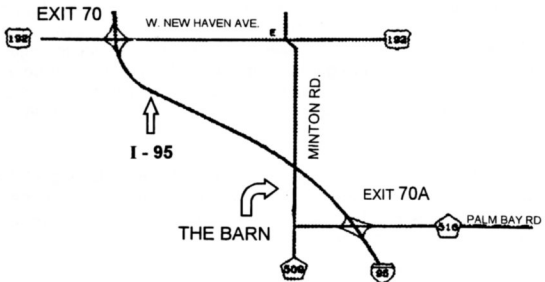

As many of you know, Jerry is the Assistant Executive Director of CALLERLAB, the International Association of Square Dance Callers. As such, he works directly for the Executive Director, Mr. George White, Rochester, MN. During the annual Board of Governors meeting in Cincinnati last May the Board approved Jerry's transition to the position of Executive Director upon the retirement of Mr. White.

When this transition is complete the CALLERLAB Home Office will be relocated from Rochester, MN to Rockledge, FL. The current Home Office staff has elected to not relocate to Florida. Therefore, full time employment opportunities will be available to staff the new office in Rockledge. The staff will consist of two full time employees and one part time staff person. A Financial Advisor/Manager and an Office Manager will be hired full time. Additionally, a part time mail Clerk will also be required. It is anticipated that the transition to the new Home Office facilities will be completed sometime during 1999.

If you would like more information or if you are interested in any of these positions, please contact Jerry. No actual hiring will be done at least until after the first of next year. These positions offer a challenge and opportunity to work with some of the most dedicated people in square dancing and the opportunity to meet some very interesting callers and dancers.

We are looking forward with great anticipation to the challenge of this position. We welcome any comments or inquires. CALLERLAB is the only international caller's organization with nearly 3,000 members from all over the world.

Even though the CALLERLAB office will not be established here for several more months, it is not too early to begin preliminary planning.

COMPUTERS

This month we will discuss WINDOWS 98. It is just released and there are many who question the need to upgrade from WINDOWS 95. If you are running WINDOWS 3.x then you should definitely upgrade to WINDOWS 98 – IF YOUR SYSTEM WILL SUPPORT IT. WINDOWS 98 takes lots of computing power and a lot of disc storage space. The added features of WINDOWS 98 over WINDOWS 3.x are enormous. The power and ease of use will be well worth the effort and cost to upgrade from 3.x to 98.

Upgrading from WIN 95 to WIN 98 is a different matter. You can read articles from both camps. One camp will tell you that WIN 98 is not worth upgrading to. The other folks tell you that it is well worth the cost and time to upgrade. I have read both sides of the upgrade story and have decided to upgrade. It is not real easy for me to upgrade as I have my hard drive partitioned to save disk storage space. This means that I have a lot of reinstalling to do of all my software and data. WIN 98 will save me a lot of disc storage space with its 32 bit FAT table. WIN 98 will also give me a lot of relief from system crashes. With the hardware and software I am utilizing, I have many crashes that are annoying. WIN 98 will provide for protection for these annoying problems.

WIN 98 requires over 100 MEG of disk and you must have at least 8 MEG RAM. The minimum disk size you should have is 2 GIG and at least 16 MEG RAM. You should be operating a Pentium processor (or equivalent) with MMX. An 8x (minimum) CD Player is a must. A super VGA color monitor with 14 inches viewing area should be considered if you are running multiple programs.

As the computer becomes more and more a household device, we will be connecting more and more devices to it. WIN 98 supports the USB (Universe Serial Bus). The USB allows for many more devices to be connected and disconnected to your computer system than the present bus system. The USB not only allows for easy connection and disconnect but allows for a much higher transfer of data for the peripherals to and from the computer bus. This will be the future of peripherals.

I will let you know how the upgrade went on my system next month.

A Scandinavian Adventure

Some of you might be interested in a few of the experiences and observations from our recent Scandinavian holiday. Several friends had suggested that if ever given the opportunity, we should cruise the coast of Norway to enjoy what is internationally known as "The World's Most Beautiful Sea Voyage". So on May 27th., we departed OIA for New York to meet our SAS flight direct to Oslo. The great circle route took us up

over the New England states leaving the North American continent coast Line near Goose Bay, Labrador, south of Greenland, over Iceland then the North Sea to the wild and beautiful coastline of Norway. An hour later, after crossing the coast, we were claiming our bags at the Oslo airport where the temperature was 45 degrees F. We visited the high lights of Oslo such as the Royal Family's Palace, Karl Johann Street (famous shopping street) and the Holmenkollen ski jump site of a past Winter Olympics.

The next day found us on a train for the 6.5 hour trip through scenic snow covered mountains to the coastal city of Bergen where we boarded our ship (m/s Polaris). We sailed late that evening for the 6 day voyage to the far north city of Kirkenes, Norway over 1100 miles away. We passed through the deep fjords and were continuously amazed at the magnificent beauty of the mountains with snow glistening in the sun and the multicolored houses and buildings in city after city. The ship called at 17 ports on our journey north, many of which allowed us time to go ashore and browse through the shops and chat with residents.

We were getting deep into Viking land and stopping at places with names like: Alesund, Thondheim, Rorvik and Nesna. Early on our 4th day we crossed the Arctic Circle (Lat. 66 degrees - 33 minutes, north). It is marked on the shore with a large globe monument. We continued on for two more days visiting other cities such as Harstad, Tromso, and Hammerfest before arriving at the North Cape (Europe's most northern land mass). The captain advised us we were about 1200 miles from the North Pole and our Latitude was 71 degrees - 10 minutes - 21 seconds north. We left the ship for a motor coach ride to the North Cape tourist center and saw many reindeer en-route. We also visited a Sami camp, people similar to Alaskan Eskimos who for thousands of years have lived and developed a culture and life

style for survival in extreme northern climates.

A new 12 inch snow had fallen the day before we arrived at the North Cape and the sky was perfectly clear and very blue which we were told is very rare there. We could see for miles out across the sea toward the North Pole from our vantage point on a cliff 1000 feet above the water. We continued on to Kirkenes, our last north bound port where we toured the city and took a 20 minute ride to the Russian border. This was on the road to Murmansk, the well known Russian Naval base. The entire coast of Norway never freezes due to the warm Gulf Stream currents.

On our return journey back to Bergen, we were treated to the sight of wild Killer Whales and many Puffins near the Lofoten Islands. After 12 days we arrived back in Bergen, did some sight seeing there and flew to Oslo which ended this part of our trip.

Donna and I spent another day in Oslo (where they are preparing for their 1000th year jubilee). When you think of that you have to say the good old USA is only a baby in time. We then took an overnight cruise to Copenhagen for a three day stay (seeing the Little Mermaid and Tivoli Gardens, etc.), then rode a hovercraft to Malmo (in southern Sweden) where we boarded a train for the 6 hour ride through the southern Swedish "Spring time" countryside to Stockholm.

Stockholm is a beautiful city with its many bridges connecting all of the islands it is built on and the stately steeples and spires that abound. Finally it was time to leave so we left our hotel for the 45 minute ride to the airport outside of Stockholm and our non-stop flight to New York and home. It was somewhat of a shock when we arrived home where the temperature was 100 degrees. Still, it was great to be back home with family and friends. Denmark was holding their national Square Dance Convention while we were in Copenhagen but it was over 100 miles away and our schedule just did not allow us to attend, something we wish we could have done.

We will long remember this wonderful vacation and agree that surely this must be "The World's Most Beautiful Sea Voyage" for it showcases some of the world's most breathtaking scenery.

Thanks to Bill and Donna for sharing their trip with us. We did receive a postcard from them of the beautiful country they visited. The post card arrived the same day they did at THE BARN. I am sure they have many photos that they would share with those who would like to see a photo history of their exciting trip.

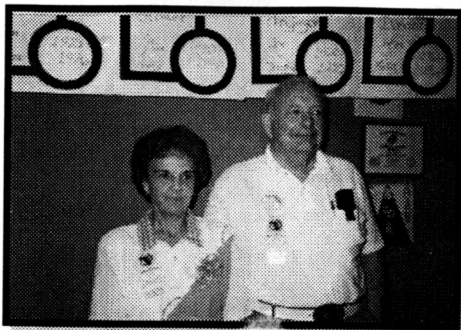

Judah is a lion's whelp: from the prey, my son, thou art gone up: he stooped down, he crouched as a lion, and as an old lion; who shall rouse him up? The sceptre shall not depart from Judah, nor a lawgiver from between his feet, until Shiloh come; and unto him shall the gathering of the people be. Binding his foal unto the vine, and his ass's colt unto the choice vine; he washed his garments in wine, and his clothes in the blood of grapes: His eyes shall be red with wine, and his teeth white with milk.

Zebulun

GEN. 49:13

Zebulun shall dwell at the haven of the sea; and he shall be for an haven of ships; and his border shall be unto Zidon.

Issachar

GEN. 49:14-15

Issachar is a strong ass crouching down between two burdens: And he saw that rest was good, and the land that it was pleasant; and bowed his shoulder to bear, and became a servant unto tribute.

Dan

GEN. 49:16-18

Dan shall judge his people, as one of the tribes of Israel. Dan shall be a serpent by the way, an adder in the path, that biteth the horse heels, so that his rider shall fall backward. I have waited for thy salvation, O LORD.

Gad

GEN. 49:19

Gad, a troop shall overcome him: but he shall overcome at the last.

Asher

GEN. 49:20

Out of Asher his bread shall be fat, and he shall yield royal dainties.

Naphtali

GEN. 49:21

Naphtali is a hind let loose: he giveth goodly words.

Joseph (Ephraim & Manasseh)

GEN. 48:5

And now thy two sons, Ephraim and Manasseh, which were born unto thee in the land of Egypt before I came unto thee into Egypt, are mine; as Reuben and Simeon, they shall be mine.

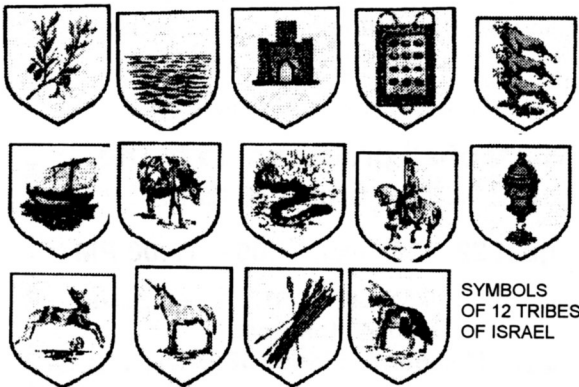

GEN. 49:22-26 Joseph is a fruitful bough, even a fruitful bough by a well; whose branches run over the wall: The archers have sorely grieved him, and shot at him, and hated him: But his bow abode in strength, and the arms of his hands were made strong by the hands of the mighty God of Jacob; (from thence is the shepherd, the stone of Israel:) Even by the God of thy father, who shall help thee; and by the Almighty, who shall bless thee with blessings of heaven above, blessings of the deep that lieth under, blessings of the breasts, and of the womb: The blessings of thy father have prevailed above the blessings of my progenitors unto the utmost bound of the everlasting hills: they shall be on the head of Joseph, and on the crown of the head of him that was separate from his brethren.

GEN. 49:27

Benjamin shall ravin as a wolf: in the morning he shall devour the prey, and at night he shall divide the spoil.
