OF GOD!

In Matthew 20: 1-16 we have a story that tells us a lot of what The Kingdom Of God will be like. There are many who think that Heaven will be a place where there is no work! Where there is nothing but peace and happiness! Along with Verse 10 of 2 Thes 3, "For even when we were with you, this we commanded you, that if any would not work, neither should he eat".

If you remember back to the articles on the great war in heaven when Lucifer was cast out of heaven, this fits in with the great learning that this life is all about. We are here to prepare for the life to come. If we do not achieve in this life, we will pay for it in the life to come. There is no free ride. What we should be doing is preparing for the life that is sure to come, rather than trying to flee a hell that doesn't exist. This article from Matthew 20 shows that life in the Kingdom has folks who are richer than others, folks that are not too happy, folks that work for someone else and that life in general is not much different than what we have now. The main difference is that we have a King that is always right and good!

20 - 1: FOR the kingdom of heaven is like a man that is an householder, who went out early in the morning to hire laborers into his vineyard.

2: And when he had agreed with laborers for a denarius a day, he sent them into his vineyard.

3: And he went out about the third hour, and saw others standing idle in the market place,

4: And said unto them, Go ye also into the vineyard, and whatever is right, I will give you. And they went their way.

5: Again he went out about the sixth and ninth hour, and did the same.

6: And about the eleventh hour he went out, and found others standing idle, and saith unto them, Why stand ye here all the day idle?

7: They say unto him, Because no man hath hired us. He saith unto them, Go ye also into the vineyard, and whatever is right, that shall ye receive.

8: So when evening was come, the lord of the vineyard saith unto his steward, Call the laborers, and give them their hire, beginning from the last unto the first.

9: And when they came that were hired about the eleventh hour they received every man denarius.

10: But when the first came, supposed that they should have received more; and they likewise received every man a denarius.

11: And when they had received it, they murmured against the householder.

12: Saying, These last have worked but one hour, and thou hast made them

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equal unto us, who have borne the burden and heat of the day.

13: But he answered one of them, and said, Friend, I do thee no wrong. Didst not thou agree with me for denarius!

14: Take what is thine, and go thy way; I will give unto this last, even as unto thee.

15: Is it not lawful for me to do what I will with mine own! Is thine eye evil, because I am good?

16: So the last shall be first, and the first last; for many are called, but few chosen.

One thing to note here is that folks worked a twelve hour day! Notice that someone owned things another didn't. Notice that some folks were richer than others - that one person was the boss. In other words, about like they are here. It is important to note here that the Bible teaches that God withheld no good thing from us when he established the earth. Mankind will not be able to say to God that if this or that had been different that we would have reacted differently. As God says in Romans, mankind is without excuse for his actions. Look around, this world is wonderful. Everything needed for happiness has been provided. It is what **WE** do with these things that makes it good or bad. I know a lot of folks think that his or her religion is the most important thing in the world. You will have to admit that, for the most part, your religion is due to where you were born. If you were born in the heartland of China it is a good bet that your religion would be much different. Does this mean that some will be able to say "it isn't my fault, I was born in the wrong country to the wrong parents!" I think not. NATURAL ALTERNATIVES TO OVER THE COUNTER AND PRESCRIPTION DRUGS

IMPORTANT: PLEASE READ

Therefore, before starting any type of natural remedy or medical treatment, or before discontinuing any course of medical treatment you may now be undergoing, you should consult your own health-care practitioner.

DIABETES MEDICATIONS

This is a two part series on DIABETES. This month we discuss some of the OVER THE COUNTER DRUGS used for treatment. Next month we will look at some alternative treatment for diabetes.

Diabetes is a chronic disorder of carbohydrate, fat, and protein metabolism characterized by elevations of blood sugar (glucose) levels and a greatly increased risk of heart disease, stroke, kidney disease, blindness, and loss of nerve function. Diabetes can occur when the pancreas does not secrete enough insulin or if the cells of the body become resistant to insulin. Insulin is a hormone that promotes the uptake of blood sugar by the cells of the body. When there is not enough insulin or when there is a lack of sensitivity to insulin by the cells, the blood sugar cannot be absorbed by the body's cells. This can lead to serious complications.

Type I or Insulin-Dependent Diabetes Mellitus (IDDM) occurs most often in children and adolescents. It is associated with complete destruction of the beta cells of the pancreas, which manufacture the hormone insulin. These individuals will require lifelong insulin for the control of blood sugar levels. The Type I diabetic must learn how to manage his or her blood sugar levels on a day-by-day basis, modifying insulin types and dosage schedules as necessary, according to the results of regular blood sugar testing. About 10 percent of all diabetics are Type I.

Type II or Non-Insulin Dependent Diabetes Mellitus (NIDDM) usually has an onset after an individual is forty years of age. Up to 90 percent of all

BREVARD GOVERNMENT IN ACTION

Following the court order of Judge Chance to build a new courthouse, which included contempt hearings for the County Commissioners, the Commission contracted for a central facility to contain the Circuit Judges and some of the County Judges. High volume County Courts and accompanying support would remain in Melbourne and Titusville, to provide convenience and help alleviate overcrowding at the new facility.

The Commission leased space for the Clerk of Courts in Rockledge through the projected opening date of the new facility, July 1996. When the Clerk only received \$314,000 of a requested \$741,000 increase from the county, the Rockledge office was closed with the County left holding the Lease for another nine months. All personnel were transferred,

After two Years of debate, the Melbourne Courthouse was chosen over the Sarno Complex, the existing courthouse being selected in March, 1996, due to its availability of more courtrooms and existing Facilities for juries, files, holding cells, and the Clerk's offices. The Clerk's budget, submitted in May 1996, requested an additional \$671,000. It did not state that the Melbourne office would be closed.

When the signs went up in May at the Courthouse that the Clerk's office would be closed, the Commission discussed on May 21 contacting the Clerk to keep this office open as per our original intents. On May 28 the clerk sent a letter to the Judiciary and Brevard Attorneys, but not the Board, stating that the County Commission was closing the Melbourne office. While the County Commission appropriates the budget and provide the facilities, the Clerk has full authority over where personnel are located.

On June 4 the Commission again requested the Clerk keep this office open while providing budgetary information on savings achieved by its closure. The closing of the Melbourne Clerk's office runs directly counter to the Board's intent to keep high traffic public transactions in the branch courthouses. The Commission never requested the office closure, nor was notified through the budgetary process that the office would be closed.

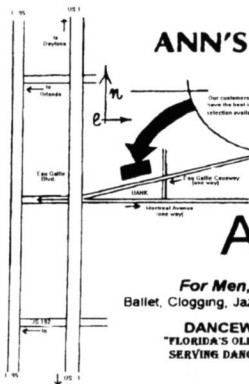

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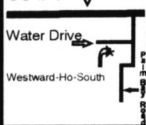

diabetics are Type II. Insulin levels may be low, normal, or elevated. Of greater importance in Type II diabetes is a lack of sensitivity to insulin by the cells of the body. Obesity is a major contributing factor to the loss of insulin sensitivity. Approximately 90 percent of individuals with Type II are obese.

In Type II diabetes, diet is of primary importance and must be tried diligently before a drug is used. Over 75 percent of Type II diabetes can be controlled by diet alone. Despite this high success rate, drugs or insulin are often used.

Diabetic Medication (Oral Hypoglycemic Drugs)

There is no question that a Type I diabetic requires insulin. This discussion of diabetes medications will be limited to oral blood sugar-lowering (hypoglycemic) drugs used in Type II diabetes. Oral hypoglycemic drugs are sulfa drugs (sulfonylureas) that appear to stimulate the secretion of additional insulin by the pancreas as well as enhance the sensitivity of body tissues to insulin. Some common examples of this class of drugs include (generic followed by some brand name):

Chlorpropamide (Diabinese) Glipizide (Glucouol) Glyburide (DiaBeta,
Micronase) Tolazamide (Tolinase) Tolbutamide (Orinase)

As a group, these drugs are not very effective. The rate of primary failure, an inability to control blood sugar levels after three months of continual treatment at an adequate dosage, is about 40 percent. Furthermore, these drugs generally lose their effectiveness over time. After an initial period of success, they will fail to produce a positive effect in about 30 percent of cases. The overall success rate of adequate control by long-term use of sulfonylureas is no more than 20 to 30 percent at best.

In addition to being of limited value, there is evidence to indicate that these drugs actually produce harmful long-term side effects. For example, in a landmark study conducted by the University Group Diabetes Program (UGDP) on the long-term effects of tolbutamide it was shown that the rate of death due to a heart attack or stroke was two and a half times greater than for the group controlling their Type II diabetes by diet alone.

Due to the high risk of side effects, these drugs have to be used with extreme caution. They should not be used in the following situations:

Pregnancy - Known allergy to sulfa drugs

During infection, injury, or surgery - During long-term corticosteroid use

In addition, these drugs must be used with extreme caution in treating the very old, alcoholics, those taking multiple drugs, and those with impaired liver or kidney function.
