

All other NE clubs dance at either a school, church or Senior Center and NONE of these locations will not allow any outside actives at their venue.

A past board member of NEFSARDA received an email, and also a caller, received an email requesting some gift cards to donate to Veterans at Hospice and Palliative care units. This is a scam!

After much thought and consideration, the Florida Federation, Florida Callers Association and Florida Cuers Association have made the hard decision to cancel the 2021 Florida State Square and Round Dance convention. These are unprecedented times with COVID-19. Some might say this was an unwise decision or the right decision. I'm sure none of us really know. We can only make what we feel is a safe decision. Richard and Carol Douget have agreed to be the 2022 convention chairman. Everything will remain the same except the date. Ribbons already purchased will be honored for 2022.

The Florida Federation of Square Dancers had to cancel our Working Weekend planned for the middle of May. At the time of this writing, we have not picked a date to reschedule. As most festivals have cancelled so has the NE Fall Festival planned for November. This decision was not made lightly.

- 2) Keep your ribbon for entrance to the 2021 Fall Festival
- 3) Request a full refund

The 67th Florida State Convention will now be held on March 4th and 5th of <u>2022</u>. Everyone has agreed to remain on board and everything will remain the same. Carol and Richard Douget has graciously agreed to continue chairing the convention and are carrying thru with their original theme: "LIGHTING THE WAY TO FRIENDSHIP AND FUN" featuring Lighthouses.

They wanted to convey that there is no need to worry about having bought items that are "dated" as they will be not reordering replacements until the present inventory runs out. There are still plenty of shirts available – maybe they will become collector's items, you never know. LIGHTHOUSE #6 EGMONT KEY LIGHT

Egmont Key is a small island in the Tampa Bay area. It is known that Spain ruled the Florida area longer than the United States had been a country but it soon gave way to British rule. It was under British rule that the Key was named. It was named after



the Earl of Egmont who was Lord of the Admiralty and a very prominent man in Brittan, John Perceval.

At the time the first lighthouse was being built (1848) a Colonel Robert E. Lee was making a survey of the southern bay coast and recommended some defensive works be built. That was when the first Lighthouse was put on the Key. It lasted less than 6 months because a hurricane washed over it with huge 15 foot waves. Needless to say, that was referred to as the GREAT HURRICANE of 1848. Even though it was rebuilt there were many more valiant storms that took its toll on the structure second tower so it was dismantled in 1857. A second tower built and lighted in 1858, this time it was constructed with 3-foot-thick brick walls and stands 90 feet tall.

Before the second lighthouse was built, the Seminole Indians were being forced to migrate to Oklahoma but they were relocated on Egmont Key for a while. Their chief, Billy Bowlegs, was offered \$200,000 to move his tribe westward voluntarily, he refused and lead an attack in Big Cypress instead which started the Third Seminole War. It was this incident that eventually lead to the Indians now infamous "Trail of Tears".

It was during the Civil War that the "light" was removed from the top of the lighthouse by the Confederates mostly to frustrate the Union Navy's efforts to blockade Tampa Bay. Early in the Civil War, Confederate blockade-runners used the island as a base. Later it was captured (in July 1861) by the Union forces who used it as a base for attacks on the Confederate ships and other hostile positions in the Tampa area.

Egmont Key is steeped is so much early American history it would be very hard to give it justice. The Spanish-American War, Second & Third Seminole Wars, Civil War, and even World War 1 and World War II are all etched in Egmont Keys History. There are many books at your local library that would be worth while researching and enjoying. A lot of the information written here, I found in "Florida's Fabulous Lighthouses" book, which you can order from Carol Douget, Convention Chairman. They will be only \$16.00 each now and I believe there are still 4 left.

LIGHTHOUSE #7 - CAPE FLORIDA LIGHTHOUSE

Even though the Florida State Convention has been *POSTPONED* the chairmen, Carol & Richard Douget, have asked that I continue writing about the Lighthouses around the State of Florida just to keep the momentum going and keep the interest about what will be planned around this theme – LIGHTING THE WAY TO

FRIENDSHIP AND FUN.

The Cape Florida Lighthouse is located at the southern end of Key Biscayne. It was built in 1812 to protect shipping in the straits of Florida. The first time the lighthouse was built it was 65 feet tall with wooden stairs. In December of 1825 the lighthouse was lit for the very first time.

In 1835 a major hurricane struck the island, damaging the lighthouse and destroying the keepers house. The light-



house keeper, Captain Dubose, moved his family to Key West for safety. Assistant lighthouse keeper, John Thompson, remained to guard the light along with an African American handyman named Aaron Carter. In 1836, the already much damaged lighthouse was attacked by a fearse band of Seminole Indians. The two men did manage to flee into the lighthouse while being shot at, both were wounded. The Indians kept firing into the structure which ignited the kerosene oil stored at the bottom. The fire forced both the wounded and burning men up onto the lighthouses platform that ran around the light. Carter eventually died of his wounds. The Indians, after looting and burning the other buildings, left the next morning believing both men were dead. Thompson survived but had no way to get down from the tower since the stairs were burned away. A United States Navy schooner, the Motto, heard the explosion of a gun powder keg during the attack and over the next few days were able to rescue Thompson. After this siege the Cape Florida Light remained extinguished from 1836 to 1846.

The tower and keeper's quarters were ordered rebuilt in 1846. It remains the oldest standing structure in Miami-Dade County. The lighthouse was re-lit in 1847. But in 1855 it was renovated again and 95 more feet were added to its height.



Mike currently teaches for the Buckles & Bows in Thousand Oaks, California.

Mike records for Rhythm Records, regularly does caller clinics, and helped produce an Introduction to Contra Dancing package for R & R Video, with the California Contra Caller's Association.

FLORIDA HALL OF FAME

Nominees must have a minimum of 10 years statewide involvement in the Florida Square and Round Dance activity. Their contributions must encompass the entire state of Florida, not just 1 or 2 areas. This should require unselfish dedication of time and labor.

Being an area president, Federation president, Caller/Cuer Association president and/or State Convention chairman is not enough. The Hall of Fame is seeking individuals or couples whose efforts have affected the majority of the State of Florida.

Preparing a nominating resume will take some time and investigation to make it complete. Talk to other dancers, callers and/or cuers for dates, places and times the nominee was involved in statewide participation. Follow the who, what, when and where rule as you investigate and prepare the resume. The more information submitted, the better.

Once the resume is finished there are two ways in which to present the information to the Hall of Fame Committee. The resume may be submitted to the board of directors of any of the five area associations, Callers Association or Cuers Association. The area or association board of directors will review the resume and vote to reject or pass it on to the Hall of Fame Committee. The resume may also be sent to the Hall of Fame committee chairman. Resumes must be received by the Hall of Fame committee by November 1st of each year. It is suggested that any association not submit more than 2 resumes for consideration per year. The Hall of Fame Committee shall meet and review all resumes presented and vote by secret ballot to forward such resumes to the Selection Committee for the final vote.

- 2.) The award(s) presented shall be a framed document and an "Extra Mile Award Recipient" bar or dangle.

Your Career Can Really Help Out in the World of Square Dancing by Corben Geis

Another very awesome aspect of square dancing is the blend of so many different people with all kinds of different backgrounds. I remember being in a square one time with a doctor, a farmer, a car mechanic, and an accountant. That sounds like the beginning of a joke. "A doctor, a farmer, a car mechanic, and an accountant walk into a square dance..." They all had very diverse occupations. They all had their own unique personality. But it was square dancing that was the common interest that brought them all together. This to me is fascinating.

I think a variety of careers can really benefit square dancing. I believe that if we seek out these square dancers and interest them to share their talents, gifts, and expertise that they all, coming together, can really promote our activity for the better.

Here's how I'm thinking. If my club has a dancer who is...

A MEDIC, I'd get them to put together several good first aid kits, just in case we'd ever need them at a dance. I may even look to that individual in encouraging other dancers to get CPR and maybe even First Aid Certified. I would probably also get them on board to help out with wheelchair square dancing when our club performs demos in hospitals and nursing homes. What could you suggest to the medics of your club to help with square dancing?

A FARMER, I would ask if they could perhaps bring in some fresh food from their gardens for folks to try for our snacks at the dance. I'd probably even get with them to see about putting together a hay ride for our square dancers and their extended families. What a great way of bringing people together. Perhaps they could even accommodate a barn to have an open house/beginner party night. What could you suggest for the farmers of your club to help with square dancing?

A MECHANIC, I would definitely let everyone know, of course with the permission of the mechanic, that they are the handy person (s) of the club. I remember travelling to a club one time and my car wouldn't start afterwards, and I had no clue what was wrong with it and one of the dancers was a car mechanic. He popped open my hood, rooted around in there for a couple of minutes, and fixed the problem. He also told me what happened and what to do when I got back home. The fix-it dancers were always my 'go to' dancers because they would also know how to construct a float for our parades that we were in. The mechanics are the ones I go to especially when I'm having any kind of troubles with my sound system. What could you suggest for the mechanics of your club to help with square dancing?

An ACCOUNTANT, I would try to recruit the CPA as our club treasurer, without a doubt. If they weren't interested in that I might try approaching them with fundraising events for our club. They would also be my first choice to help arrange any cruises, bus trips, or convention trips. What could you suggest to the accountants of your club to help with square dancing?

An ARTIST, I can speak first-hand about this job. Having an artist associated with any club can really help out with designing flyers, signs, and poster promos. We artists love to decorate, especially for theme dances... well, at least I know I do. Having anyone with a visual communications background can really help out with the over-all look fan appearance of your club. Have your artists design the club logo, the banner, your badges, etc. What could you suggest to the artist of your club to help with square dancing?

A TEACHER, I would try to nominate them to get our caller(s) into the school systems; elementary all the way through college levels. Having a teacher is wonderful because of their knowledge. Teachers always make the best club historians, I believe. Being an art teacher myself, I've been known to make fun facts about square dancing and putting them on flyers at our dances. By enlarging them on bigger paper you can make them in to place mats and distribute them throughout area restaurants, coffee shops, and cafes. Teachers and professors are always a good source to confide in when you are talking about insurances for your club. What could you suggest for the teachers of your club to help with square dancing?

A REFEREE, I love these folks. They are the ones who can head up a group to demo at a non-dancer forum and these are the guys who can put together a competitive group of square dancers too. In

Pennsylvania, we have our State Farm Show every January and if your club has a referee, official or umpire you are in luck because these are the people who can put things together and do it right. They are also coaches. Look for the dancers at your club who you know will look good with a whistle and a clipboard. Refs are fantastic to have especially if there is ever a dispute at your club. What could you suggest to the referee/coaches of your club to help with square dancing?

A COUNSELOR, these wonderful people are crucial to any club because of their social work with people. Counselors have wonderful ideas. I'd put them on the creative committees along with the artists and teachers, and what a terrific marketing group you'd have for you club. If there is an issue with any kind of person, place or thing involving your club, a counselor may helpful to the caller and officers with advising them on how to approach certain matters. What could you suggest to the medics of your club to help with square dancing? Those are just 8 occupations I have mentioned in this article, but there are many more kinds of careers and people out there. You as a club member, or officer, caller or leader need to know how to find the good in people and how to turn to them to utilize their capabilities for the good of your club and for square dancing. Being a caller, we often wear many hats. I find myself sometimes being a medic, a builder, a handyman, as the accountant, as the artist, as the teacher, as the referee, and even as a counselor. So to have these kinds of people on board and at my dances is extremely beneficial. What could you suggest to the different kinds of trades, occupations, and vocations in your club to help with square dancing?

Identifying Head or Side Girls During a Tip

The following question was received from a caller: "How do you know the designation for a girl if she is not with her original partner or her original opposite?"

For example, If a side girl is with a head boy, is she still a side girl or is she now a head girl? The "rule" is that at Mainstream and Plus, the girl always assumes the identity of the boy who is her partner. So from a static square, after the ladies Chain 3/4, the caller can now say: "Sides Flutterwheel," and those at the side position will do the call. The original head girl is now a side girl.

Likewise, after the ladies Chain 3/4, if the caller says: "Promenade, don't slow down, Heads Wheel Around," it is the head boy and the girl who is with him (who previously was a side girl).

This rule has been in effect for over 50 years.

It becomes trickier from other setups. For example, after ladies Chain 3/4 and the caller establishes standard lines facing out, let's say the caller wishes to have two couples Wheel Around to form two-faced lines. If the caller says, "Heads Wheel Around," it would automatically be each head boy and the girl with him.

But this puts more pressure on the girl, because this is more of an involved situation. So to have less pressure on the girl, it might be better for the caller to say: "Head boy and the girl with you — Wheel Around." It is not a rule that the caller needs to say this, it is just a suggestion hopefully to make for less confusion.

But the rule makes a change. At Advanced and Challenge, the original rule no longer applies. Now everyone, including the girl, keeps his or her original identity throughout the tip, no matter whom a person has as a partner.

This rule change is not written anywhere, but it is the way these programs have always operated.

So at Advanced and Challenge, if the side girl is with a head boy, the caller must always say: "Head boy and the girl with you. ..." This applies everywhere, including a squared set, from a Promenade, and all other situations where the caller wishes to designate two particular couples. If the caller knows that each boy has his original partner or opposite, then the caller can just say Heads or Sides.

As a result, if a caller is sight calling at Advanced or Challenge and is not sure who has whom, the caller should say, "Head boy and the girl with you ..." as insurance that everyone

will operate smoothly.

If a caller who calls a lot of Advanced and Challenge is calling a Mainstreamor Plus dance, that caller may say, "Side boy and the girl with you ..." from a squared set or a Promenade. The caller is so used to saying this that it just comes out automatically. It does not hurt anything and may make it clearer for some.

LITTLE STINGS

An eastern fable tells of a potentate who demanded that there should be brought to him the stingers of a thousand bees killed because one of their colony had dared commit lese-majesty by stinging the hand of royalty. When they were delivered in a tiny golden thimble, the king was so amazed to find that a thousand of the hypodermic points made such a little mass that he issued manifesto to the effect that hereafter no person within the bounds of the kingdom should complain at the sting of a bee.

The lesson of the fable is that petty annoyances hurt because they are exaggerated in the mind, that when they are seen in their actual proportions they are so slight as to merit only contempt. How much comfort would come to the majority of persons if they could but see the tiny size of the bee stings that lead them to acts of petulance, words of anger, expressions of reproach. The bee sting annoyances have caused lifelong breaches of friendship, broken up families, and caused anger and resentment to take the place of love and loyalty.

The Future of Square Dancing

predict that if some drastic, immediate changes are not made, what we know today as Modern Western Square Dancing will be nearly dead within ten years in the United States.

The attendance at the recent National Convention in Charlotte, NC, was a very good measuring device of slightly more than 13,000 people. The average ten years ago was approximately 19,000 people. Because of this, many vendors are quitting because they can't sell enough merchandise to stay in business

My source of information indicates that Canada is down from 45,000 people to 29,000 people involved in square dancing within the past ten years. Over the same ten year period, Texas has decreased from 16,000 to 9,000 dancers. The Dallas-Fort Worth/North Texas Area alone has decreased from 6,000 to 3,000 dancers.

DO YOU HEAR WHAT I AM SAYING? Wake up America! We are losing the battle because we are not doing what is required to get new dancers into the activity. New dancers are the life blood of square dancing. New dancers buy merchandise from the vendors. New dancers help pay for the halls, callers, cuers, etc.

One reason we are not getting

new dancers is our existing dancers are not recruiting their friends like they used to. Most of us agree that this is the best method for getting new dancers. Well, why are existing dancers not recruiting others into the activity? Because it takes too long to learn!! It takes too long to learn all the programs to be able to dance an entire evening at most clubs and in the main hall at local. state and national conventions. Many current new dancers have told me they love square dancing but they will not encourage their friends to get involved because the lessons are too long for each program. These programs include mainstream, plus and rounds. Round dance cuers should be helping a caller promote and recruit new dance classes. Are they?

Some will say, "Here we go, talking about programs again. I wish we would quit talking about the programs." I say, "How can we quit talking about the programs?" The programs are what we use at every dance. The programs are what we teach to new dancers that takes too long to learn. This is also what is keeping them from recruiting their friends. When are we going to see the light?

We often hear the program is not the problem. Notice I refer to "program" (singular). If we had only "one" program I would agree this is not the problem. However, through Callerlab, we have eight programs. When you add DBD (dance by definition), we automatically increase the programs to a total of sixteen. We keep dangling an ear of corn out in front of the dancers to learn more. We <u>must</u> put a lid on the <u>PROGRAM</u>.

The proposal of "Target 2000" did not pass at the Callerlab meeting this year. The vote was a tie. If Target 2000 is not the answer, then somebody needs to develop an alternative soon or we can kiss this activity goodbye!!

Recently I heard a club president tell their new dancers they must go dancing two to three times per week to keep up with the club. Just a few weeks ago I saw a full plus club graduate a mainstream class and the new dancers were told they would have to go elsewhere to learn plus before they could join the club. WOW! What have we created?

In the past two years of traveling almost all the way around the world, I have been able to call two mainstream dances. All the others had plus mixed in or were full plus.

Many people keep saying the programs are not the problem. This is rediculous! We had better start a short entry program and provide dances for these new dancers to have fun or we may as well hang up the mike. Highly recognized callers must prove that a smaller program will work. Plus, Advanced and Challenge callers as well as round

dance cuers must stop recruiting new dancers into their programs before they are ready. Clubs in these categories must do the same.

A long time caller friend, now the following made retired. "We have trained our statement. level their dancers to incompetence." How true this is. We have tried to make professional dancers out of people who just want to have a good time and not be bored. All too often callers are so the dancers boring. elsewhere and many times to a higher level program, or they quit.

We must also do a better job of advertising! This takes money and time. Probably a lot of people have the time to do what is necessary, but where will the money come from? Square dancing has become the world's "Best Kept Secret".

There are local and state organizations that have a surplus of money that could be used to advertise square dancing. Every avenue of television, radio and billboard publicity as well as web sites should be pursued.

Our theme at Callerlab this past year was "Pathway to the Future". The pathway has many obstacles, but none that cannot be overcome. It is time to unite all our efforts toward advertising to recruit new dancers. Once we get these new people, we must let them know it only takes a short time to learn and enjoy our favorite hobby.

Dear Sheila,

A car stalling after being driven a short distance can be caused by a variety of faults with the engine. Start by checking that there is no debris in the fuel line. If it is clear, check the vacuum pipes and hoses on the intake manifold and also check all grounding wires. If none of these approaches solves the problem, it could be that the fuel pump itself is faulty, causing low delivery pressure to the injectors.
