#### FROM THE LOFT



The Nationals that were held in Indianapolis, Indiana are history. It was a very good and well run National Square and Round Dance Convention. The sound was good, air good, callers good, and all who attended were pleased. There is one thing that always is a downer and I want to address this problem as at all

the Nationals I have attended it has been a downer. I am referring to the Parade of States. This is the last function of the National Convention.

The primary rule of any function is that it builds to a grand finale, an event that makes people want to come back to the next event. Callers, like Jerry Reed, plan to make the last tip a really special tip so the dancers not only stay for the complete dance but leave wanting to come to the next dance. I have always felt that we need to incorporate more of the Amway recruiting methods and now I am convinced that we need to also incorporate more of their philosophy in regard to conventions.

At the Indianapolis Convention I do believe that they out did other conventions in the way they did the Parade of States. Here they get hundreds of the most loyal dancers and assemble them behind curtains so they can not be seen, but neither can they see, and have them stand for over 90 minutes. During this time they have the exhibition groups performing! Can we see them? NO! Are we a happy group standing there waiting to march in the Parade of States? NO! Did I hear (or make) any positive statements during this 90 minutes of standing on a hard concrete floor? NO! Why do we do this? What is the purpose? After standing and wishing we weren't there, we finally march onto the floor of the arena and STAND some more while everybody and the grandkids are introduced, while the Color Guard marches in, while the speeches and awards are made!

This is not the first time I wished I was not there. I don't know why but when Linda asked me to march in I said yes. It was not her fault, it was mine! I hated every minute that I was forced to stand waiting for the Parade to start. Can any good come of this experience? Yes! One is that I will NEVER partake of another Parade of States! What a waste, what a very negative way to end a great convention, or any convention, or any



event. The event that should be the highlight of the entire program only has the dancers wishing they were not where they found themselves. That is what I meant above when I said we need to incorporate some of Amway's convention skills into ours. You attend an Amway event and I assure you that the finale has you waiting to go to the next convention. People are fired up. They are excited! I am afraid we can not say that about the Square Dance Conventions. I have heard too many dancers say the Parade of States is a waste. I think most dancers vote that way by NOT taking part in the parade. What is the purpose of the Parade of States? I have no idea. If it is to recognize the states having the most dancers there, why not just have the states recognized as they stand in the bleachers when their state is called? They could yell and cheer or do whatever. Would not the same thing be accomplished? We could all see the demonstrations too. Maybe the whole last evening program needs to be redone. We should have a program that is exciting. One that ends the convention on a high note.

I am not being critical. The folks who work to bring us these conventions have given nearly 5 years of their time and effort to present these conventions. It is not an easy job. It is getting harder every year as we have fewer dancers to volunteer for the jobs that have to be done. I hate to add to this the fact that our dancers are also getting older. These volunteers have done a great job. I am afraid that the Parade of States is an item that continues through inertia and not because it is something we need or that even adds to the convention experience. Again, I don't mean to be critical but we need to examine this activity and do whatever we can to make the National Convention a real pleasant experience – one we want to return to. By the way, the number of dancers at Indianapolis barely toped 10,000. Another reason to look at anything that hurts the activity.

The 4th of July Picnic and Dance at THE BARN was well received. We had nearly 60 people for the cookout and 6 squares of dancers for the square and round dance. Phyllis Williams did her normal outstanding job in cueing and I thank her. The only negative remark that I heard was that we should have made more tickets available. We limited the tickets to 48 because when I printed them we only had 6 picnic tables. We will do 10 squares for the Labor Day Picnic and Dance which will be held on Labor Day, September 6th. Please see Sharon Calvert or Tom Fontaine for tickets, or you can purchase them at THE BARN. Sharon and Tom have filled the position of marketing our special dances at THE BARN.

We have been very fortunate at filling the Organizational Chart for THE BARN DANCERS with outstanding volunteers. I am sure that many of the groups could use help, so, if you have time and would like to be part of DanceWorld, just get in touch with us here at THE BARN.


We currently have seven special dances at THE BARN each year. These dances are:

I will be reporting monthly on the results of our fundraising activities. We have a very ambitious project underway. Can we make it happen? How long will it take?

The project is to build a new building that will eventually be able to dance over 100 squares. We will have the ability to have 4 separate halls in the new building with the main hall able to dance over 50 squares on a hard wood floor. This project will be in phases with the building first to be used for a pavilion for the park area and as a youth facility. As money is raised it will allow us to change it into a first class dance hall with full kitchen. Offices will be available for us to market dancing full time to the general public and to bring all clubs together in promoting the dance activity. The total cost of the new dance hall will be approximately one million dollars. We have not raised \$2000. Yet. When we get the first \$100,000 we will be able to pour the concrete, rough in the plumbing and put up the shell of the building. The air conditioning for the  $100 \times 150 \times 20$  foot building will cost \$100,000 by itself. We do have big plans for DanceWorld. We want you to be a part of it. Elsewhere in this issue we list the contributors who have given to this project and list the dancers who have volunteered to serve on the steering committee of DanceWorld. Together we can make it happen. One day we will have a ground breaking ceremony to start the new building. Already the land is cleared and \$12,000 spent on fill dirt to raise the foundation a foot above the crown of Minton Road. This is a very large project and will not happen without a lot of support from a lot of dancers. This is our chance to make a real contribution to square dancing and to have our memory live on long after we are dead. A piece of immortality for each of us. What a way to start the new millennium! Please consider this project when ever you plan your finances. Our Fund raising committee will be providing this publication with ideas on how to raise this amount of money.

This has been a lengthy discussion on a number of subjects. I only get to meet you once a month so you will forgive me for being so wordy. I welcome your feedback on the projects we now have under way. Please send them to THE BARN OWL or drop them in the box by the door in the main hall of THE BARN.

## **AUGUST CANAVERAL NEWS**

Subject: Message from Iver and Mary in Oregon Date: Wed, 14 Jul 1999 14:03:32 -0400 (EDT)

Dear Square Dance Friends:

We are in Albany, OR, now after having left Melbourne on 4th of July. We drove the truck out to pick up a slide in camper we ordered in January. We get the camper this coming Friday; it was manufactured in Canada and is well insulated and pretty nice.

The truck performed perfectly, getting an average of 16.2 miles/gal; pretty good considering it is a big truck with a big engine (diesel). Diesel prices averaged about \$1.05/gal until we got to

OR where the price went into a step function to \$1.50/gal, with gas prices even higher-a huge concern (more like outrage out here). Told it is worse in CA where we will be next week.

The fourth day on our trip we stopped in Fountain, CO, for a 1.5 day family reunion with Mary's relatives (brother/family, her niece/family) who assembled there via vacation trips as a common meeting spot. It was great, as we had not been with some of the kin folks since about 1985.

In Battle Mountain, NV, we made a surprise visit to an old friend we had not seen since 1962, Dave Blake, a mining geologist now retired. Dave and I commuted together to OSU in the early 60s. In two hours we got caught up on all the really significant happenings (our kids mainly) in our life that occurred since we were last together.

Albany, OR, is where I was born, went to school etc-with Oregon State University (for BS and MS) about 10 miles from here. Albany use to be a lumber town mainly. Now it has a little of everything but the main industry is a HP factory nearby. McDonalds, Taco Bell, Sams etc etc etc are all here-looking just like 192 in Melbourne. There use to be lots of "Duedall" names in the Albany telephone book; now there is only one, my aunt, 85, who we are staying with. Thus the Duedall name is truly endangered and will probably be extinct in a few years.

We have been visiting friends from the "old days" (the 50s). But there aren't many left as people have either moveed away or died.

Yesterday we had a great family picnic at mineral springs park in the Cascade Mountains about 25 miles from here. We used to drink the mineral springs water (then told it was great for health), but there was sign at springs well that said the water is "unpure" for drinking.

On the way to the picnic we took a side trip to an 80-acre Douglas fir woodlot up in the mountains that my uncle bought in 1950s for 12000 dollars (now worth in the 7 figures). To get to it we had to climb an old logging road-great test for the truck-no problem make the grade. My uncle, now retired, has been practicing sustainable log harvesting for years although he didn't call it by that name-he just called it common sense. He has a logging company take away only the wind fallen trees every year-this year 23 truck loads were hauled away for making lumber at a local saw mill. He then has douglas fir seedlings planted. The forest service gives him a big capital gains break if he replants. He also has the logging company "thin out" the stand by removing the smaller trees so the bigger ones will grow bigger and faster. I told my uncle I would relay all this information to my students in Global Environmental Problems and Solutions next fall as an example of sustainable forest management by a small owner.

Friday we drive to Coos Bay, OR, a coastal town about 100 miles south of here. Coos Bay is famous for the grounding of the New Carrisa oil tanker in around January-John Windsor followed it closely. Pieces of the hull are still there-its kind of a local saga as the ship wreak seems to come back to the beach after it is towed away a bit. The OR coast is terribly rough and windy. Will go to the beach to take some pictures of what's left of the New Carrisa.

After we get the camper, which "slides-in" on the truck bed, we will travel to WA state to visit more relatives and friends; then we return to OR to Hood River (on the Columbia River Gorge, bordering WA state) to spend a few days with my cousins who are apple farmers (they have huge orchards-nothing but apple trees); will help him move irrigation pipe. Apple trees need a lot of water-the water comes from snow melt on nearby Mt. Hood and feeds thousands of acres of orchards scattered everywhere in the Hood River area. The water is really cheap and only needs "gravity" to get it to the orchards. We were in Hood River last years too and really liked it

From Hood River we will go back to Albany for a few days, and then to CA to see my brother/family and sister/family and then to So CA to see more of Mary's relatives

We will send another report in a week or two.

We wish you could see the Pacific Northwest. Obviously it is very different than Florida. The main thing OR and FL have in common is the very rapid growth in population. Many people come here from CA to retire. There use to be a sign on the OR-CA border that said "don't californicate oregion". But the majority of OR people got the smell of that CA money so they welcomed the infusion. Now, of course, the local people can't buy property at a decent price.

#### THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

3. They motivate repentance.

(ROM 3:20) "THEREFORE BY THE DEEDS OF THE LAW THERE SHALL NO FLESH BE JUSTIFIED IN HIS SIGHT: FOR BY THE LAW IS THE KNOWLEDGE OF SIN."

(ROM 7:7-8) "WHAT SHALL WE SAY THEN? IS THE LAW SIN? GOD FORBID. NAY, I HAD NOT KNOWN SIN, BUT BY THE LAW: FOR I HAD NOT KNOWN LUST, EXCEPT THE LAW HAD SAID, THOU SHALT NOT COVET. (8) BUT SIN, TAKING OCCASION BY THE COMMANDMENT, WROUGHT IN ME ALL MANNER OF CONCUPISCENCE. FOR WITHOUT THE LAW SIN WAS DEAD."

4. To review God's guidelines for the good life.

(1 JOHN 5:3) "FOR THIS IS THE LOVE OF GOD, THAT WE KEEP HIS COMMANDMENTS: AND HIS COMMANDMENTS ARE NOT GRIEVOUS."




